

Rotarians See Movie On System Of Accounting

Remington-Rand's accounts receivable accounting system was the subject of a movie which was projected for the benefit of Roseburg Rotarians Thursday noon at the Hotel Umpqua.

According to the film, the system provides an easy means of "constant credit control of accounts receivable" and shows automatically what accounts are delinquent.

Vic Lewis, co-owner of D & L Stationers, was program chairman. The system was credited with taking care of arithmetic, plus authorizations and collections.

Such a system was developed because of the complex nature of modern business, the film pointed out.

Irv Pugh, when asked to give a report on the Rotary club's entry in the Apple Box derby preliminary, gave credit for the endeavor's success to Vern Toser and Walt Mallory, who made arrangements. Pugh piloted the Rotary "Lion-Tamer and Kiwanis Killer" vehicle to a win over the aforementioned clubs.

Percy Croft thanked the race committee men for their efforts but demanded retribution from the losing Kiwanis and Lions teams because, he said, Rotary was held up to ridicule for allegedly losing other contests.

Ruchaber. Interment will be in Civil Bend cemetery at Winston. Funeral arrangements are in the care of the Long and Orr mortuary.

Referendum On Truck Tax Increase Filed

SALEM — (AP) — Referendum petitions have been filed here against a bill passed by the last legislature to increase truck taxes about \$2,000,000 a year, starting next Jan. 1.

The measure would boost taxes 33 percent for heavy trucks and make smaller levies for lighter trucks. The school reorganization bill referendum petitions are expected to be filed next week.

Petitions are being circulated to refer two others: the cigarette tax and a bill to reduce the weight of logging trucks.

Douglas Trusty's Prison Racket Brought To End

SALEM, Ore. — (AP) — Two prison trustees working on the prison farm managed to build up a satisfactory egg route and move from bicycle to automobile delivery.

But, said Warden George Alexander, the men aren't trustees any more.

The warden said he had put the men out of business because, among other things, the eggs they were selling were stolen from the prison farm.

Alexander said men on the prison farm have a considerable amount of freedom and this, apparently, was what happened:

Two trustees stole eggs and took them to Aumsville, five miles away, where they sold them. As they prospered, they bought used bicycles at \$10 each. Later they bought a 1935 automobile for \$65 to make their deliveries more convenient.

The men were identified by Deputy Warden E. C. Halley as Lawrence Puckett, 35, serving three years for larceny in Douglas county; and Ralph Kenney, 25, serving three years for burglary in Washington county.

Both are now in solitary confinement. State police have been called in to investigate.

Alexander said he didn't know about a report published by the Oregon Journal at Portland saying the men also stole at boys and sold them at public auction in Molalla. He said he was still investigating the egg business.

Pedestrian Stumbles On Fortune In Booty

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — You find the strangest things, sometimes, when you use short cuts across vacant lots.

Take Franklin Crawford, for example. The 27-year-old textile worker cut across a lot at night to go to a barber shop and stumbled on a box crammed with thousands of dollars worth of diamonds and other jewelry.

Chances are, though, he won't get to keep the find. The policemen to whom he turned over the box said they thought the treasure was part of the loot in a recent jewel robbery.

Firm Short Of Funds Loses Army Contract

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The army is canceling a \$2,916,004 contract awarded the Elvair corporation of Jackson, Miss., for canvas tarpaulins and curtains.

In announcing this, the army added, however, that "no action is contemplated with regard" to two smaller contracts held by the firm.

The army launched an investigation of the firm's contracts after a house armed services subcommittee charged that Elvair never had on hand enough cash to perform its commitments to the government.

Lunch Program Developed

The development of school lunch programs in the system began on a full scale in 1946-47 when the board assumed the responsibility. Prior to that, the Parent-teacher association had conducted a soup kitchen at Fullerton, while a pick-and-choose cafeteria was operated at the Senior high school.

The program developed yearly under the direction of a district head and with the assistance of federal reimbursements per meal and in the purchase of equipment.

Mrs. May Mathews recently resigned after four years of service as the director. More than 200,000 meals were served in 1951. Roseburg has paid all equipment costs except for the year 1949-50, the report states.

opened in September, 1948, but children from the third and fourth grades had to be sent to Benson school.

In 1949 a double shift became necessary when nearly double the expected enrollment responded to the school bell. Thirteen additional rooms were constructed and children were moved into those rooms in December.

