

Soldat Gorky And Buck Davidson Matched In Grudge Battle

There is going to be a feud in Saturday night, the Roseburg armory arena. The Russian Wolfman, Soldat Gorky, smoldering over the officiating of Buck Davidson during his title match with Frank Stojack, has challenged the veteran grappler to a 45-minute, two-out-of-three-falls battle. Gorky jumped Davidson in the dressing room immediately after the match and a brawl was barely averted.

Davidson, who did an excellent job of officiating, claims that he didn't show any favoritism during the match. But Gorky maintains that he was all over him and the interference kept him from winning the championship.

It adds up to a grudge match that probably won't go the limit. Buck will be pitting his surfboard against Gorky's "wolfleap" and flying fists.

Looks Like Boxer
Gordon Hessel, commonly called the "boy bandit from New Mexico," will tangle with Danno McDonald in the bottom half of the double main event. Hessel, who glides around the ring in a boxer's stance, which is the remnant of his boxing days, is always in good shape and moves like a big cat. McDonald, the little Scotchman, is fast and clean. Lately he has been wowing television fans in the Puget Sound area with his high-flying tactics. If Hessel gets

rough with McDonald, he had better have his guard up because the fiery little Scotchman will be swinging right back.

Matchmaker Elton Owen says this is "undoubtedly one of the outstanding matches of the season for color and action."

Jack Carter, the rugged, ruddy-complexioned New Zealander, will meet fast-improving Dale Kiser in the opening bout. Kiser, a 20-year-old upcoming grappler, will be the favorite of Roseburg fans. His speed offsets the weight and experience of most men he has battled.

Ringside tickets are on sale at Powell's and another full house is expected.

PCL Schedules Governor's Playoff

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — The Pacific Coast league is reinstituting the Governor's Cup playoffs and the semifinal series will start Sept. 11.

The first and third place teams will face each other in one semifinal, the second and fourth place clubs in the other, in best two out of three game series. The winners of these series will meet in a three-out-of-five series or the Governor's cup.

Players on the pennant winning team and on the club winning the playoff will get 35 1-3 percent of the Governor's cup fund; runner-up in the finals will get 16 2-3 percent and players in each of the clubs eliminated in the semifinals get 8 1-3 percent of the fund.

The Governor's cup series was not held last year. Hollywood won the last one in 1949 after winning the pennant.

Hard working Bill Ayers, Georgia's contribution to the Oakland pitching staff, is the first Pacific Coast hurler to win 20 games.

He steered the Oaks to a 9 to 1 decision over Sacramento last night striking out six, issuing two passes and a wild pitch, that bested Bob Gillespie, the ace of the lowly SACS' staff. Roy Weatherly gave Ayers strong batting support with three doubles.

In Los Angeles, Seattle's Marv Grissom, another workhorse, notched his 19th pitching victory as the league pace-makers won from the Angels, 6 to 1. Grissom actually was behind, 0-1, to Los Angeles' Bob Spicer when he was lifted for a pinch-hitter in the eighth, but his teammates put on a six-run rally and sewed up the game for him. Gordy Goldsberry's three-run hit was the big blow.

Similarly, Lou Stringer's three-run homer gave Hollywood a 6 to 3 decision over San Diego. The win let the Stars seven games behind Seattle. Jack Graham hit his 23rd round tripper with two on for all the San Diego tallies.

Linde twirled a four-hitter for Portland to beat San Francisco, 5 to 1. Joe Rossi, Beaver catcher, homered in the sixth and batted in another run later.

The managers' battling "championship" between Rogers Hornsby of Seattle and Stan Hack of Los Angeles ended in a draw. Both got four hits on 10 tries but Hornsby got a big round of applause after his last try when the announcer asked "How's that for a fellow who quit playing about 20 years ago?" The batting exhibition preceded the game.

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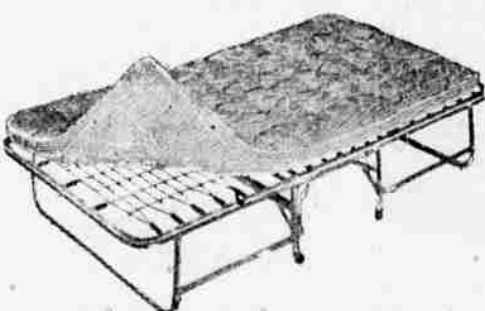
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
