Soviet Scientist Apologizes For Coddling Pigs

MOSCOW — (AP) — A Soviet scientist, recently chided for outfitting footsore pigs with sandals, allows he had indulged in some faulty reasoning. The scientist, L. K. Greben, incurred the ire of the government newspaper Ivestia, after he tried out some unique theories on an original herd of swine from the Ukrainian plains. Ivestia accused Greben of pampering ailing piglets with booties, foot baths and penicillin, instead of introducing new blood into the herd.

In a Letter to Ivestia, Greben Admitted He Had Been Guilty of a "Formalist" Approach and Had Failed to Apply the Biological Theories of the Late Ivan Michurin, Noted Russian Horticulturist, as Set Forth by T. D. Lysenko.

Michurin embraced the claim of inherited acquired characteristics. His chief advocate in Russia today is Lysenko. (It is standard procedure for a rebuked Russian official to send a public apology to the Soviet newspaper which chided him.)

'Peace' Signs Flank Highways Near Moscow

MOSCOW — (AP) — New brightly painted "peace" signs are going up along the highways outside of Moscow. The big metal signs, placed about a mile apart along the roads, carry such slogans as "U.S.S.R., pillar of Peace,"

"Peace to the world," and "Under the banner of communism to peace."

One sign shows a mother holding a child in one arm and a petition urging a big-five peace pact in the other hand. Soviet President Shvernik recently proposed such a pact in an exchange of letters with President Truman.

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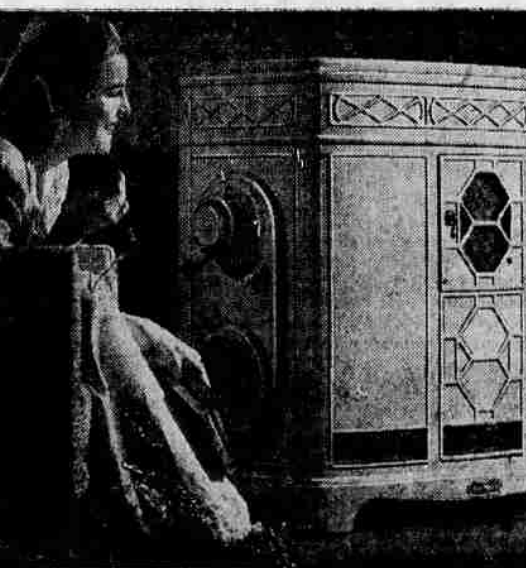

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RFC's Record Of Loans Scored By Senators

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Two Republican senators say in a controversial report that the senate's RFC investigation showed President Truman and William M. Boyle Jr., Democratic national committee chairman, "have transferred Pandergast politics to the national level."

"Scurrilous" and politically motivated, retorted Senator Fulbright (D-Ark.), referring to the Republican report. He is chairman of the banking subcommittee which investigated the Reconstruction Finance corporation.

But Fulbright wrote, and the other Democrats on the investigating group joined in, a majority report which itself renewed charges made by the committee last February that the big government lending agency had fallen prey to "an influence ring with White House contacts."

The new report from the Democrats, adopted by the full banking committee and sent along to the Senate, said those charges were "fully substantiated" in a new series of public hearings held after Mr. Truman had called the preliminary report a "sinecure."

It added new comments about what it called an "accepted practice" among borrowers of seeking

entry to the RFC by means of a Democratic national committee introduction. And it said RFC's former board of directors, now superseded by W. Stuart Symington as one-man administrator, "tactically acknowledged its responsiveness to external influence."

The sharper and more personal language, by Senators Capehart (R-Ind.) and Bricker (R-Ohio), was in a bulky minority report which also was submitted to the Senate. Fulbright called their statement "scurrilous" in a postscript statement. He said it was so partisan that he regretted it had to be "printed at public expense."

And Senator Benton (D-Conn.), a member of the banking committee but not of the RFC subcommittee, said the Capehart-Bricker document "abounds with false innuendoes."

Much of it doesn't even deal with the RFC, Bento said.
