Some political observers have speculated his age might rule him out of consideration in any Democratic search for a possible successor to President Truman-should Mr. Truman decide not to run. He thinks a Democratic ticket headed by President Truman could win in 1952. But he has 'no infor-mation whatever'' as to Mr. Tru-man's intentions. He added, how-ever, that should the President de-cide to run ''as a matter of public duty. . . he can and undoubtedly will be nominated, and, in my opin-ion, will be elected."
