**Woolen Textile Workers
Granted Wage Increase**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A nine and a half cent-an-hour wage increase for 84,000 woolen textile workers has been approved by the Wage Stabilization board.

The decision cleared the way for action on 111 other similar cases, the board said.

Affected were 24,000 workers of the American Woolen Co. and 60,000 in other textile firms.

Present average pay is \$1.47 to \$1.48 an hour.

The board is now working on pension, health and welfare plans in order to form a broad policy.

**Security Insurance
Payments Go Higher**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Social security insurance payments are up 140 percent over last year because of the 1950 amendment which extended benefits to more people and boosted the amounts paid almost everywhere.

Federal Security Administrator

Oscar R. Ewing said that August payments, for example, amounted to \$147,075,000 to 4,150,000 persons as compared with \$61,641,000 to 2,967,055 in August 1950.

Persons who formerly got \$26 a month average old-age retirement now get about \$48; minimum payments of \$10 were doubled; maximum old-age insurance payments of \$48 now are \$68.50; top

payment to a family of an insured wage earner is now \$150 a month. The program is financed by payroll deductions, and not general taxation, Ewing emphasized.

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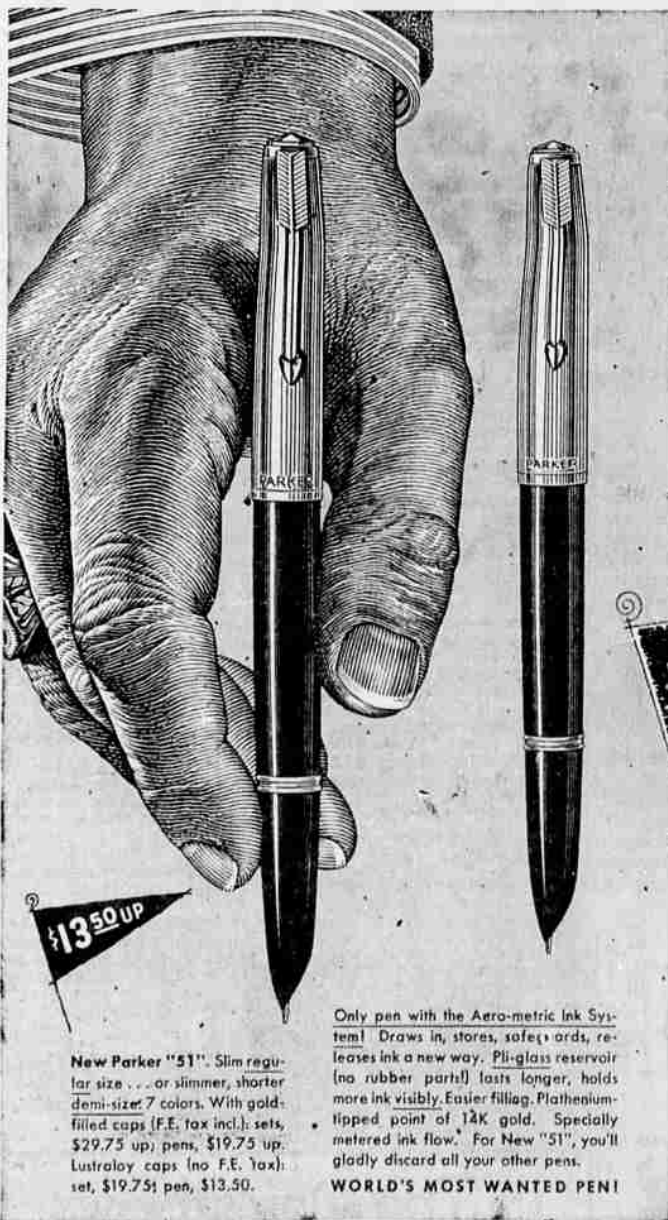
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
