Midwest Floods Bad As Reported, Don Forbes Finds

Flood conditions in the Kansas City area were every bit as bad as described in newspaper accounts, Don Forbes related upon his return to Roseburg last week.

Forbes went through Kansas City enroute to Tulsa, Okla., for the annual board meeting of the International Junior chamber of commerce and dedication of the Jaycee war memorial.

He said his train was the first to go through the flood area after order was restored and trains returned to schedule.

Silt was piled 10 feet deep over some of the tracks. Huge locomotives were whipped around like match sticks, he stated. Many homes were floated away. Railroad workers were still pumping water out of the basement of the station at Kansas City.

Forbes said his trip was interesting, but he still likes Roseburg. The war memorial ceremony at Tulsa took place with temperature at 104 degrees in the shade, he said.

Tulsa is the permanent home of the Junior chamber of commerce and the annual board meeting is

held there. Army Secretary Frank Pace Jr. spoke at the memorial dedication in place of Gen. George C. Marshall, who was scheduled. More than 1000 Jaycee representatives attended the dedication banquet.

Forbes is a national director from Oregon. Other Oregonians who attended were John Lusaas, Eugene, state president, and Leo Chaffin, Portland, a national director. They went by air instead of by train, said Forbes.
