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St. Lawrence Seaway Bill Again Sidetracked

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Legislation to authorize the St. Lawrence seaway and power project was killed today by the house public works committee.

The action was taken by a 15 to 12 roll call vote of the 27-member committee.

Members of the committee explained the vote means the measure cannot again be brought before the committee unless two-thirds of the membership so votes or unless unanimous consent is obtained.

Thus, for all practical purposes, the long debated seaway proposal again was buried by Congress, another setback for forces which have been seeing its authorization for nearly 20 years.
