

More Candidates For Queen Asked In Sutherlin Fete

With only three days remaining before the contest for queen of Sutherlin Timber Days begins, Douglas county civic organizations are again urged to enter a candidate for the event scheduled to begin Friday, Aug. 10.

Mrs. M. Moore, chairman of the registration committee, reports that ribbons will go on sale Friday July 27. Even though candidates can be entered later, she asks that they be registered by Friday to give them an equal chance in the competition.

Entrants must be single and between 14 and 21 years of age. The six princesses who will assist the queen will also be selected on the basis of ribbons sold. Entries can be made by phoning Mrs. M. Moore at 2475 Sutherlin, or by contacting D. R. Hinton at the Sutherlin Sun.

Thus far three girls have been registered. They are: Maria Lou Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orville Smith of Sutherlin, sponsored by the Band Boosters; Janice Parks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Parks, sponsored by the Business Women's club of Sutherlin; and Rosalie Trento, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Trento of Coles Valley, sponsored by the Saddle club.

The three-day celebration will begin Friday morning with a "kids" parade. All boys who entered racers in the Roseburg Soapbox Derby are asked to enter them at Sutherlin if possible. Friday evening, there will be six boxing matches in the high school gymnasium or the Sutherlin American Legion hall.

Following the coronation of the queen and the grand parade Saturday morning, a baseball game between the Umpqua Chiefs and Medford Cheney Studs will be played on the high school diamond. The same evening the queen's ball will be held in the gymnasium of the high school.

On Sunday the main timber contests will be held in Sutherlin park on elevated platforms.

ing to stay in Korea forever."

If Communist negotiators persist in their stand Wednesday, cease-fire talks may well break down on the day fighting in Korea rounds out its 13th month.

New Air Blows Struck

Speedy jets and superfort bombers swept through heavy clouds Tuesday to keep Communist forces from moving or storing supplies around Pyongyang, North Korean capital.

Ground fighting stepped up somewhat during the recess in armistice talks, but planes carried the main allied blows.

F-80 Shooting Star jets ripped and twisted railroad tracks and

blasted 40 rail cars at Kang-Dong, 15 miles east of Pyongyang. In a repeat strike 40's reported demolishing a rail and highway bridge near the city. Superforts bombed Sariwon rail yards south of Pyongyang.

Two U. N. planes were shot down by Red ground fire Monday—a marine fighter and an F-51 Mustang.

Mortgage Foreclosure Decree Issued In Court

A decree against George H. King and others to foreclose mortgage on property offered as security on a promissory note was issued Monday by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

The suit had been filed by Glusina Brothers Lumber company of Eugene, King, Frank and Norma N. Burr, Robert O. and Ruby May Burr, J. E. Sifers and Leola DeVore were named defendants.

Other court action Monday included a suit brought against George S. Gray by Elizabeth Gray to recover \$1,450 allegedly owed on a promissory note, plus \$700 attorney's fees.

The American Casualty company filed suit against Arthur L. Morgan to recover possession of a 1948 Lincoln saw and a winch valued at \$4,000.

Elmer L. Grubbe Passes Suddenly

Elmer L. Grubbe, 70, of Chehalis, Wash., and the son of an early Oregon pioneer of this area, died Saturday at East Lake, near Bend. Death was said caused by a heart attack, while he was on vacation with his son-in-law, William Tate of Milwaukee, according to information received here.

He was born on what is now the Harding Knapp place in Garden valley Nov. 26, 1880. The son of Nolen and Esther Grubbe, he grew to manhood in Douglas county, then went to Weston and learned the brick-making trade, which he followed many years. Later he farmed at Toledo and then at Chehalis, Wash.

Surviving are his widow, Lelia; a daughter, Mrs. Eltha Tate of Milwaukee; three sons, Albert Grubbe of Pendleton; Edwin of Seattle, Wash., and Ernest of Prineville; 10 grandchildren and one great-grandchild; a sister, Mrs. W. E. Thompson of Wilbur; two nieces, Mrs. Irene Weatherly of Elkton and Esther Gardner of Wilbur.

The body will be shipped to Wilbur for graveside funeral services Thursday at 1 p.m. The funeral will be held Wednesday at Chehalis.

Lewis Thompson, Riddle Resident, Passes Away

Lewis Thompson, 63, of Riddle died Sunday afternoon. He was born in Illinois on July 14, 1888. He had been a resident of Riddle for the last 15 years.

Survivors include the widow, Hattie, Riddle; and a stepson, Elsie Ash of Grants Pass. Funeral services will be at 11 a.m. Wednesday in the Riddle Baptist church with Rev. Mr. Wagner officiating.

A report from a Southern Pacific brakeman Monday that he saw a silver-winged airplane fall into the trees one mile west of Rice hill prompted an aerial search Monday by Deputy Sheriff Cecil Bever, a member of the sheriff's aero squadron.

A. E. Wilson, SP brakeman, said he thought he saw the plane fall into the trees Saturday afternoon.

Bever, who combed the area within five miles of where the plane was reported fallen, found no trace of it. A check with flying operators in the area uncovered the fact that a plane had been two days overdue on a flight from Nevada to Eugene. However, the plane, owned by Green's flying service, Eugene, landed there late Sunday night.

Dr. K. G. Woolley, Roseburg Native, Taken By Death

PORTLAND, Ore. — Dr. Kenneth C. Woolley, 54, a Portland dentist since 1923, died of a heart attack Sunday at his residence at 1303 NE Euclid avenue. He was at his office Saturday and was working at his home Sunday when stricken. He was born in Roseburg on February 28, 1897, and moved here with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank W. Woolley, in 1905. He attended grade school and Washington high school here, then was graduated from the Ridgefield, Wash., high school before entering the North Pacific Dental college (now the University of Oregon school of dentistry). For several years, he was identified with the Portland public school dental program.

He was a World War I overseas veteran, having served in the medical corps of the navy.

Survivors are his wife, Dorothy; a stepson, John Howe of The Dalles; two sisters, Mrs. S. M. Laws of Salem and Mrs. L. L. Large of Portland, and two brothers, Dr. Ivan M. Woolley of Portland and Allan C. Woolley of San Francisco.

Funeral services were held in Portland today (Tuesday).

The late Frank W. Woolley, father of the doctor, was a member of the old Roseburg hardware firm of Churchill, Woolley and MacKenzie.

Farmer Loses Right Leg In Pulley Belt Accident

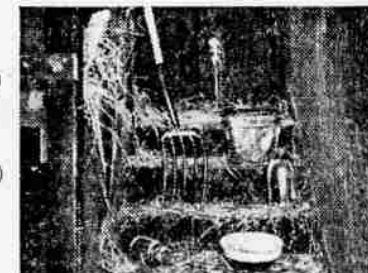
