A big street parade is scheduled on Monday, Sept. 3, starting at 10:30 a.m. Three cash prizes will be awarded.

Dances are planned the nights of Sept. 1 and 2 at John's Curve, sponsored by the Saddle Pals. The king and queen Don Hillard and Billie Jean Moss—have been selected to reign over the two-day affair. They will be accompanied by their princesses.

Stock for the rodeo events will be furnished by Blackie Smith and Walt Mask.

Rodeo events include bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, Brahma bull riding, calf roping, cow daubing, ribbon tying, kiddies' calf scramble, ladies' horse race and stock horse race.

Marshall Says Korea Proof Of Rus Intentions

TORONTO — (AP) — U. S. Defense Secretary George C. Marshall says Korea gives conclusive proof that it is futile to expect any sincerity in Russia's peace offer. Marshall made this statement yesterday when he arrived yesterday to open the 72nd annual Canadian national exhibition. He is the first American ever to be chosen for this honor.

"In this business in Korea," he said in his opening address, "we find conclusive proof of the futility of expecting sincerity in the pursuit of peace on the part of the Soviet government."

He praised Canada's "significant contribution" to the U. N. forces in Korea and her help in forming the United Nations and the Atlantic Pact.

Three Governors Predict Major Election Issues

FRENCH LICK, Ind. — (AP) — Three midwestern governors today placed public morals, inflation, and world peace as major issues in the 1952 election campaign.

The governors are Henry F. Schrickler of Indiana, Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, and G. Mennen Williams of Michigan.

They talked to newsmen and spoke at a public radio interview late last night at a midwest conference of Democratic leaders. The conference, at the French Lick Springs hotel, will end tonight with an address by Vice President Barkley.

Treaty With West Urged By Influential Egyptian

CAIRO, Egypt — (AP) — Hafez Afifi Pasha, president of the powerful Mizr bank, today urged Egypt to line up with the west in a treaty with the United States and Britain.

Afifi Pasha, in a lengthy statement to the influential newspaper Al-Ahram, defended the 1936 Anglo-Egyptian treaty which has been under violent attack here. He called it a "step towards independence." And urged a settlement of all outstanding disputes with Britain.

40 Rescued Ship Crewmen Safe Aboard A Freighter

NEW YORK — (AP) — Forty crewmen and one stowaway, who were rescued in the Atlantic last night after abandoning a Spanish freighter, today were safe aboard another freighter bound for Philadelphia.

The 41 persons took to lifeboats when their vessel, the 3,688-ton Castillo Guadalest, sprang a leak in her No. 2 cargo hold. The cause of the leak has not been determined.

The survivors, picked up about 740 miles southeast of New York by the Honduran freighter Eurythia, all were described in good condition.

4 Portland Businessmen Killed In Liner Crash

PORTLAND — (AP) — Friends of four Portland businessmen who were killed in yesterday's United Air Line crash near Oakland, Calif., were there today in an effort to complete identification and collect personal effects.

The crash killed Dean Johnson and Ernest E. Johnson, the heads of C. D. Johnson Lumber company; Eric P. Van, accountant; and Robert T. Petrie, western sales manager for a paper machinery firm. Petrie was on the plane only by chance—his plane from Cincinnati to Chicago was late and he missed the plane he intended to take. The other three were on the San Francisco-bound plane only because they couldn't get a reservation on the Chicago-Portland direct flight.

This was only part of the group. Several other families moved about a month ago to Healdsburg, where Witcher has a five-year cutting stand of timber.

A regular community, with homes, grocery store, gas station and post office is being established by Witcher. He will erect two and three bedroom cabins, according to Mrs. Arthur Selby, Glide and Idle-ville correspondent.

Rescuers Start Rescue Of Hurricane Victims

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — Rescuers set out from Tampico this morning to pick up marooned villagers as floods threatened the gulf coast oil port and a new storm neared the west coast.

The floodwaters, aftermath of Wednesday's killer hurricane, cut the Pan American highway from Laredo, Texas, to Mexico City at El Limon, north of El Mante. Rescue workers left Tampico with launches to take the inhabitants out of rooftops and out of trees where they had spent the night.

U. S. Sabres Win Huge Jet Battle

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea — (AP) — Flashing U. S. F-86 Sabres won a 51-Jet sky fight over northwest Korea today—the second in two days.

The 21 Sabres damaged at least one MIG-15 in a brief but aggressive action with 30 enemy jets near Sinuiju, northwestern Korea border city.

Last night 26 Sabres tangled briefly with 40 MIG-15s over Sinanju, midway between the border and the North Korean capital of Pyongyang. The Sabres shot down two MIGs.

No Sabres were reported lost in either action.

A school bus will be provided for parents and children coming to the clinic and will begin the regular run about 12:30 p.m., according to Marlen Yoder, superintendent.

Preventing River Pollution Is Aim Of Organization

The Umpqua Basin Improvement association was the name selected by an enthusiastic group of landowners meeting at the Roseburg Rod and Gun club building at Winchester Tuesday evening, for creating a corporation for improving and protecting the lands in the area for sanitary and agricultural purposes.

Dr. George J. Halladay was elected president of the new association; Harold Hoyt, vice-president; Thomas C. Hatfield, secretary; and Anita C. Stark, treasurer.

Ten directors will be elected by the members of the association at a meeting to be held at the Rod and Gun club Tuesday evening, Aug. 28. John Amacher, W. R. Denton and W. C. Thurlow were appointed as a nominating committee to propose names for the directorship.

The new association plans on guiding the improvement and development of the Umpqua basin in line with the public policy of the state of Oregon to preserve the natural purity of the water of the rivers, streams, lakes and watersheds of the state in the interest of public welfare, for the protection and conservation of the public health, and recreational enjoyment of the people, and for the protection and conservation of fish, aquatic life, and migratory birds, and to foster and encourage the cooperation of the people, of industries, of cities and towns, in preventing and controlling the pollution of the waters.

John Amacher reported to the membership that with the most modern means of control a paper mill located on the Umpqua would discharge into the water daily the equivalent of sewage produced by a city of 100,000 inhabitants.

Telegraph Rates Slated For Hike

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Telegraph rates are going up, and that 10-worder which so often ended with "love" is going out. In most cases, the exact amount of the rate increase remains to be worked out. But the minimum charge will be for 15 words instead of the present 10.

The federal communications commission (FCC) late yesterday approved as too high proposed rate schedules filed by the Western Union Telegraph company and designed to yield \$11,000,000 net revenue.

However, the FCC agreed the company needs up to \$9,800,000 more revenue as a result of a July 1 wage increase.

As a result of the FCC action, the company must start all over and draft new schedules. If they meet with FCC approval they will be allowed to go into effect promptly.

3 Local War Veterans Dock In San Francisco

Three Korean war veterans, who are from this area, arrived in San Francisco Friday, aboard the transport Gen. John Pope waspato, according to the Associated Press. The ship was carrying 429 army and air force men returning from duty in the Far East.
