Relief Director Returns To Home

David E. Norcross, who has been in Roseburg visiting his daughter, Mrs. Otis Huddleston, the former Eleanor Norcross, left Wednesday for his home in Pasadena, Calif.

Norcross, who grew up in the Lookingglass area and attended the Flournoy valley school, is now director for Heifers for Relief, an organization formed to aid European war refugees in getting back on their feet.

Heifers for Relief is now sending 1200 heifers to the former refugees in Western Germany. A few of these families are being located on small tracts of very poor land and need cows badly, according to Norcross. The organization has already sent over 600 heifers. ECA is paying the ocean freight. The calves of the heifers are to be passed on to other families in a rehabilitation program, he said.

P. E. Building Bids Invited

An invitation for bids for construction of a physical education building at the Green school, south of Roseburg, has been issued by Carol C. Towt, clerk of district No. 5-C.

The bids will be received at the office of the superintendent in the Green school until 8 p.m. Sept. 21.

The building, designed by Architects Freeman, Hayslip & Tuft, Portland, will be 52x98 feet, of concrete block construction. It will have trussed rafters, 24-inch on center, and Laykold floors.

The project includes a stage with wood floor, a heating room with furnace, and a 60-foot covered passage-way to the existing school. Alternates will include eliminating some of these items.

Football Training Camp Shows Results

The week-long training camp for football players of Roseburg Senior high school, held up Little River last week, advanced the team at least three weeks in general condition and football knowledge over what would have been a normal training week in town.

This is the opinion of Bill Reder, new football coach at Roseburg, who addressed the Roseburg Kiwanis club Tuesday noon.

Reder was told by school authorities in advance that not too much was expected of him in putting out a winning team this year because of a lack of material. But he is enthusiastic over his team's prospects.

Material Surprises

He said he does not know how the team will fare against strong competition, but the material is better than he had hoped for, and the most encouraging point is

that many of them are juniors and sophomores who will be on hand next year. At least 14 men of first string caliber will be returning.

The boys entered into the spirit of pre-season training at the Little River camp. They worked hard, ate well and got plenty of rest, he said. There was plenty of opportunity for "chalk talks," as well as calisthenics, general football fundamentals and football practice.

Reder said the players knew their plays and their positions. The backfield is fast and shifty and he is well pleased with them at this stage of the game. The line, however, needs considerable blocking training.

Reder said he asked for and got certain concessions toward turning out good football teams. First was the training camp, financed by a "\$20 Buck" club. He

hopes this club can be dissolved into a booster's club next year.

Concessions Help

Another concession was freshman football training to build a nucleus for varsity teams. A third was the authority to start football practice the last period of the day as a gym class for students who live out of town, in order that they could get home at a reasonable hour in the evenings. Transportation is being arranged for these boys who will have to miss their usual ride home by bus.

Reder is encouraged over the football training in the grade and junior high schools in order to build material capable of competing with schools such as Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls.

J. E. Whited, 80, Reported Missing

Search is being made in the North Myrtle creek area for James Edward Whited, age 80, who was last seen at 12:30 Wednesday afternoon.

Deputy Sheriff W. I. Worrall reported that Whited was last seen on the ranch of his grandson, C. R. Whited, 7½ miles up North Myrtle road. The entire 18 acres of the place was combed yesterday afternoon and this morning, but no trace has been found of the missing man, said Worrall.

Whited was five-feet eight inches tall, weighed 225 pounds, had gray, receding hair, and was wearing blue jeans and shirt, panama hat and high black shoes.

Anyone knowing of his whereabouts is asked to get in touch with the Myrtle Creek police, said Worrall.

Former Pastor Of Local Church Dies September 2

The Rev. Roy William Achor, D. D., pastor of the Roseburg Presbyterian church from 1926 to 1929, died at Mabton, Wash., Sept. 2, according to information received here.

Dr. Achor was born Nov. 3, 1889, at Russiaville, Ind. He received his education and ministerial training at Taylor university, Upland, Ind., Princeton seminary, N. J., and Moody Bible institute, Chicago, Ill.

While in active ministry he was elected and served as commissioner to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, U.S.A., on three occasions. He also served as moderator of both the Willamette and Portland Presbyteries. In 1945 he was awarded the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Lewis and Clark college, Portland.

Dr. Achor was the first pastor emeritus of the Bethany Presbyterian church, Grandview, Wash., where he served as pastor from 1947 to 1950.

His other pastorates were at Coweta, Okla., until 1919; Gervais, Woodburn, Ore., 1919 to 1926; Roseburg, 1926 to 1929 and Oregon City, 1929 to 1947.

In addition to his religious and ministerial activities, Dr. Achor was active in Rotary, chamber of commerce, Boy Scouts, YMCA and youth and educational activities.

Funeral services at the Grandview Presbyterian church were held Wednesday at 3 p.m. Interment was held at Forest, Ind.
