Tiny Isle Off Vancouver Swept By Deadly Fire

VANCOUVER, B. C. — (AP) — Whipped to a fury by a freak gale, a forest fire brought death and destruction to a tiny island off Vancouver Island.

A 50-mile-an-hour gale lashed smoldering fires into new life Monday, causing the death of a logger and heavy property damage.

Women and children were forced to flee their homes in an isolated logging camp as a wall of fire cut a path from one side of the island to the other, a distance of seven miles at the widest point.

Logging machinery, household effects and camp buildings, valued at thousands of dollars, were destroyed.

The flames were fed by large stores of gasoline in three logging camps which suffered almost total destruction.

At the same time the fire raged across the island, at Victoria a 90-day drought was ended with a heavy downpour of rain.

It followed widespread rain on the mainland, where the drought, starting early in June, has taken heavy toll of farm crops and in the forests.

The rain had not been forecast by the weatherman, he said nature may have been given a little help by a crew of RCAF rain-makers.

The gale-forced winds brought new life to other fires on Vancouver Island, far to the north of Victoria, and lightning strikes also caused new fire damage.
