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was an essential part of these negotiations. An official communiqué said "considerable progress" was made during the day.

The communiqué indicated the new Communist proposal would be studied in Washington and at United Nations headquarters in addition to being carefully examined here and in Tokyo.

The Red Korean's Pyongyang radio in a bare announcement of the day said "both parties still did not reach unanimity of views" on the troop question.

Guns, Bombs Still Near

Meanwhile, several clashes were reported on the central front. Two light probing attacks by the Reds were repulsed west of Chonwon and a Red platoon was scattered northeast of Kumsong. Other U.N. forces battled Communists south of Kumsong, suspected new Red buildup area.

On the eastern front, Allied forces reported 176 rounds of 75 mm. artillery fire were loosed by the Communists north of Inje. Clashes took place southwest and northwest of the coastal city of Kamsong.

Thirteen B-29 bombers pounded railroad yards near the North Korean capital of Pyongyang. Superforts hit Sinanju, north of the capital; Opari, between Sinanju and Pyongyang; and Chinnampo, coastal town southwest of Pyongyang.

Allied planes flew nearly 1,000 sorties Tuesday attacking Red frontlines, airfields, highway traffic and rail yards. Far East air forces pilots reported killing or wounding more than 200 Reds in eastern Korea.

The Peiping radio charged that eight American jet planes flew deep inside Manchuria Saturday and said seven were shot down. There was no confirmation from Far East air forces.

Fourth Airplane Added By Umpqua Flying Club

The Umpqua Flying Club recently added its fourth airplane for use by its 40 members.

The new plane is a fast all-metal Luscombe bi-plane country service.

Other planes operated by the club are a four-place, all-metal, low-wing Navion, a four-place Stinson Voyager, and an Aerona champion trainer.

The Umpqua Flying Club is presently operating the Roseburg Municipal airport, and was chartered in 1936. Deputy Sheriff Ira Byrd is the only remaining charter member.

Forester Tells Need Of N. Umpqua Highway

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above Glide. Remaining to be completed is a bridge at Lone rock and four miles of construction to Rock Creek, said Aufderheide.

The forest highway section includes grading from Rock creek to Swamp creek, approximately nine miles. Clearing contract now underway from Swamp creek to Steamboat, 6.6 miles, will be completed this fall. Grading contract to Steamboat is programmed for 1952. A bridge across Steamboat creek is completed.

The distance from Steamboat to Fish creek is 25 miles. This is the length needed to develop the steamboat river. It will also make available to Douglas county a 140 timber now going to Klamath Falls.

Work was begun on the North Umpqua forest highway in 1949. In the seven fiscal years since work started, \$1,172,631 has been spent on this road, an average of \$167,233 per year. During the same period there has been available to the state of Oregon \$15,126,372 of forest highway money. Forest highway appropriations are \$42,000,000 behind authorization. During the fiscal years 1948 and 1949 funds were appropriated, he stated.

The need, he said, is for local interests to get behind the program and either get more of the money allotted for Oregon, which might run into difficulties, or to obtain a larger total federal appropriation until the work is completed.

Portland Girl Drowns In Long Beach Surf

LONG BEACH, Wash. — (AP) — Coast guardsmen are patrolling the beach here searching for the body of a 15-year-old Portland girl who was believed drowned in the surf Tuesday.

She was Betty Shaul, daughter of a Portland dentist, Dr. V. V. Shaul.

Sheriff's Deputy Jack Nyberg said the girl could not swim and apparently drowned when she fell into a crab hole.

A companion, Barbara Morris, Opportunity, Wash., was pulled from the surf by Bill Radford, Long Beach. The Morris girl said she attempted to rescue Betty.

British Plane Hops Over North Pole From Iceland

FAIRBANKS, Alaska. — (AP) — Ten crewmen of a British bomber stretched their air legs today after a casual hop over the top of the world from Iceland to Fairbanks.

It took the four-engine Avro bomber 18 hours and 54 minutes to go over the north pole to Fairbanks from the take off point at Keflavik, Iceland, a 3,538-mile jaunt.

Thursday they plan to fly the plane the 4,128 miles back to Manby, England. The return flight will be via the polar regions, but not necessarily over the pole again, Frogley said.

Better Understanding Noted

Elliott said the board had been "very cognizant of the problems involved" and had never accepted his resignation. "They made me feel they wanted me to stay," he said.

The school faculty had been very loyal, he continued, and "townspeople overwhelmed me" with their support. He said he felt that he and the board had secured a "better understanding" of their problems, and thought that "by working together, we could have very good schools next year."

Elliott said that in order for him to get away, it would make it difficult to get the school system started this fall, but said that Roseburg had been very good about understanding such things.

When Elliott originally announced his resignation, he stated, "I'm convinced it's for the good of the school system and for the unity of the school board."

His resignation followed closely that of D. R. Smith on July 9 as superintendent of buildings and properties of the district. The Roseburg Teachers' association promptly issued a protest of the resignation, leading to the mass meeting July 1, at which the majority of the more than 160 Roseburg citizens attending insisted that Elliott be retained.

Beyond Service Charges

However, the notice filed Tuesday described the condition of the Cloverdale sewer system as "such that the ground water infiltration may hereafter require the refusal of sewage . . . and the repairs and maintenance of said system, which will be required from time to time, cannot be made within the limits of the service charges established by the North Roseburg Sanitary district."

An alternative to refusal to accept sewage from the Cloverdale system was presented in the notice. The board of directors of the sanitary district could establish a special increased rate for treatment of Cloverdale sewage in line with the cost of service calls and treatment of the sewage.
