**Confessions Obtained**

A total of \$5,300 was paid to at least five players the past two seasons for control of point spreads in Bradley games. Already confessing implication are Melchiorre, Aaron Preece, Jim Kelly, Bill Mann and Bud Grover.

Another player, Fred Schlieman, who like Kelly will be a returning senior next school term, was to be questioned by O'Connor and Peoria county State's Attorney Michael Shore today.

Melchiorre, according to O'Connor's latest disclosures, said he had Preece, Kelly and another player, still unidentified, ready to cooperate in holding scores under the established point spread at \$4,500 a game last season.

**OSC Game Involved**

Apparently this was a little rich for the blood of Nick the Greek and West, who only paid off a reported \$4,000 on one game. supervision. And in Korea there have been specific intimations of protest against supervision in the air, which was ruled by the U. N. through all the fighting.

**Point four** — exchange of prisoners — also could offer unexpected obstacles.

The Allies have indicated they want to exchange prisoners on a man for man basis. The Reds have indicated they think all prisoners of war should be sent home.

The U. N. has some 163,000 prisoners compared to about 10,000 Allied prisoners held by the Reds. The fifth point presumably is the Communist-suggested answer to the big stumbling block in the first ten cease-fire sessions.

That was the Red demand that armistice terms include withdrawal of all foreign troops from Korea.

The U. N. insisted this was a political question that could be taken up only at a higher level

after an armistice was actually in effect.

Informed sources indicated the Communists dropped their demand for immediate settlement of the issue in return for a U. N. pledge that it would be taken up later. Precise wording of this recommendation would, presumably, be worked out at Kaesong.

Agreement on the five-point agenda was reached in nine minutes of Thursday's tense session at Kaesong.

"It is much too early," Ridgway's headquarters said, "to predict either the success or the rate of progress to be obtained."

There is a hint of how long it may take in examining what has happened since negotiations began July 10.

Ten meetings have been held, lasting 22½ hours. In those ten sessions they agreed on an agenda.

"There are numerous basic points within the framework of the agenda on which agreement must be reached," Ridgway's announcement cautioned, "and on which there is presently wide diversion of views."

## New Trial Motion Denied In Condemnation Suit

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly Wednesday denied a motion for a new trial in the case of the state highway commission vs. T. E. Davis and others.

Davis, defendant in a condemnation suit on property near Scottsburg, had moved for a new trial claiming errors in law and irregularities in the proceedings of the court.

A judgment on June 28 had awarded \$2,500 compensation for the property, condemned in order to relocate the Umpqua highway. A suit brought against Othe Martin Brothers Box company by James J. Orr was dismissed Wednesday by Judge Wimberly on motion of the plaintiff. Orr had asked \$65,000 general and unspecified special damages for an accident while he was working for Martin Brothers.
