THIS ARTICLE IS ON "NEURITIS"

The disease known as neuritis is one of the most painful and nerve wracking experiences known to mankind. The pain is boring, burning, stabbing and lancinating. The victim is unable to get any rest or sleep. Every movement means suffering. There is loss of power and feeling. There is movement of power and feeling.

A local inflammation of a nerve is called simple neuritis. It is localized in one spot and is usually caused by pressure on a nerve at a point of exit from the spine. Pressure on a nerve located near the surface of the body, such as the shoulder or elbow will result in numbness and tingling. Loss of power and feeling may be present, trembling may even be there.

Repeated constriction and pressure may result in inflammation of the affected nerve. The nerve sheath or neurilemma may squeeze the sensitive nerve fibers and form adhesions. This will aggravate the neuritis and develop a chronic stage. Blows, falls, contusions and long exposure to cold will result in a similar way. The spine should be checked in all cases.

Sciatica and shingles are other examples of neuritis. They are the result of nerve inflammation.

NEURALGIA

The symptoms are paroxysmal pains of a stabbing, burning and darting character in the area of the distribution of a nerve, radiating to the surrounding parts.

Numbness or tingling may precede the pain. The skin may turn red along the affected nerve. Ten-

der spots may be felt where the nerve is near the surface. The paroxysms recur at intervals, reaching a high point, then decrease or may last for a long time.

Inflammation of nerves and their roots in different parts of the body may result in neuralgic pains. Inter-costal neuralgia is often caused by a displaced rib and mistaken for pleurisy. Facial neuralgias are caused by branches of the cranial nerves being irritated.

Sciatic neuralgia is found along the sciatic nerve in the leg and thigh. Metatarsalgia is a painful neuralgia of the foot and may follow injury or broken down arches. There is a painful neuralgia of coccyx known as coccydynia. Gastralgia is often mistaken for chronic appendicitis and colitis and is located in the stomach and intestinal regions. Nephralgia or kidney neuralgia appears in the lower part of the back. An intractable brachial neuralgia can often be traced from the finger tip to back of the neck.

Neuralgia rarely appears before middle age. The victim may show other signs of deterioration or senility. The tenderness can usually be traced to its source, at a point where the nerves exit from the spine. Pressure causes interference with its functions. This area is usually swollen, hot and congested. Congested muscles and taut fibers, causing too much compression where the nerves exit from the spinal column require careful attention.

Mildred Kruse Dies At Eugene

Mildred Kruse, a native of Douglas county, died suddenly early Friday at Eugene.

She was born at Oakland March 3, 1894, the daughter of H. L. and Carrie Kruse. She attended grade school at Oakland and later went to Lansing, Mich., where she finished high school. She also attended the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, from which she was graduated in 1924.

She was one of Douglas county's popular school teachers, having taught for several years both at Lookingglass and at Yoncalla. For the last five years she has taught in the Springfield school.

She was a member of the Baptist church of Springfield.

Surviving are her step-mother, Mrs. Louisa Kruse, Springfield; a brother, Orville, of Roseburg; a nephew, Dale Kruse, Portland; and a number of cousins.

Funeral services are to be held at Oakland Community church Monday at 2 p. m. Interment will follow at the Oakland cemetery.

Stearns mortuary, Oakland, is in charge.

Riddle Slates Annual Rodeo Aug. 25, 26

The spirit of the old West will come to life in Riddle with the opening of the fourth annual rodeo Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 25 and 26.

Ike Orr, general chairman of the Riddle Roping club, says this will be one of the roughest and fastest amateur shows staged in the state this year.

All proceeds from the rodeo will be given to the widows and children of two well-known local men — Alvin Hendricks and Harry King — who were drowned at Winchester bay after their boat capsized July 5. Sunday afternoon, a brief memorial service will be held for the men, who were active in the Riddle Roping club.

Over \$500 has been donated by Riddle merchants to increase the cash awards. There will also be entrance fees, which will go into the prize fund. About 50 cowboys are expected to register for the events that include bronc riding, bareback riding, calf roping, team roping, ribbon tying and cutting horse contests. Entrants for the events must be registered by 8 p. m. Friday, Aug. 24.

Townsend park will be the site of the rodeo, and Orr says the grounds are in "good shape." A queen will be chosen by the committeemen to rule over the celebration.

Opening Of Bids On Two Bridges Is Slated Monday

Bids will be opened at 10 a. m. Monday in the Douglas county court for construction of two county bridges.

One is the Hubbard Creek bridge four miles west of Umpqua. The other is the Glenbrook ridge four miles south of Riddle on the Riddle-Glenbrook loop.

County Engineer F. C. Frear reported Friday that the Hubbard Creek span will be built next to the present bridge in order not to hinder traffic. He said the bridge work would include a 40-foot loop span and 63 feet of approach. Only the construction work will be included in the bid, he said. The materials will be furnished by the county and the Martin Box Co.

Frear reported the condition of the present bridge as bad. He said the decks, stringers and caps were broken and generally deteriorated. It was built in 1937.

The Glenbrook bridge near Riddle was a flood casualty. Construction plans call for erection of one new pier 28 feet high, raising the old pier eight feet and putting in 126 feet of piling approach. Bids on this bridge will include both construction and material.

Further hearings of bids on two smaller bridges near Sutherlin will be held a week later on Monday, Aug. 27, Frear said.

\$1,000 Judgment Issued By Court

A judgment for \$1,000 was issued in circuit court Friday against Lowell M. Anderson.

Plaintiff named was W. A. Gillogly who charged the defendant had tendered a bank draft which the bank allegedly refused to honor. The judgment orders the sale of certain articles of personal property held under a writ of attachment which was seized by the Sheriff's office. The proceeds are to be used for the satisfaction of the judgment, according to the order.

Another action for the recovery of money was started by John J. Rogers against Otto and Maude A. Rahn. The plaintiff asks recovery of \$1,117.89 allegedly due on a demand note which, the complaint states, the defendants refused to pay. The defendants operated a sawmill at Days Creek and the money was loaned for the purpose of continuing the operation, according to the complaint.
