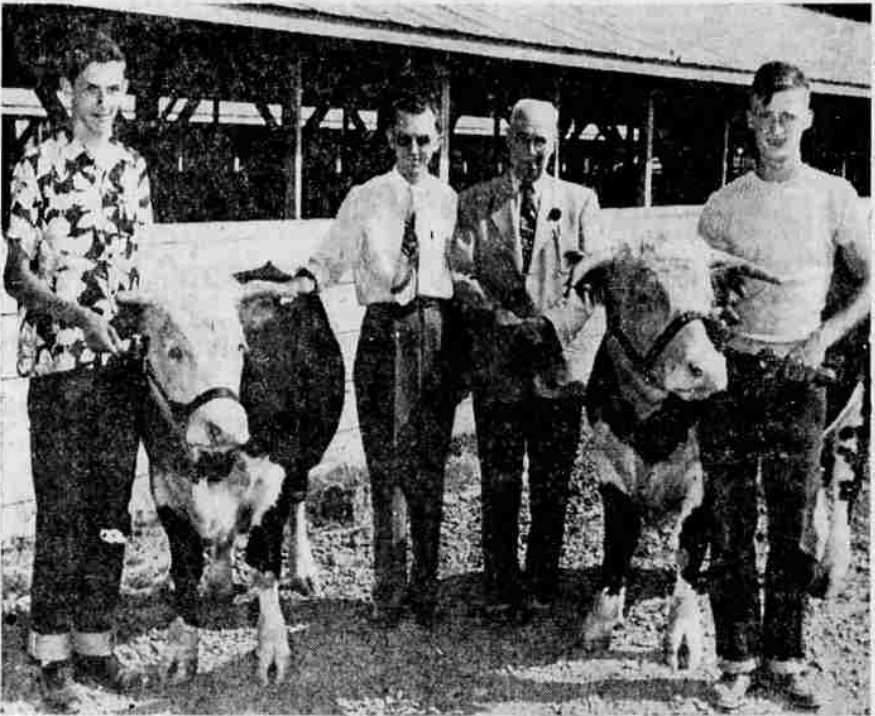

West Coast Phone Strike Ends, PTT Strike Holds

SEATTLE — (AP) — The strike against the West Coast telephone company ended last night. Scattered picketing continued, however, in the state's other telephone labor dispute, which involves the much bigger Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

West Coast Telephone company service was back to normal today in Everett and the smaller cities the firm serves in western Washington, Oregon and northern California.

The return-to-work order came after an unofficial tally of the ratification vote on a negotiating committee agreement. Lloyd S. Smith, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (AFL) leader, said the settlement gives workers an 8-cent hourly pay boost from July 1. He said it provides for an added 4 cents No. 1 or when approved by the Wage Stabilization board, whichever is earlier.

North Santiam Salmon Gassed
SALEM — (AP) — Ammonia discharged into the river at Detroit dam probably has wiped out this year's salmon brood in the north Santiam.

That was the statement Friday of Arne Suomela, Oregon master fish warden. He termed the loss a "major catastrophe."

A spokesman for the Detroit dam contractors said the ammonia found its way to the river from a ditch carrying off waste from a refrigeration system. Russell Hoffman, general superintendent of the consolidated builders, estimated the proportion of ammonia to river water at not more than one part to 200,000. The flow of the chemical has been halted, he said.
