YOUR BODY

Probably one of the most overlooked factors in health today is the body infestation of worms. It is a touchy subject with most people. We all realize it is no crime to have worms but it is a crime to keep them when we know the bad effects they have on the system and especially when they are so easily expelled when properly treated.

The round worm develops from the egg which has entered the digestive tract through contaminated water, contaminated or dirty foods and candies and animal pets. They are of grayish or pinkish color and in form resemble the earth worm. They live in the small intestines but have been known to migrate to the stomach, esophagus, lungs, and bile ducts. They have also been known to penetrate into the abdominal cavity through an intestinal ulcer. When they enter the bile duct a number of symptoms occur which sometimes becomes hard to diagnose. Jaundice, salivary gland enlargement, fever, and other symptoms occur. They can also enter the pancreatic duct causing dysfunction of the pancreas to occur. Children seem to be more affected than grownups because of their being exposed to the worm eggs through the eating of candy, the exposure to animal pets licking them in the face and mouth and the exposure to foodstuffs which fall on the floor and are then eaten. Some mothers form a habit of putting the child on the floor and giving it something to eat and in turn the child exposes the food by putting it on the floor and then eating it. This is a very dangerous habit for mothers to get into. Not only do they expose the child to the worm eggs but many other parasites and bacteria.

Worms of various types affect people differently but the usual symptoms are an unusual appetite for sweets, restlessness especially during sleep, colicky pains, mucous stools, loss of weight, nervousness, gritting of teeth during sleep, bed wetting, itching of the rectum, picking of the nose, lack of appetite for breakfast,

School Buildings At Myrtle Creek Are Improved

The Myrtle Creek public schools are all set to receive what is expected to be the largest enrollment in the history of Myrtle Creek. Nearly 1000 elementary pupils and approximately 265 high school pupils should be highly pleased with the new additions and improvements made in the buildings and campus during the summer. School opens Sept. 4.

All students may look forward to enjoying the improvements to the gymnasium. A 90x15 foot bleacher section has been added, which will seat about 650 people without cramming. The entire gym was re-roofed and repainted, and 100 new steel full length lockers were installed in the boys' dressing room.

Twelve rooms in the upper elementary building have been painted cheerful colors to replace the old "schoolhouse brown" paint. The roof has also been painted, and the boys' lavatory has been enlarged and renovated.

The high school has been improved with the completion of an audio-visual preview room, and the installation of a heating and ventilating system in the student body council room.

One of the first things that both students and teachers will notice when the excellent parking area between the two elementary buildings. About 4,000 square yards of blacktop playground and sidewalks have been installed, which should reduce the amount of mud tracked into the buildings. A new fire hydrant, of the type used by the city of Myrtle Creek, has been erected midway between the elementary buildings.

Of special interest to students who may be on its route is a new 75 passenger Kenworth "transit type pusher" bus which has been added to the fleet of ten buses. All buses will run on the same schedule as last year.

The Myrtle Creek public schools will be overcrowded to the tune of 150 to 200 students this year, and there is every indication that the enrollment will be even greater next year. Therefore, the school board has made preliminary plans for an elementary school to be built in the Tri-City area if the voters approve a bond issue to finance it. It will be presented to the voters at a later date. Freeman-Hyslop and Tuft, Associated Architects have presented preliminary drawings for a grade school building, should the projected enrollment actually come up to expectations.

Teachers in the Myrtle Creek school system reported on Aug. 30 and 31 for a day of institute and a day of orientation. The theme of this day of in-service training centered about "The Handicapped Child" and was planned to train the teachers in the use of Myrtle Creek's newly inaugurated special education department. John MacDonald, a graduate of the University of Oregon, has been selected as the teacher to usher in and develop the new program. The Myrtle Creek institute was approved by the State Department of Special Education, and was planned through the cooperation of the State Department of Special Education, Walter E. Snyder, assistant state superintendent, the office of county superintendent Kenneth Barneburg, and the office of Myrtle Creek public school superintendent M. C. Deller.

Clerk-Patrolman Needed On Local Police Force

Chief of Police Lloyd J. Larsen reported he is taking applications for a clerk-patrolman, to fill a vacancy on the force. The applicant must be between the ages of 25 and 40 years.

Two officers, who have been working during the summer only, have resigned to resume teaching school. They are Charles Smith, principal at Deer Creek school, who resigned today, and Walter Jarvie, Roseburg teacher, who resigned Monday.

Vernon Murdock of Tenmile has been hired to replace Jarvie. A recent addition to the force was Fredrick Davis, who replaced Walter Rich. Davis has had five years of experience in police work in New York and also experience in California.

Retirement Not Needed To Get Security Benefits

You do not have to be wholly or permanently "retired" to get retirement payments under the Old Age and Survivors Insurance system, according to Paul F. Johnson, Manager of the Eugene Social Security office. The numbers of people coming into his office confused on this point prompted him to make the explanation.

"Actually," Johnson pointed out, "the new Social Security law makes it possible for insured people 65 and over to collect retirement payments while still earning up to \$50.00 per month on covered jobs. The old limit of \$14.99 was changed on last September 1. Even the \$50 limit does not apply to earnings from work not covered by Social Security. Neither does it apply to people age 75 or over."

"The law is simply that a person between 65 and 75 years of age cannot collect benefits for a year month in which he earns more than \$50 from work covered by Social Security. No amount of earnings or income from other sources will affect his right to benefits. Insured people age 75 or over can collect even though working full time on jobs covered by Social Security, or for that matter, any job."

