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der asserted that the leaders of the sitdown were among the men who were not assigned to jobs. Governor Backs Warden Gov. Douglas McKay has given his official backing to the warden's stand saying it was "ridiculous" for the convicts to be trying to dictate prison policy.

All usual Sunday prison activities were canceled including church services and a baseball game. Guards continued to search the prison grounds. More gasoline was found, bringing the total to nearly 40 gallons. No trace was found, however, of 30 knives reported missing from the prison cannery.

A force of 28 workers from the State hospital took over operations at the prison cannery today. Supplies of green beans have been mounting in cool storage, awaiting processing, since the strike started. The prison's recreation director, Robert Likins, resigned over the weekend. Prison officials said the resignation had nothing to do with the strike. However, Likins' friends in Salem reported that a clash of opinions over penitentiary policy had resulted in the move. Convict leaders had expressed confidence in Likins and approval of his recreation program.

Armistice Anticipated, General Bradley Says

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Omar N. Bradley says "we Americans are anticipating an armistice" in Korea.

The chairman of the joint chiefs of staff did not elaborate on this remark made at a time when word from Kaesong indicated that the cease-fire negotiations were slipping back toward a pattern of deadlock. Despite the hope for peace, Bradley said there should be no letdown in the national defense effort else "we have lost the time our valiant soldiers, airmen and marines have bought for us."

KLAMATH FALLS — (AP) — Roy Walter Peters, 66-year-old railroad worker and resident of Klamath Falls, died in an automobile crash Sunday on Quartz mountain, just inside the Lake county line. He was alone when his car plunged off the highway and into a canyon. Lake Sheriff Tom Elliott said Peters was known to have been carrying several hundred dollars but that his wallet was missing. A 22-cal. pistol was also missing, but other expensive guns and fishing tackle were found in the wreckage.

Two Northwest States Battling Bad Forest Fires

Forest fires, spurred by winds and high temperatures, covered more than 15,000 acres of Pacific Northwest timberlands today.

Near Portland, Ore., Sunday, the little suburban residential community of Bonny Slope was partially evacuated as a forest fire threatened to encircle the 250 homes. Inadequate water supply made fighting the blaze difficult. The fire crossed had set up an emergency station in a nearby school to care for the homeless. The fire spread from a small blaze which started Saturday in the Portland city limits.

Largest blaze in the Northwest was to the south in the Siuslaw national forest, southwest of Eugene, Ore., an estimated 8,000 to 10,000 acres were charred in the blaze which started Friday. It still was out of control Sunday night as 500 loggers attempted to ditch a fire line around it.

Washington Also Struck
There were three major fires in Washington state.

The little city of Newhalem in the northwest section of the state was threatened by a 2,000-acre forest blaze Sunday. Flames were halted, however, by a backfire. A second 2,000-acre fire covered an area adjoining a stand of virgin timber in the Lake Cavanaugh area. Washington's third uncontrolled fire was in the coastal district on Grays Harbor. It had covered 350 acres and still was out of control.

To the south in California, fires struck dry timber and brushlands. Two mountain towns in Auburn and Placer counties were threatened before crews checked the fast-moving blaze.

There were 40 lightning-started fires, three of them out of control and covering more than 600 acres in the Mendocino national forest.

Other fires in California covered some 5,000 acres.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A one-time professional boxer has been put on the FBI's list of ten most wanted criminals. He is Clachino Anthony Baccolla, 34. The FBI said he boxed under the name of Jack Fiore in 1933-36. Baccolla is wanted in Detroit for the murder of Albert Swartz, a jeweler, May 17, 1951.

Juanita Quigley, who was appearing before the cameras when she was only three, is studying canon law today in the San Vicente novitiate. There she is known as Sister Quenita Rita of the Catholic Daughters of Mary and Joseph.

Her mother, Mrs. Wayne Quigley, said Juanita decided more than a year ago that movies and television and other things that had occupied her time, were not providing the challenge in life that she needed.

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Bus Plan Stands, S. P. Announces

MEDFORD — Southern Pacific company still intends to substitute fast bus service for a passenger train between Grants Pass, Or., and Dunsmuir, Cal. J. H. Pruett Jr., Portland, Southern Pacific passenger agent, answering a Medford inquiry, said plans have not been changed. Because of prohibitive operating loss from the train service, Pruett stated, a guaranteed, modern bus service must be used. It would offer faster service and connect with the Shasta Daylight at Dunsmuir. Southern Pacific announced its intention recently to discontinue the trains soon. Ashland, Or., and Yreka, Cal., sources said the company might reconsider its decision. The trains have operated 14 months and Southern Pacific said the loss averaged "upwards of \$360 per day."

School Clinic Set At Camas Valley

The Camas Valley pre-school clinic will be held September 4 at 1:30 p.m. at the school, for all children entering school for the first grade and also the ninth grade. Dr. George Lenz of Roseburg will be the examining physician. He will be assisted by Mrs. Barrett, county health nurse, and the teachers.

All first graders must be accompanied by their parents, and it is necessary for them to have a birth certificate stating that the child will be six years of age before Nov. 15.

This proof of age must be shown before the child can enter school. Also, if students do not attend the health examination on Sept. 4, they will have to get an examination from their own doctor, according to Marlen Yoder, superintendent-principal.

The school buses will start at approximately 12:30 on Sept. 4 to pick up parents and children, according to last year's regular runs.

REV. JOHN EVANS DIES

SALEM — (AP) — The Rev. John Evans, 84, retired Methodist pastor, died here Sunday. He suffered a stroke. Until his retirement 10 years ago, he served for 30 years as secretary of the Columbia River conference.

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
