

Federal Trial Slated For Trio Jailed Here

Three sailors being held in the Douglas county jail in connection with a fatal hit-and-run accident in Yakima county, Wash., will be tried by federal authorities because the accident occurred on an Indian reservation, according to state police.

The men are AWOL from their respective military stations, police added. Two of the men—Theodore Furman Parr, 18, and Karl Nathan Rush, 20, both from the U. S. naval air station at Moffett field, Calif.—are charged with involuntary manslaughter.

The third man is being held on a charge of misprision of a felony. He was identified as Ernest Harold Rush, 21, from the U.S.S. Smalley at Charleston, S. C.

Federal authorities will be here Thursday with fugitive warrants for the men, police said.

Dumont Creek Blaze Increases Timber Toll

The Dumont creek fire in the Umpqua national forest has jumped its fire lines and consumed another 50 acres of timber in addition to the original burn area of 67 acres, reports Robert Aufderheide, forest supervisor, U. S. forest service.

Most of the fire-fighting crew, who were pulled out of the area Monday, are now trekking back into the area. It is estimated that from 90 to 100 men are fighting the blaze.

The area is about 50 air miles southeast of Roseburg and is difficult to reach.

BRIDGE REPAIRED

Planning on the Days Creek bridge was being replaced Monday by a county road crew after it had broken through Sunday, the county court said. The covered bridge is on the Days Creek road.

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Douglas County Donations Aid In Flood Relief

Douglas county citizens, who know what the effects of a flood can be, have contributed generously to flood disaster relief in the Midwest.

Mrs. R. E. Herman, executive secretary, Douglas county Red Cross, mailed a check for \$1,000 Saturday to San Francisco from where it will be forwarded for use in the Kansas City, Mo., disaster area.

An additional \$157, which arrived Monday from Red Cross, was also forwarded, bringing the total contribution so far to \$1,157, an amount exceeding the \$800 goal by a considerable margin.

Douglas county received \$18,100 from national disaster relief funds during and after the flood of last fall. Mrs. Herman points out. The percentage of the county contributions last year which went to national relief, however, was only \$2,600.

The money in the latest campaign was raised in county collections, down town booths, contributions at the Indian theater, the Peevee baseball games, the recent radio program in which local personalities performed for pledges, and through the efforts of the Junior chamber of commerce and both radio stations, Mrs. Herman said.

Persons receiving late pledges should turn them in promptly, asserted Mrs. Herman. Anyone still wishing to contribute may mail their donations to the Red Cross headquarters in the armory. Mrs. Herman expressed appreciation to all those who participated in raising the funds, particularly the volunteers who solicited.

Mrs. Herman said that about six cots borrowed from the Red Cross during the flood of last fall have not been returned as yet. Since persons are constantly inquiring for use of them, it would be appreciated if those outstanding could be turned in, she said.

WOMAN JAILED

Laura Cederstrom, 26, Roseburg, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail Monday on a vagrancy charge and her husband, James R., was released after posting \$100 bail on the same charge, District Judge A. J. Geddes reported.

Cederstrom had pleaded innocent. Jesse Patch, route 1, Roseburg, was fined \$50 on a drunkenness charge, Geddes said.

Oregon Tax Affairs Topic Of F. H. Young At Forum

Approximately \$680 millions are going out annually for the cost of government in Oregon, amounting to about \$430 for each person in the state, or about 42 percent of the assessed value of property in the state. It is essential that the economic assets of the state be prevented from hitting a "tail-spin," he averred.

Congress should put its own house in order before attempting to clamp down rigid controls, Young stated. Pointing to examples of "tremendous" waste, Young noted that Roseburg is a strategic place to make economy wishes known since it is the residence of Senator Guy Cordon and Representative Harris Ellisworth.

Young rapped "minority action" which he said caused many mistakes in state referendum action. Three bills enacted by the last Oregon legislature are up for referendum already, he said, pointing out that this might be damaging to legislators' morale. He opined that initiative and referendum laws needed considerable "tightening up."

