Log Rollers Enter For Competition

A smooth 12-foot birling log arrived at the municipal pool Friday afternoon. It will serve as the unpredictable stage for the log rolling championships of Douglas County.

As part of the Southern Oregon Invitational swimming meet and water carnival sponsored by the Junior chamber of commerce, the contest offers the winner a fully paid trip to the Albany Timber carnival in 1952.

The two preliminaries Saturday night will determine an automatic finalist for the Sunday championship bout. Every birler but the Saturday champion will vie Sunday for the chance to roll with him in the finals. The Sunday preliminary winner meets him for the county diadem.

An impressive list of birlers have already signed up, according to an article in the Douglas Fir. It reports that men have entered from Sun Studs Lumber Co., Umpqua Plywood, Associated Plywood and Fir Manufacturing Co. Road Considered For Connecting Sutherlin, Glide

A short-route road that would connect the communities of Sutherlin-Oakland and Glide was considered at a meeting of a short-route committee and the county court Wednesday at 10 a. m. in the courthouse.

County Commissioner L. Beckley explained that little progress has been made because the county engineers and surveyors have been busy on other projects during the summer.

The committee said the road would make O and C timber available to Sutherlin - Oakland and would serve residents of both communities that now have to travel via Roseburg.

Oregon's Traffic Death Toll In July Below Forecast

Oregon traffic accidents killed 31 people during July, a report from the state traffic safety division says.

The count fell considerably short of the division's prediction that at least 50 people would be killed during the month, but still brought the seven month death toll to 221, as compared to 203 during the same period in 1950.

The division said that July is usually one of the deadliest traffic accident months, due to increased vacation travel, and noted that last July 56 people were killed.

July's slump indicates that most drivers applied common-sense driving rules, but the division hastened to point out that it will take more than one "light" death month to bring the count down to the same level as last year.

August will tell the tale, the division said. If the count remains light Oregon's final toll will probably be about the same as last year, when 427 were killed. If August traffic deaths soar, however, there is a strong chance that the year-end count will show 450 or more killed in traffic mishaps. August last year became the worst in Oregon traffic history, with 59 killed in street and highway smash-ups.

SOLTERS GETS CHECK

PITTSBURGH — Not long ago a group of former Pittsburgh Pirates, along with pitcher Bob Feller of the Cleveland Indians, played the Pirates an exhibition for the benefit of Julius Solters.

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Big Racers Will Battle On Sunday

The Douglas County Fairgrounds race track will draw the largest field of cars ever seen there this Sunday, according to a report from Frank Diver Friday night.

The list of 25 cars include 11 from Washington and 14 from the Oregon circuits. The super-powered Indianapolis type cars will be piloted by some of the best men in the business, such as Gordy Livingston, Howard Osborn, Paul Pold, Louis Tolstead and Lew Florence.

But all eyes will be on Bob Gregg and his new 220 Offenhauser-powered speed wagon. It's the third competitive appearance for the big car. In its latest showing last Sunday, the car was driven by Gregg to the winning spot at the 100-mile Governor's race at Reno, Nev.

Top Canadian Drivers Here

Also bolstering the program is the appearance of two of Canada's top drivers. They are Bob Simpson and Dave Cooper from Victoria, B. C.

This field of drivers, the best the Northwest has to offer, inaugurates Indianapolis type big car racing on the local half-mile oval. It's the first time in the history of Roseburg that the large cars have performed.

Spectators will get a chance to see how the fairgrounds dirt track meets the challenge of more speed than it's ever seen. Time trials start at 1:30 p.m. with heats and trophy races to follow. Following the races, the show will be topped off with the second "Destruction Derby" pitting six reclaimed old cars spilling and crashing until only one remains.
