

Duck Hunters Given Extra Shooting Days

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Five To Ten Days Added For This Fall

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Interior department today granted the nation's duck-hunters five to 10 extra days of shooting this fall.

Acting Secretary Richard D. Seales Jr. signed new migratory waterfowl hunting regulations, liberalized because of favorable conditions on the northern breeding grounds throughout the summer.

Albert M. Day, director of the fish and wildlife service, said he hoped the longer seasons would "give gunners in every section of the country good opportunities for shooting, regardless of unpredictable weather conditions."

The bag and possession limits for ducks remain the same as last year, but some minor changes for geese were made in two flyways. Hunting seasons for woodcock were unchanged except for the addition of a day or two in a couple of states.

Major Changes Listed
The major changes for this year include:
Pacific flyway—season increased five days to 60 days, or a split season of 24 days each. This year the six-geese limit permits the taking of three Brant if no Canada or white-fronted geese are taken. The daily bag and possession limit of six ducks is unchanged. In Alaska the bag limit for ducks was increased to five, and the possession limit to 10.

Day urged hunters to note that the prohibition against the use of bait has been made more specific than in other years.
In the new regulations, birds may not be taken within half a mile of any place where corn or similar feed is placed or exposed "during or within two weeks prior to the open season."

will help prevent the luring of waterfowl to an area even after the bait has been consumed.
The standard prohibition against the taking of birds by the use of corn or similar feed has been retained.

Shooting Hours Same
The daily shooting hours for ducks, geese, Brant and coot remain the same as last year—from half an hour before sunrise to an hour before sunset.
The use of automatic-loading or repeating shotguns capable of holding more than three shells remains prohibited. The plug in such a shotgun must be incapable of being removed without disassembling the gun.

Shipments from Canada and Mexico may be made as late as five days after the end of the seasons there, so that birds killed on the final day at some distant point may be transported.

In the United States, hunters may make interstate shipments up to 48 hours after the close of the shooting season. The post-season period for possession of migratory game birds remains unchanged at 90 days.

The open season and limits for the Pacific flyway:

Limits Listed
Ducks, daily bag and possession limit six. No open season on wood duck in Arizona, Nevada and Utah, and in the other Pacific flyway states the bag or possession limit may include only one wood duck. Daily bag for American and red-breasted mergansers, 25 singly or in the aggregate of both kinds; no possession limit after opening day of the season. Geese and Brant (except Ross's goose), daily bag and possession limit six, including not more than (A) two Canada geese or its subspecies, or (B) two white-fronted geese, or (C) three Brant, or a mixed bag of (D) one Canada goose or its subspecies and one white-fronted goose, or (E) one Canada Goose or its subspecies and two Brant, or (F) one white-fronted goose and two Brant. Coot, daily bag and possession limit, 15.
Arizona, Nov. 7-Jan. 5; Idaho and Nevada, Oct. 19-Dec. 17; Oregon, Nov. 2-Dec. 31; Utah, Oct.

12-Dec. 10; Washington, Oct. 26-Dec. 24; California, Oct. 28-Dec. 24 except for a season from Nov. 7 to Jan. 5 on waterfowl and coot in parts of San Bernardino, Riverside and Imperial counties.

In Idaho, there will be no open season on snowgeese, and no open season on geese of any species in part of Canyon county. The seasons and limits for migratory game birds other than waterfowl—doves, rails, gallinules and the like—were announced Aug. 1, as were the seasons for Alaska. However, the bag limit for ducks in Alaska is five, and the possession limit is 10, instead of four and eight as announced Aug. 1.

No Change Seen In Trout Fishing

The trout fishing situation has failed to change materially this week.

A report from the local office of the state Game commission states that both trout and steelhead fishing on the upper Umpqua is fair. As before, steelhead fishing in the Steamboat area is excellent—if the water is clear.

Closer to the coast, the report says that blueback fishing is good in the Umpqua and Siuslaw. Salmon fishing is poor at Winchester Bay. Warm water fishing is good on the coastal lakes.

Even on the Rogue, the report on trout is nothing more than average. The game report states that trout fishing on the Upper

Rogue is improving "fair to good." Meanwhile, trout fishing is poor in all coastal streams in Curry county. Regarding the lower Rogue, the report says weekend angling is uncertain since there are heavy rains.

Steelhead catches are being made throughout the general Rogue river area. Small lures and single eggs are best, the report says, but angling success for early steelhead in lower Rogue has been poor.

The surgery was completed at 1 a. m. (EST). Dr. James Daniels, who participated in the operation, said the object was to remove pressure on a blood clot. Indications were that there would be no change in the 20-year-old Flores' condition for several hours.

Out-Of-State Fishermen May Not Need Licenses

ASTORIA (AP)—Out-of-state fishermen will not need Oregon fishing licenses for this year's Astoria salmon derby if they fish in Washington state waters.

That was announced by Al Hetzel, manager of the Astoria chamber of commerce. He said George Neuner, Oregon attorney general, ruled that non-residents, fishing in Washington waters, may land their catches in Oregon without licenses. Non-residents fishing in Oregon waters, however, must have Oregon licenses as well as tags.

Outside the three-mile limit, no licenses will be required, Hetzel quoted Neuner as ruling. He added that Oregon's \$15 license fee for guides does not apply in the lower Columbia river where the derby is to be staged.

The derby opens Aug. 30.

EXHIBITIONS LIMITED

CINCINNATI (AP)—Professional baseball players were advised that they may participate in exhibition games for 30 days this year, beginning Oct. 11.
