Pacific Power To Issue Shares Of Common Stock

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Pacific Power and Light Co., Portland, Ore., will issue 250,000 shares of no-par value common stock.

Authorization for the issue was granted by the Federal Power commission.

Stockholders may buy one share of the new stock for each seven they now hold. Unsubscribed shares will be sold to underwriters, who also plan to buy 291,464 shares of the firm's common stock and offer it to the public for \$14.25 a share.