When school opens in September, it will again be necessary to move children from Roverside to meet state standards for teacher-pupil ratio, according to the report.

Fullerton School Opened

Another step in Roseburg's expanding school system was the opening of the new Fullerton school building in April of 1951. The 17-room building was built on a 20-acre site when it became apparent that the expanding high school would soon require all available space on the property, including the old Fullerton building.

Originally an eight-room school, Benson was increased to 12 rooms by converting sawdust room, stage, halls, corridors and old office space into classrooms. Present enrollment is about 320.

Major change in the plant in the last seven years was the addition of a new gymnasium, which doubles as an auditorium.

Built in 1937, Rose school serves the southern part of the city. It is a seven-classroom building with a gymnasium, auditorium, lunchroom, health room and office. Extra classrooms were improvised during the years 1944 to 1947; the stage and gymnasium being converted to classroom use. An annex housing five primary classes was constructed in 1947.

Health Program

Improvements include: a lunch program, black top for the playground and a portion of the play area; venetian blinds; intercommunication system; and alterations in the office.

Mrs. Marion Ingram was the first person employed to provide nursing service to the high school, also teaching classes in home nursing. In 1949 an arrangement with the Douglas county health unit provided a full-time nurse, Mrs. Dorothy Kitchen.

The health program starts with pre-school physicals, extending to complete physical check-ups for every pupil from grades one through 12.

A coordinated program of special education for all handicapped school children was established in Roseburg school district in 1947. In 1950, guidance of the program was turned over to John A. Lucas.

Marine Home On Leave Killed In Auto Crash

PHILIPSBURG, N. J. — (AP) — A marine home on leave to recover from wounds received in Korea was killed in an automobile crash here.

The car driven by the marine, Walter D. Smith of Philippsburg, plunged through a guard rail, knocked over a six-inch thick concrete post and hurtled 20 feet across a creek, striking a tree on the opposite bank, police said.

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Controls Bill Revised By Conference Group

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The compromise bill—like the separate measures passed by the Senate and the House — is minus most of the additional power which Mr. Truman had requested. Those include control over commercial rents, authority to build and acquire defense plants, control over commodity speculation, authority to pay subsidies on high-cost farm commodities, the right to restrict real estate credit on existing houses, and authority to license all firms subject to price ceilings.

Property Buy Broadened

Among other provisions included in the compromise bill are: Property acquisition—the administration's present authority to acquire property by purchase or requisition would be broadened generally to include the right to condemn property.

Subsidies, loans, purchases — the government's basic authority to guarantee or make direct defense loans and to purchase items for resale would be continued, with some restrictions.

It would receive limited authority to pay subsidies to high cost producers of raw materials, other than farm commodities.

Rent Increases Get Nod

The administration won at least one victory when the conferees agreed to permit rent rollbacks to levels which prevailed just before the Korean war, in newly designated critical defense areas.

In both the senate and house bill was a provision authorizing rent increases of up to 20 percent above the June, 1947, levels in areas now controlled. Committee officials estimated that the increase in most cases would amount to only five to seven percent because boosts have been granted since 1947 for many dwellings.

The compromise bill produced by the senate-house conference committee must go back to both chambers for final votes before going to Mr. Truman to be signed into law.

mentations to governments of the warring nations, cover the demand for withdrawal of foreign troops from Korea.

Allied Attack Repulsed

Allied attempts to capture dominating hills on the eastern front were blocked again today by stubborn Communist resistance.

The Eighth army reported attacks by United Nations soldiers were blunted northeast of Yangu and north of Inje. U. N. troops made similar attacks Thursday, but fell back before intense mortar and artillery fire from Chinese positions.

Allied patrols reported light contact with Communists northeast of Kumhwa, on the central front. Moderate resistance was encountered by other patrols south of Kumhwa.

American B-29s from Okinawa bombed Communist supplies at the western Korea river port of Kyomipo and cut rail tracks in the same area. Kyomipo is southwest of the North Korean capital, Pyongyang.

Fifth air force fighters and light bombers pounded Communist transportation facilities in more than 350 sorties.

Railroad bridges were hit at Hwangju, south of Pyongyang, and Yonghung, on the east coast. Flying marines reported damaging road bridges south of Kojong, another east coast town.

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
