Fresh Revenue Required To Aid Child Dependents

Among activities of the county welfare commission in June was the determination of employment opportunities for teen-age children under the aid-to-dependent-children grants, according to Mrs. Lois Baker, administrator of the commission.

All 14, 15 and 16-year-old children were removed from the grants since it was believed they would be able to obtain seasonal employment. Aid grants will be returned to 14-and-15-year olds in September and to 16-year-olds in October.

Mrs. P. T. Bubar Accepts Blood Gift Chairmanship

Mrs. Paul T. Bubar has accepted the chairmanship of the Red Cross bloodmobile visits to Roseburg. This position was formerly held by Mrs. Albert McCall, who resigned.

Mrs. Bubar reminded that the next visit of the bloodmobile will be Aug. 16 between 2 and 5 p.m. She said the Roseburg quota will be 230 pints and urged everyone who possibly can to contribute. She pointed out the vital need for blood, both for home use and for men fighting in Korea.

Parents and children have cooperated in this program during the summer and most have obtained employment, Mrs. Baker said. Unless a new source of revenue can be found, other curtailments in aid to dependent children may be necessary, she said. During the recent legislative session, \$500,000 was slashed from state aid to children funds.

CONTINO SENTENCED

SAN FRANCISCO—147—Dick Contino, 21, popular accordionist, was sentenced today to six months in prison and was fined \$10,000 on a draft evasion charge. Contino, who made as much as \$4,000 a week in theater and night club engagements, pleaded guilty July 24 to a draft dodging charge.

Despite increases in nursing care payments to patients at the county hospital, Douglas county will receive a refund of \$1,927.74 in unspent welfare funds for the last fiscal year, Mrs. Baker reported. Total expenditure for June, 1951, on behalf of recipients of old age assistance were \$4,556.11.

Figures released by Mrs. Baker show that \$14,511 was paid to 127 aid to dependent children cases, \$1,849 to 30 disabled persons and \$529 in grants to eight blind. During June, 37 children received supervision in foster homes. Two adoptions were completed by the welfare agency.

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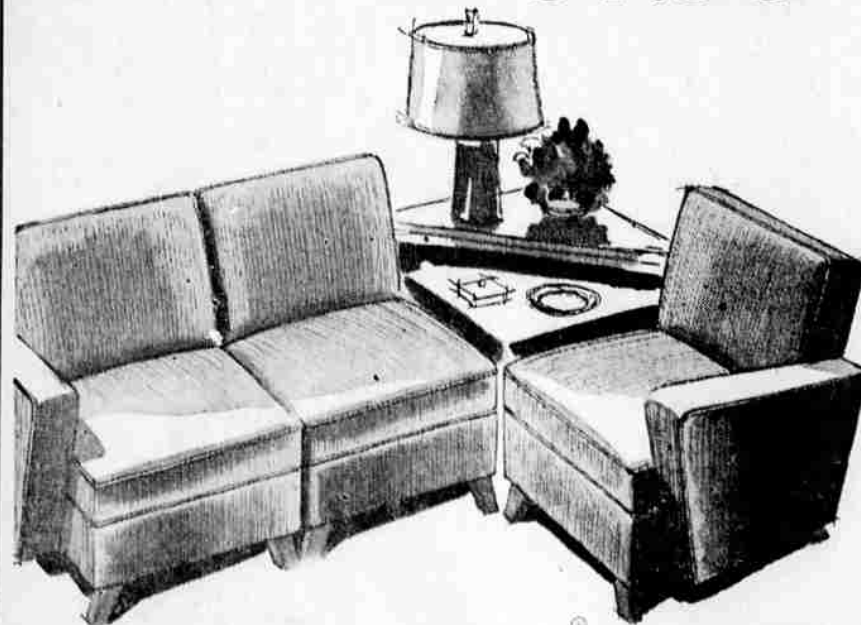
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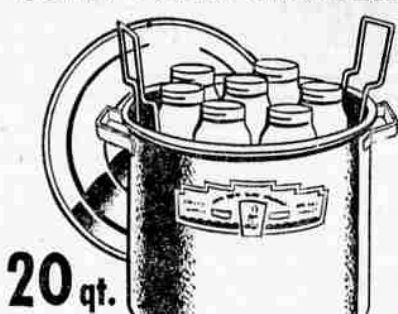
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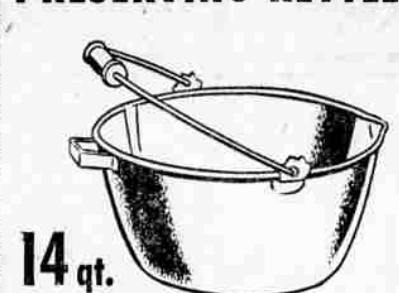


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
