Elgarose Homes' Toll In Fire Rises To 19

None of the fires covers more than four acres.

Wary firefighters continued their battle today against scores of Pacific Northwest forest fires. Twenty-two new fires broke out in Washington Wednesday. One of them had covered 400 acres by evening.

In Oregon, the fire which has blackened 20,000 acres in the Vincent creek area of west central Oregon burned furiously over hundreds of acres more as it advanced on its north and east fronts Wednesday night.

Most of the lightning-set fires in southern Oregon and California are under control; foresters reported.

Thirty-two fires in British Columbia were being fought by 1,600 men.

Seventy-five uncontrolled fires raged across northern California range and timberland amid reports more lightning-set blazes can be expected.

Electrical storms, without rain, bombarded the powder-dry state for the fifth straight day Wednesday, touching off five new fires in Mendocino national forest alone.

More than 8,000 men, including Indian fire experts and state prisoners, are fighting the fires.

California's five-day toll of storm-set blazes reached 634, state and federal officials reported. Except for the 75 unchecked fires, all of these were extinguished or under control.

Light showers fell Wednesday at Reedsport and bordering the Vincent creek fire, but state police said no rain fell in the area where the blaze was burning. But the precipitation, coupled with cloudy skies, brought an increase in humidity, which was expected to aid fire-fighters.

There was that the action was possibly dictated from Moscow. Hong Kong dispatches commented a resumption of fighting in Korea would relieve Red Chinese pressure on southeast Asia.

If full war is resumed, U. N. commanders have expressed confidence their forces can meet any Red onslaught. "We'll slaughter them," field officers said.

Allied troops are dug in on the best positions they have ever held in Korea.

They are in positions where the U. N. command wanted them to remain during a truce. The Reds wanted them to retreat to below the 38th parallel. Armistice negotiations had been snagged on this point for a month. A subcommittee was trying to solve it.



CPL. CARL W. YEUST, above, 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Yeust of Azaia, distinguished himself by gallantry in action near Kunja-ri, Korea, on May 24, 1951, according to his commanding officer. Acting as a collecting point ambulance driver, Yeust volunteered to drive his vehicle into an enemy-controlled pass to reach wounded who had been marooned. He made two trips through the pass although the enemy concentrated fire on him and bullets shattered his windshield. His heroic action was directly responsible for saving the lives of many wounded who would have perished without the prompt medical attention they received, the army communication said.

Polio Incidence Upped Over Pace Last Year

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The public health service reports there were 1,765 new cases of polio last week, 16 percent more than in the previous week.

In the corresponding week a year ago there were 1,488 new cases.

A substantial increase was reported in the west north central states—242 new cases, compared with 138 the previous week. In this group, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas accounted for most of the rise.

Since the seasonal low point last March there have been 8,908 polio cases, compared with 9,090 for the corresponding period last year and 16,374 at this time in 1949.

BOY FEARED DROWNED

GRESHAM — (AP) — A 15-year-old boy, son of Idaho tourists, was believed drowned in a fall into the Sandy river near here Wednesday.

He is Verl Ingren Price, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Price of Idaho Falls.

The boy fell from the top of a 60-foot cliff where he was walking with a younger brother. A futile search at the bottom of the cliff led sheriff's deputies to believe he had fallen into the river.

Convicts Back At Work At Oregon Penitentiary

SALEM — (AP) — Convicts were back at work at Oregon state prison today, their eight-day sit-down strike ended.

The prisoners struck Tuesday of last week. They said guard Lt. Morris Race used brutality in breaking up a fight between two convicts. After two days, Warden George Alexander locked prisoners in their cells and cut off their meals.

Race, over whom the trouble started, was "on vacation." Alexander said. When he returns, he will be assigned—at least temporarily—to work outside the walls. The convicts said they wouldn't go back to work if Race remained inside the prison.

Two men, who Alexander said were ringleaders of the strike, still were in solitary last night. The striking convicts had demanded that they be released from solitary as a condition of returning to work.

MacArthur Urges Japan To Guard Against Reds

NEW YORK — (AP) — General Douglas MacArthur, in a letter to Japanese Prime Minister Yoshida, has called for "adequate security forces" to protect Japan against the threat of outside attack.

The letter, dated Aug. 20 and made public today, also predicts that the Japanese nation, under the terms of the peace treaty, will join the free world in combatting communism.

MacArthur's letter was in response to a July 13 note from the prime minister which expressed gratitude for the general's efforts in behalf of an early peace treaty for Japan.

The general did not say whether the security forces should consist of American or Japanese troops.

The state unemployment compensation commission Wednesday filed suit against James R. Daugherty for \$122.04 and interest on allegedly unpaid employer contributions.

MORALS CHARGE FACED

Right Of Way For Sewer Sought In Town's Suit

Construction of a sewer system in Myrtle Creek is being held up because of difficulty in obtaining right of way from a property owner, according to a condemnation suit filed Wednesday in circuit court.

Filed by the town of Myrtle Creek against Ruby Coryell, the complaint asks for immediate possession of the land. The suit was authorized Tuesday by the Myrtle Creek city council.

Myrtle Creek is now ready to begin work on the sewer system which must be completed before fall rains set in, the complaint states. The plaintiff further alleges that machinery is idle as a result of inability to secure easement or right-of-way.

The town has offered Miss Coryell \$90 for the property. She asked for \$500, perpetual waiving of a monthly sewer user tax and free installation of her private sewer line, the complaint alleges.

WIFE ACCUSES HUSBAND

Carl Richard Knox, 39, Canyonville, waived preliminary hearing in district court Wednesday and is being held under \$1,500 bail on a charge of threatening the commission of a felony, Judge A. J. Geddes said.

Knox was arrested by a deputy on a complaint signed by his wife.

Roseburg Gets Rain Drops, Lower Temperature

A few drops of rain fell in Roseburg yesterday about 3 p.m. but the weatherman sees no prospect of more of the same today or in the five-day forecast.

What fell was nothing more than a trace—the third trace to be recorded since May 23. No measurable amount of rain has been recorded in that period.

A passing cold front caused the brief shower as it brought in some cold, moist maritime air, said the weather bureau. Temperatures will be cooler today, but warmer again tomorrow.
