U.S. and Philippines Approve Defense Pact

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treaty "that there will be no doubt in any quarter as to either the fact of peace or as to the terms of peace."

Only minor differences were noted in the new Japanese treaty draft as compared to the last previous version prepared July 20. The only change of any importance pay partial reparations to allied nations who suffered damage and loss of life from the Japanese.

This clause was amended mainly to satisfy objections from the Philippines, Indonesia and Burma. All have hopes for collecting for some of their war losses.

Roseburg Youth Faces Charge Of Delinquency

A 17-year-old Roseburg youth is in jail today under \$500 bail and a 15-year-old Wilbur girl was placed in custody of juvenile authorities after a several-day automobile ride to southern Oregon points involving four teen-agers.

The youth was charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor. The girl faces a parole violation.

The arrests occurred Wednesday after the youth, along with two other teen-age boys, had taken the girl on an automobile trip to Crater lake, Klamath Falls and northern California, according to complaints sworn out by the mother of the girl.

The two other boys have not yet been picked up.

President's Job Not Rosy, Hint From Truman

WASHINGTON — (P) — President Truman said today there are plenty people ambitious to be president, but they don't know what they are getting into.

That was his latest comment on presidential possibilities for 1952, almost a year before the nominating conventions. He didn't name anyone.

At the same time, he admonished reporters that they are working politics to the vanishing point when there are plenty of other things more important to talk about.

He was asked about a previous statement that Eisenhower would not be a candidate on the Democratic ticket. The reporter wanted to know if that was first hand information or just an assumption.

Mr. Truman replied he did not say that, but had said he did not think, with emphasis on think, that Eisenhower would be a candidate on the Democratic ticket.

He was told that Senator Douglas had promised to support him if he were a candidate and was asked whether he would welcome such support. He said he would if he were a candidate.

Asked to comment on a magazine poll in which Douglas was voted the "best senator" and McCarthy the "worst," Mr. Truman said a similar poll was conducted when he was in the Senate and it found him in the same position as the current poll on Douglas. He said he compliments Douglas on being in that position.

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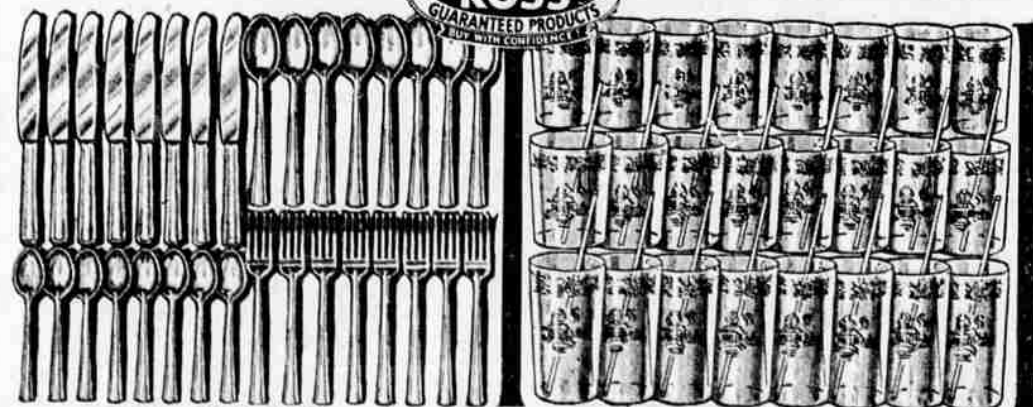


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