Young said he thought it would be a "grievous" mistake to turn loose from \$30 to \$40 millions in the state for a veterans' bonus by "raiding" two funds—the industrial accident commission and a state retirement fund. It would be inflationary, he said.

Young said taxpayers might "take a beating" as a result of a recent state tax commission decision to change property assessment ratios from their former 1939-41 levels to present "inflated" values. This would encourage assessors to raise values, he said.

Are we safe in assuming that present levels are permanent, he questioned. The effect of such a move would be to increase the bonding capacity of local tax districts, he explained.

The speaker was introduced by Glen Riddle, president of the Taxpayers league.

TAIPEH, Formosa — (AP) — The Nationalist defense ministry here said Chinese Reds recently put to death about 10,000 persons in the east river areas of Kwangtung province. They were slain as counter-revolutionaries, the ministry said.

Kin Of Soviet-Held Jap POWs Fast In Protest

TOKYO — (AP) — Seventy-five Japanese — 30 of them women — have entered the fifth day of a fast aimed at speeding repatriation of their relatives from Soviet-held territory.

At the start of the fast they adopted a resolution which said: "Our next kin, first sentenced to death by the Soviet government and now abandoned by the Japanese government, are going to be done away with by the conclusion of a peace treaty."

The Japanese government announced recently that 250,000 Japanese prisoners of World War II had died in territory dominated by Soviet and Chinese Communists.

The government said some Japanese still were being held in Red territory but made no announcement of the exact number.

'Indecent' Novel Rapped By Japan's Top Critic

TOKYO — (AP) — The chairman of Japan's movie ethics committee testified he thinks D. H. Lawrence's book, "Lady Chatterley's Lover," is "an extremely indecent novel."

Tetsuzo Watanabe told a court: "I am shocked that such a lewd book could have been written and published."

Kyodo news agency said he gave the testimony at the trial of a Japanese publisher and the publisher's translator on charges they violated decency by publishing the book in Japanese.

A Tokyo women's college professor will next testify.

Iran's Gas Production Halts; New Talks Slated

ABADAN, Iran — (AP) — A Scotsman pushed a button today and halted the last gasoline producing machine in the world's largest refinery — closed in the bitter oil row between Britain and Iran.

The Anglo-Iranian oil company's giant plant at Abadan island has been slowing down production for the past month. It has now ceased altogether because no room remained in the acres of storage tanks to put any more gasoline, kerosene and other products.

Meanwhile U. S. trouble-shooter W. Averell Harriman returned to Tehran from London smiling and confident that "no further difficulties" stand in the way of new British-Iranian oil talks.

More Pay For Better Work Gets Board's Nod

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Wage Stabilization board has altered its regulation on merit pay raises to allow employers more leeway.

As announced, this would permit employers who use "rate ranges" for each job—that is those who pay a worker more as he improves, or gains experience on a particular job—to increase pay by one of the following options:

1. The same amount in increases given in 1950 except that the top rate for each job could not be raised.
2. An increase of up to six percent for job improvement as long as the top rate for each job remains unchanged.
3. Merit rate plans outlined prior to Jan. 25, 1951 wage freeze date, for application this year.

Yugoslavs Get U.N. Aid Pledge Against Russia

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — (AP) — The United Nations will go to the rescue if Russia attacks Yugoslavia, chief U. N. delegate Warren R. Austin says.

Austin told news correspondents here that such support for Yugoslavia would come under the "peace through deeds" resolution adopted by the general assembly last fall.

"If Yugoslavia is attacked, we (the U.N.) will go to her rescue," he said in response to questions. The former senator from Vermont emphasized, however, that he did not believe such an attack was imminent.

river at its northern border with Manchuria.

Tuesday's parades — including long bearded patriarchs, the gray haired wives, and small grandchildren — wound past the U. S. information building and the second logistical command headquarters.

