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## Herbert Hoover Warns Of Public Life Decadence

thousands of Iowans assembled at the state fair and broadcast nationally. Preceding his address he accepted "the Iowa award." It was the first plaque and scroll presented by the Iowa centennial memorial commission for distinguished citizenship.

In following the theme "concerning honor in public life," the former Republican president did not specifically mention the Democratic administration which followed his own. Although he cited numerous happenings since he left White House, he said near the start:

"Let me say at once that honor is not the exclusive property of any political party."

National Danger: Suicide Hoover reviewed many incidents, then commented repeatedly "think about it." He said: "Our greatest danger is not from invasion by foreign armies. Our dangers are that we may commit suicide from within by complacency with evil. Or by public tolerance of scandalous behaviors or by cynical acceptance of dishonor."

Turning to what he termed "the flight from honor," Hoover said "during the recent past we have had a flood of exposures by congressional committees, by state legislatures, by grand juries in scores of cities, and the press."

He said he sometimes wonders what the founding fathers would say about "the five percenters, mink coats, deep freezers, and free hotels? Or favoritism in government loans and government contracts?"

"Or failures to prosecute evildoers who spread cancerous rackets and gambling rings with their train of bribed officials? Or of those who coquette with traitorship? Or of secret and disastrous commitments of our nation which were denied at the time?"

Freedom Abroad Sold Hoover referred to secret commitments at Tehran and Yalta as having "sold the freedom of half a billion people down the river," asked whether the commitments would have been approved by the people, then commented:

"That is where we lost the peace and wandered into the land of hot and cold wars."

He suggested that the nation turn to the ten commandments, the Sermon on the Mount, and the "rules of the game which we learned at our mother's knee," and asked: "can a nation live if these are not the guides of public life?"

Policy For Free Asia Urgent Need, Gov. Dewey Says

NEW YORK K—Gov. Dewey, back from a tour of the Far East, says the United States should "draw a line and let the Communists know what we will do if they cross it."

He says southeast Asia is "the natural target for the Communists' next drive."

"Our immediate and critical necessity," he says, "is to build a total policy for a free world of Asia."

The Republican standard bearer contends that in order to maintain a free Asia the U. S. must "build a strong and firm policy with every ally we can get, to see that there are no more losses to the free world."

Dewey gave his views to newsmen as he arrived by plane last night after a two-month personal fact-finding tour of the Far East, Australia and Alaska.

The governor, who visited Korea, said "we invited the attack on Korea by announcing that it was not in our defense perimeter, and withdrawing our troops. We lost China to the free world."

Commenting on the breakdown of Korean truce talks, he said: "Personally, I think the Communists want a truce because they need it. They have taken a terrible beating." But, he added, "nobody knows what the Communists will do."

that he was advised that the academy that the honor code required him to inform on fellow cadets who cheated.

Daru asked Hart if it ever was suggested by West Point officials that he could go to prison for cheating.

"Yes, it was," Hart replied. Five other former cadets were present at the committee hearing. One of them, Peter Hierman, 20, of Rochester, N. Y., said he was told he had to testify against academy classmates, but that he had not been advised he could implicate himself by testifying against others.

Eighty-two of the accused cadets have left the academy, the spokesman said, with 73 getting administrative discharges (neither honorable nor dishonorable) and the papers of the other nine forwarded to Washington for final action.

Suit Asks Judgment On Promissory Note Jessie Vierling filed suit in circuit court Wednesday against Kay and O. E. Goodwin and Clarence F. and Leona P. Sleimen.

The plaintiff declares that a balance of \$1,633.33 remains to be paid to her on a promissory note. She reports that the defendants O. E. and Kay Goodwin delivered to her on March 8, 1948, a note for \$3000. To secure the payment, the complaint states that a mortgage deed was filed on property southwest of Olalla belonging to the defendants.

The plaintiff charges that on Sept. 19, 1949, the defendants conveyed the property to Clarence F. and Leona P. Sleimen. The complaint asks a prior lien on the property since the balance has not been paid. If it is not paid, the plaintiff asks that the property be foreclosed.

On the ground United Nations troops hacked out limited gains along the eastern front. Red counterattacks were smashed back.

The navy announced its warships, using "sniper like tactics," helped "embattled ROK (Republic of Korea) troops fighting to consolidate their positions" on the east coast by shelling Red concentrations. Guns of two British frigates cleared Reds out of a west coast village south of Kaesong, site of now disrupted truce talks.

Warplanes flew 869 sorties Wednesday and followed up with 90 raids through the night.

The air force reported two jets were lost Wednesday. An Australian twin jet Meteor was shot down by a Russian type MIG-15. An American F-80 Shooting Star was brought down by ground fire.

WASHINGTON—AP—Announced U. S. battle casualties in Korea have reached 81,422. Announcing this, the Defense department said the increase in the week through last Friday was 416.

Of the total, the department said 12,113 were killed in action, 57,025 wounded and 12,422 missing. Total battle deaths, including those who died of wounds, were 13,617.

## Air Reservists' Meets Increased
