Wanted By FBI

JAMES EDWARD JACKSON, JR.

The FBI has requested alert citizens and law enforcement agencies to be on the lookout for James Edward Jackson, Jr., Southern Regional Director of the Communist Party, USA, who was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury at New York, New York, on June 20, 1951, on a charge of conspiracy to advocate the violent overthrow of the government. A description of Jackson is as follows:

Age 36, born November 29, 1914, Richmond, Virginia; height, 5' 6 1/2"; weight, 160 pounds; build, medium; hair, black, curly, bald in front; eyes, brown; race, Negro; nationality, American; scars and marks, small star scar outer corner of left eye.

Jackson received a Doctor's Degree at Howard University of Pharmacy in Washington, D. C. He has resided in Richmond, Virginia; Washington, D. C.; Arlington, Virginia; and in Birmingham, Alabama.

He has been employed as a drugist, labor organizer, writer and lecturer. He is described as well-groomed and neat in appearance. He sometimes wears a mustache. Any person having information which may assist in locating James Edward Jackson, Jr., is requested to immediately notify the nearest FBI office. The phone number will appear on the first page of the telephone directory.

Liquor Major Issue In Mississippi Vote

JACKSON, Miss. — (AP) — The 35-year-old son of a former governor of Mississippi opposes former Gov. Hugh White in the Aug. 28 runoff primary in the state gubernatorial race.

Paul Johnson Jr. won the right to oppose White by eliminating Lt. Gov. Sam Lumpkin in the first primary on Tuesday. He is the son of the late former Governor Johnson who served as chief executive from 1940 to 1944.

Nomination in the primaries, in on-party Mississippi, amounts to election to the four-year term beginning in January.

White, in a prepared statement, said "our fight is states rights against Trumanism, and the people of Mississippi against outside interference of big-city politicians."

White, personally a dry, said he would not stand in the way of a referendum to allow voters to decide whether liquor should be legalized.

Red jets jumped it. No other damage was reported.

In other encounters F-86 Sabre jets turned back 24 Red MIG-15s that were gunning for a flight of American B-29s, and four F-80 Shooting Star jets fought a brief engagement with eight MIGs.

400,000 Flee Red Rule

More than 400,000 men, women and children fled from Communist North Korea to South Korea in the past two weeks, a government spokesman at Pusan said.

Clarence Ryee said 270,000 came through the Allied lines and 150,000 by sea.

Ryee said the North Koreans wanted "to escape the Communist rule." Observers here feel food and other living conditions on the Allied side of the lines may have influenced their decision.

The spokesman said the big problem facing the republic of Korea is how to feed the refugees. He said there are now 4,000,000 refugees from the north in South Korea, including 2,000,000 who fled before the outbreak of war last year.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Total enemy casualties in Korea through July 31 reached 1,237,872, the U. S. army estimates.

This is an increase of 9,018 in eight days. Enemy battle casualties were estimated at 890,756 and non-battle losses at 182,278. There were 164,838 captured prisoners of war.

Portland Youth Slays Mother And Himself

PORTLAND — (AP) — Police sought vainly today for the reason why Elwood Fellon, 18, killed his mother with shots from a .22 rifle, then turned the gun on himself.

A startled police dispatcher Thursday got a phone message: "I've just shot my mother. I might or might not be here when police arrive."

Three minutes later a radio-dispatched squad car was at the Fellon home in northeast Portland.

Mrs. Joseph A. Fellon, 39, was dead by the front door.

The son's body was in the basement, the rifle beside his body.

Detective Leonard Shaffer said the father, who arrived home a short time after the shooting, told him he had got the rifle so his son could learn how to handle firearms before a call to military service.

Deputy District Attorney Charles E. Raymond said questioning of the father failed to disclose any "reasonable motive."

200,000 Tickets Seized In Raid On Lotteries

OAKLAND, Calif. — (AP) — Oakland detectives today described the seizure of 200,000 Chinese lottery tickets as "the most important lottery raid in years."

In San Francisco, police said the raid, staged Thursday night, might furnish clues to the Friday night slaying of Der Loak, 58, wealthy Chinese hardware merchant and lottery treasurer. No trace of his slayer has yet been found.

Spokesmen for the district attorney's office said the San Francisco bay area supports some 25 lotteries that gross an estimated \$20,000,000 a year.

New Firehall Must Move In Highway Reroute Plan

NORRISTOWN, Pa. — (AP) — After months of hard work raising funds, residents of nearby Swedesburg finally dedicated a \$50,000 firehouse — complete with kitchen and auditorium — last May.

Now they're told they must move the building to make way for a new highway taking U. S. route 202 around Norristown to relieve traffic congestion here.

They appealed to the state highway department but a spokesman told them the proposed rerouting is the best and probably the cheapest despite the cost of condemnation proceedings for the firehouse and an estimated 80 other buildings. That seems to be the last word.

He said he was attacked by Abney, a former boxer, while on warning.

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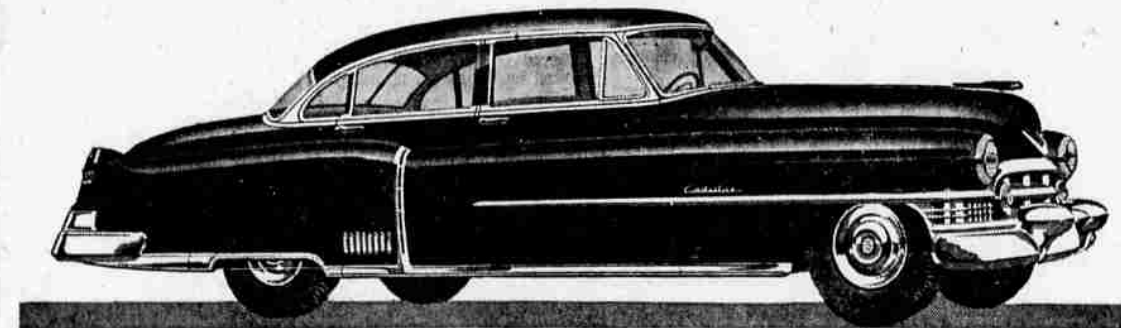
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