Until negotiators reach agreement on all terms of an armistice, the fighting will continue. This has consisted mostly of gradual improvement of allied positions and unremitting air attacks on Red efforts to reinforce and strengthen their armies on the front.

Red Positions Smashed
Allied warplanes swept through low clouds today and hammered Red positions in the "Iron Triangle" on the western front of Korea as ground fighting again dwindled to patrol activity.

Primary target of Fifth air force planes was the area around Pyongyang, northern apex of the shattered old Red troop-massing area.

Reds between Kumsong and Kumbwa, eastern Allied-held anchor of the old triangle, hurled two light probing attacks at Allied lines this morning. Both were turned back.

Allied troops held mountain top positions along the eastern front won Monday after a five-day battle.

other step the administration opposed. On new and used automobiles for example, the down payment would remain at one-third of the purchase price but the balance could be paid in 18 months instead of 15 as at present. The down payment for radios, television sets and other household appliances would be 15 percent with at least 18 months to pay. That compares with 25 percent and 15 months now.

Another provision authorizes the trade-in value of household appliances to be counted as part of the down payment. Under the present program of the federal reserve board the trade-in value is supposed to apply only in the case of automobiles.

Rent control provisions in the new bill permit rent increases of up to 20 percent over June, 1947, levels in areas now under control. Increases granted since then would have to be deducted from the 20 percent.

The senate banking committee has estimated that most new rent increases will average five to seven percent because hikes have been granted for many dwellings during the last four years.

The bill also permits rent roll-backs to levels which prevailed just before the Korean war started, in newly designated critical defense areas where a shortage of housing has resulted from defense production activities or military installations.

In areas designated critical by the secretary of Defense and the mobilization director the government would be required to relax credit restrictions on construction of new houses. The President is given discretion as to the extent of relaxation.

Murder 17 Years Ago Draws Prison Sentence

MARTINEZ, Calif. — (AP) — Jose Vierra, 44, was sentenced here to five years to life in San Quentin for killing a man here 17 years ago.

Vierra was arrested last month in Vale, Ore., for disturbing the peace. A routine fingerprint check identified him as the long-sought fugitive.

He pleaded guilty to a charge of second degree murder for the 1934 slaying of Guadalupe Contreras over a \$7 debt.

Local Airman Will Return To United States Soon

Cpl. William F. Phillips Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Phillips Sr. of 1865 Myrtle St., Roseburg, will soon be returning to the United States from Japan, announced Col. Virgil L. Zoller, commanding officer of the third Bomb wing.

Corporal Phillips' outfit has been carrying the war to the enemy's back door. The third Bomb wing's B-29 Night Intruder crews have destroyed or damaged 8,000 Red supply vehicles and 85 water going vessels. Over 250 locomotives have been destroyed or damaged, as have 1,930 supply-laden railroad cars. In close support, the B-29s KO'd 23 Russian-made tanks and 50 gun emplacements while damaging three tanks and 70 gun positions.

Arriving overseas in November of 1950, Cpl. Phillips has been working as an air policeman in support of the night flying third Bomb wing's all out effort against the Communists in Korea.

He enlisted in the air force in July of 1946. Among his decorations are the American Theater Ribbon, Victory Medal, Japanese Occupation and the Korean Campaign with two Stars.

Angler Loses His Life In Fight With Barracuda

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. — (AP) — You'd probably say a man's life is worth more than a barracuda.

But that was the price paid here. Richard Brown, 35, fell into the ocean and drowned while trying to pull in a fish that had broken away from his gaff.

Brown was a deck hand on the fishing boat Super Express. The barracuda had been hooked and brought to the side of the boat. Brown gaffed it, then let it stay in the water to keep alive until the boat returned to port. The fish, still hooked, broke away from the gaff.

Brown climbed into a dory and set out in pursuit. He grabbed the line and was about to pull in the fish. The barracuda made one last break for freedom and Brown fell overboard. He sank immediately.