"Another point we'd like to get across," Johnson continued, "is that anyone now age 65 or older, very likely is insured if he worked at least a year and a half, at any time back to January 1937, on Social Security-covered jobs."

Johnson invites residents of this area who are eligible for benefits under the new law to get in touch with his office, located at 1247 Wilamette in Eugene or contact a representative of that office who will be in Roseburg on Tuesday, Sept. 4, at the City Hall, Council Chambers, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and noon.

Carrier Boys League Slated

Plans are afoot to organize a southern Oregon softball league for newspaper carrier boys.

With the aim of teaching cooperation and sportsmanship, the league idea was formulated recently by Fuller Johnson, circulation manager of the News-Review and Homer Strickling, district manager of the Oregonian carriers.

Johnson reports an attempt is being made to secure support of the major newspaper organizations in the region. He has already contacted the Medford Mail-Tribune and the Grants Pass Courier. Their tentative members are the Eugene Register-Guard and the Coos Bay Times. If the league proves feasible, competition on a league basis will get underway next summer, Johnson said. He continued that the Oregonian has offered to cooperate with the plan and he expects to get the same endorsement from the Portland Oregon Journal.

A preview game was played recently on the Veterans field between carrier boys from the News-Review and the Roseburg branch of the Oregonian. The News-Review waltzed over the Oregonian, 14-5, but the spirit on both teams attested to a hearty approval of the idea by the boys.

Truman Approves Money Measures

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman yesterday signed four appropriation bills totaling about \$10,000,000,000. One authorizes the building of 50,000 public housing units this year.

All measures finance the operation of various agencies including the Labor, Agriculture and Interior departments for the fiscal year ending next June 30.

And all cut federal employment of the agencies and departments involved by 10 percent. One of the new laws carries an amendment which limits vacations of all federal workers except postal employees and those working abroad to 20 days, a 6-day cut in most cases.

German Truckers Block Road In Protest Of Tolls

BERLIN — (AP) — German truckers blocked the super-highway from Berlin to West Germany today to protest collection of tolls imposed by the Russians. They piled trucks across the Helmsdorf checkpoint in an attempt to stop traffic and prevent anyone from paying.

The Communists, who control the section of the road running through East Germany, said they needed the money to maintain the road. They extended the charge to all West German motorists on all East German roads.

Truman Sends Letter To Senator Capehart

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A free-swinging letter from President Truman to a Republican senator has added a new punch to the administration's campaign for changes in the price control law. Mr. Truman told Senator Capehart (R-Ind) he doubts whether Capehart himself understands an amendment he sponsored when the 1939 control law was remodeled a month ago. Bluntly, he informed the senator that amendment and two others the White House wants repealed are "wrong" and have no business in the act.

Two Aircraft Missing In Aleutians, Alaska

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — (AP) — An air force C-47 with four aboard was reported missing in Alaska on the heels of the crash of a navy Privateer in the Aleutians yesterday carrying 10 men.

The two were the eighth and ninth planes reported crashed or missing in Alaska in a disastrous string of accidents the past six weeks. About 85 are dead or missing in the accidents.

Fire Causes \$1 Million Damage To Atlanta Firm

ATLANTA — (AP) — Flames spread by shattering explosions destroyed the Mumford Co., insulation manufacturing plant last night with damages estimated by police at \$1,000,000.

Acting Police Captain G. R. Elliott, first to reach the scene, said "It looked like the world was afire."

Firemen fought the blaze for more than an hour.

Company employees said one of the explosions probably was the boiler bursting, but they were unable to account for the other blasts.

Homicide Charges Filed

PONT SAINT ESPRIT, France — (AP) — The police have filed charges of involuntary homicide against a miller and a baker charged with providing the flour which killed four persons, made 28 seriously ill and drove more than 100 temporarily insane.

Conviction carries penalties of up to three years in jail and fines up to \$3,400.

Filipinos Are Warned Against Russian Sub

MANILA — (AP) — The Philippine armed forces were told today to be on the alert for a Russian submarine which may invade the republic's waters bringing supplies to the Communist Huk guerrillas. Military intelligence said it was believed Russian submarines already have begun funneling in Filipinos trained by the Communists in China for guerrilla warfare against the Philippine government.

Four Men Burn, Others Hurt In Traffic Mishap

SHREVEPORT, La. — (AP) — Four men burned to death, and three other persons were injured in a three-way traffic accident 17 miles north of Homer, La., yesterday.

Claiborne parish coroner Dr. E. A. Campbell identified the dead men as J. W. Johnson, 38; Bunyan Little, 55, and his son, Thomas Little, 32, all of Strong, Ark.; and Claude Goocher, 38, of Summerville, La.

The accident occurred when a log truck and a car collided, forcing a third car into the ditch.

Fire followed the collision of the log truck and the automobile.

Five-Year-Old's Body Found In Vacant Lot

CHICAGO, Ill. — (AP) — The body of five-year-old Yvonne Georgian, Birritz, missing from her home since Thursday afternoon, was found in a vacant lot at the Cicero-Chicago city limits Friday with the skull bashed in.

Her father, Joseph, 39, operates a restaurant in Cicero.

Police Lt. Lester Conerty said police are questioning one man.

The plant manufactures butadiene and processes it into synthetic rubber. It is operated by Phillips Chemical company for the federal government.
