JOLLY CIRCLE CLUB ENJOYS DESSERT-LUNCHEON AT HOME OF LEORA LYNN

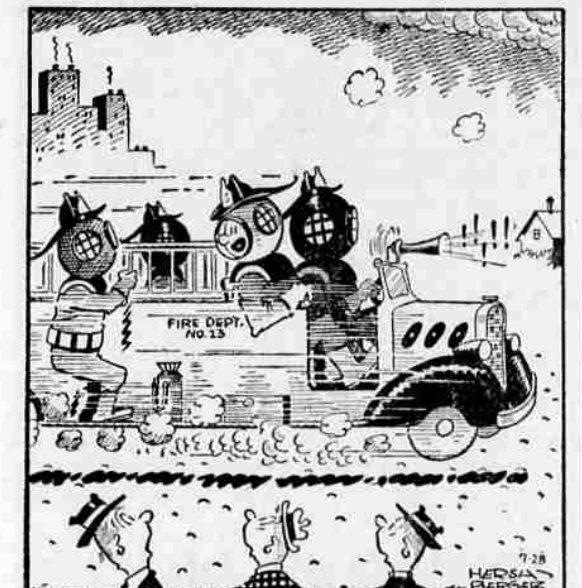
