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ton mountain Grants Pass, and on Highway 42 near Remote. Kenworthy and Ritchey were apprehended at 12:45 a. m. at the Grants Pass road block.

State officer Joe Haystead of the Roseburg office commented, "I've never had a more hectic two hours in my life." The police radio receiver at the station on Cobb street fizzled out at the crucial moment. Haystead had to direct police cars by transmitting at the office and receiving on a police car radio.

Officers W. Allen and Frank Sanders operated the road block five miles north of Grants Pass on highway 99 and made the arrests. When Ritchey ran, they reported, he threw some of the loot in the grass.

After their arrest, the men took officers to Allen creek road junction where they had thrown the discarded jewelry cases. The two salesmen were not in their room at the time of the burglary, police said. They had been out eating a sandwich. They told officers they had been gone only 20 minutes when the act occurred, about 10:30.

On further questioning of the salesmen, they said they had apparently been spotted as jewelry salesmen in Salem. They continued that the men had probably followed them from there, waiting for a chance to steal the jewels. Kenworthy, one of the accused, told police the theft had not been premeditated. He said he had been in Seattle visiting his mother and was returning to Nevada.

The jewelry salesmen had asked the manager of the lodge to keep an eye on their room as it contained expensive display jewelry. He did. No one walked through the door. They took the window instead.

Booty Of Varied Type

Included in the loot recovered by police at Grants Pass were 972 assorted rings, five wrist watches, two bracelets, 11 Masonic pins, five papers containing 15 diamonds and a paper containing 21 cuff links. These had all been taken from their cases and thrown into a large blue denim pillow case. The high value of the jewelry was reportedly due to many of the settings being platinum, a precious mineral no longer available on the open market.

Desperado Slain In Gun Battle With FBI Agents

IDER, Ala. — (AP) — Billy Davis, 23-year-old desperado who vowed he'd never be taken alive, was blasted to death Wednesday night with a flaming pistol in his hand. FBI agents who had tracked the Tennessee prison parolee for nearly a month surprised him at a farm home and shot him to death as he grappled with a sheriff's deputy.

Big-Time Gamblers Deny Senate Contempt Charge

NEW YORK — (AP) — Big-time gamblers Joe Adonis and Frank Erickson pleaded innocent here to charges of contempt of the United States Senate. They are scheduled to go to trial next month.

They were accused of refusing to answer key questions at the televised senate crime committee hearing in New York last March.

Federal Judge Edward J. Dimock gave them until Sept. 10 to file pre-trial motions. Adonis and Erickson were brought from behind penitentiary bars to enter their pleas.

Officials Score Building Costs

SALEM — (AP) — Two members of the state board of control complained today that costs of state construction are higher than those of private construction as the board opened bids on two doctors' residences at Fairview home.

State Treasurer Walter Pearson declared that all the bids were excessive. He was joined in this by Secretary of State Earl Newberry. The low bid on the two homes was \$33,513, by D. E. Johnson, Milwaukie. There were six bidders.

Harry Dorman, head of the new state finance division, suggested that higher prices for construction of state buildings was due in part to the fact that inspectors were on the job to insure good workmanship and standard materials.

Despite the protest, the board of control unanimously accepted the low bid.

There was no opposition to a low bid of \$164,792 for remodeling the former hospital building at Fairview home into a school structure. The building was damaged by fire two years ago.

The board increased the construction loan for the new state office building in Portland from \$2,500,000 to \$2,650,000 and voted to install restaurant equipment in the structure.

Pre-school clinic will be held at the Wilbur school Aug. 21 for children entering the first grade of Wilbur and Riversdale schools, the county school superintendent's office announced.

It was not known today whether the Garden Valley school district would participate.

The whole crossing, involving 30 feet of four-inch main, will be replaced immediately, said Andrews, because the line has proved to be a chronic weak spot.

Leakage into the basement of the Douglas Abstract Co. prompted the repair work. It had been occurring for several days.
