Catholic Rites On Sunday Taboo

PATNA, India — (AP) — This is a summer of important "firsts" for 43-year-old Father John Barrett of Chicago and his 90-odd American associates in famine-stricken Bihar state.

For the first time since the exile of the Capuchin fathers in 1769, the government of the kingdom of Nepal regarded as a Communist infiltration target, has invited three Jesuits into the border state. They will open a high school in the capital city of Khatmandu.

In an equally unprecedented step the Patna mission has launched India's first Catholic weekly newspaper in the vernacular Hindi language.

nobles and located ten miles from Khatmandu, have been donated by the government for the school at Khatmandu.

As head of the project the Patna mission has assigned Father Marshall Moran, 45, also of Chicago, a 25-year veteran of education work in India. Under his direction, St. Xavier's school in Patna has attracted an annual enrollment of 600, including many sons of Bihar and Nepalese first families. Father Moran is assisted in Khatmandu by Father Frank Murphy of Cincinnati and Father Edwin Saxton of Sacramento, Calif.

Altogether the Patna mission operates four boys high schools with a total enrollment of 1500. All take the British Cambridge examinations at the end of their courses. Since the days in the twenties when Father Barrett and Father Moran arrived in Bihar, the province's Catholic population has jumped from 5,000 to 30,000.

"It is still growing," Father Barrett comments. He hopes the vernacular newspaper "Sanjivan" — meaning "one who gives life" — will eventually reach 20,000 paid subscribers and serve as a potent vehicle of Catholic education.

Red Youth Peace Whoopee Brande 'Near Disaster'

BERLIN — (AP) Official Western observers plan to label the Communist peace festival a "near disaster" for communism in reports to their governments.

The festival wound up a two-week stand last night in a blaze of hate for the United States with half a million blue-shirted youths chanting allegiance to Stalin.

Despite the mass hysteria whipped up by the Reds, western observers were unimpressed.

They drew three main conclusions from the activities of the past weeks during which about 2,000,000 Red-indoctrinated kids visited East Berlin. At least 1,000,000 of these are estimated to have visited the West to sight-see, for political reasons or just to pick up a square meal at one of the U. S. or British canteens.

1. East German Communist youths were exposed to West Berlin in such numbers, and liked it so well that they may flood their homes behind the Iron curtain with pro-Western feeling.

2. Many delegates from the satellite nations, restricted to the Soviet sector of divided Berlin, were impressed by the fact that the cause of communism has been stopped cold at the border and hasn't the ideological strength to push westward.

3. The lack of enthusiasm among German youth cast a sharp reflection on the party indoctrination and the men responsible for it.

Anti-Communist West Berliners spiced the final rally by sending over small balloons which opened and scattered anti-Red pamphlets through the crowd. These were eagerly scooped up even though the Communist police grabbed them as quickly as they could.

East German Communist Premier Grotewohl, in his windup speech, declared that the Red's would strike at and sabotage West Europe's defense preparations.

His violent attack was typical of those which have marked the "peace" festival whose official theme was "against remilitarization and for a peace treaty for all Germany in 1951."

Peiping is divided into the Chinese City on the south and the Tatar City on the north.

The grounds of Townsend park are in "good shape" for the opening of the fourth annual Riddle Rodeo Saturday, reports Ike Orr, general chairman of committees.

He says this will be one of the best amateur shows staged in the state this year. More than 50 cowboys are expected to be reistered when the contests begin Saturday afternoon at 2.

A special memorial service will be held Sunday afternoon for two local men — Alvis Hendricks and Harry King — who were drowned at Winchester bay July 5. The widows and children of the two men will receive all proceeds from the two-day celebration.

Riddle merchants have collected \$500 dollars, which will be added to the entrance fees as cash awards for winners of the rodeo events.

The grand parade will begin Saturday morning at 10:30. At 2 in the afternoon the contests will be held at Townsend park, and Saturday evening a dance will be held in the streets of Riddle.

Sheriff's posses from Roseburg, Medford and Grants Pass will be represented at the park when the fete begins.
