New Canyonville Hospital Is Credit To Community

A credit to the Canyonville community is the brand new Forest Glen hospital located on the Riddle road two blocks west of highway 99. Dr. and Mrs. R. L. Falk, who have been in Canyonville for two and a half years, are the owners.

Designed to provide the maximum in comfort and convenience for patients and hospital personnel, the up-to-date hospital structure is a modern one story building in an L shape with the hospital in one end and offices in the other. The hospital is 96 feet long and 32 feet wide, while the office side is 60 feet long and 35 feet wide. The outside of the building is stained redwood siding on the lower part and white plaster on the upper part.

Jack Stevenson of Myrtle Creek handled general contracting, using local labor. A Houston, Tex., firm was the architect patterning the hospital after a Houston hospital. Work on the project started Dec. 1, 1950. With cement floors and plaster inside and out, the building is fire resistant.

There are six patient rooms, four private and two wards with two beds each. A pattern of colors for the patient rooms is one of the innovations designed to give the patient the utmost in comfort. Colors chosen were pink, turquoise, rose, green and blue. Colored beds are also used. Chests, bedside tables and chairs in matching colors have been ordered but have not yet arrived. White woodwork is used throughout the hospital. All windows have Venetian blinds.

The nursery walls and ceiling are a rosy pink. There are four cribs and an incubator in the nursery and a large window separates this room from the corridor.

The kitchen has a gas stove, electric refrigerator and electric dishwasher. A small dining room for

the hospital personnel is yet to be completed.

Walls of the corridors in the hospital are light green and part buff color in the offices. Flooring surfaces in the building are asphalt tile. Steam heat is installed throughout the building.

Among the rooms in the building are the reception room, consultation room, X-ray room, laboratory, business office, treatment room, minor surgery, examining room, nurse's chart room and doctor's lounge.

Has Modern Laboratory
Laboratory equipment includes electrocardiogram, basal metabolism, electric colormeter and X-ray machine.

Dr. R. L. Falk received his training at the Los Angeles College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons and the Kansas City College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons. He was associated with his father, Dr. R. M. Falk, in Coquille where he has been practicing for two and a half years.

Mrs. Falk is a registered nurse and, though she is not at the hos-

pital regularly, she is on call. She received her training at Mason Memorial hospital at Murray, Ky., and Louisville General Hospital at Louisville, Ky. Most of her nursing was private duty but she has also done some hospital work. The Falks have two small daughters, Cynthia Ann and Sharon Lyn.

Dr. R. M. Falk, who trained at the College of Medical Evangelists at Loma Linda, Calif., and who has had a hospital in Coquille for the past five years, is also associated with the hospital, as well as Dr. Howard Ferguson, Glendale, who trained at the Kansas City College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.

Other hospital personnel are: Dan Daniels, Myrtle Creek, hospital administrator and bookkeeper; Miss Mabel Brington, Azalea, receptionist; Miss Janet Anderson, Myrtle Creek, office nurse; Miss Norma Cornelius, R. N., riddle, head nurse in charge.

Miss Cornelius trained at St. Joseph hospital in Orange, Calif. she had nearly a year of undergraduate work in the Hollywood Children's hospital in Los Angeles, after which she worked a year at Doernbecher hospital in Portland. For a year and a half at Providence hospital in Portland, Miss Cornelius worked in the pediatric department. She has also worked in the Mercy hospital in Roseburg. 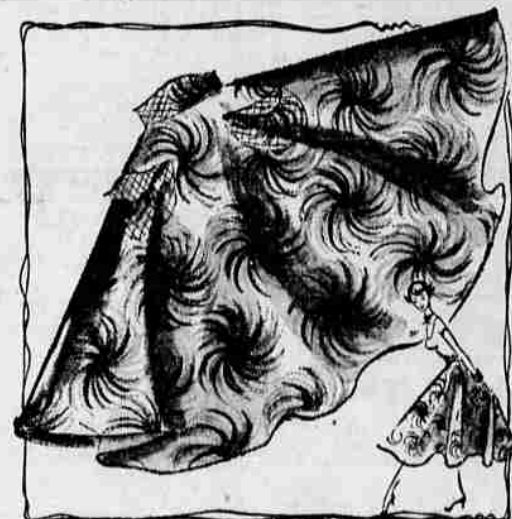
