Orville Hanson, resident engineer of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, reports that the Little River timber access road will be completed by the end of August. Further extension of this road will be made by the lumber company purchasing the timber at the U. S. National forestry timber auction in the future.

The U. S. Forest Service is now cruising the timber approximately three miles east of the present end of the access road.

The Kuckenberg Co. will have construction finished on the four mile strip of the new North Umpqua road starting in and one half miles above Rock Creek, which brings the new highway six miles from Steamboat Creek. Senat Group Advises Postal Rate Increases

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The senate post office committee has approved a postal rate rise bill which it estimates will yield slightly under \$300,000,000 in additional revenue.

The measure would increase the rate on postal cards from 1 to 2 cents; first class mail from 3 to 4 cents on the first ounce; air mail letters from 6 to 8 cents an ounce and air postal cards from 4 to 5 cents.

Second class mail rates, for which a 100 percent rise had been proposed over a three-year period, would be increased only 30 percent — 10 percent in three successive years.

Exempted from the increases are listed non-profit, charitable, educational and certain fraternal mailings.

Third class mail, after payment of the usual 10¢ fee, would rise from the present 1 percent rate by 1/4-cent in two successive years.
