

Roseburg Church Sets Anniversary Fete Sunday

The Second anniversary and home coming will be observed this Sunday by the North Roseburg church. The first services, held on Sunday after Labor day in 1949, were attended by 25 Roseburg residents. That marked the beginning of the Evangelical United Brethren mission which was organized on May 28, 1950, into the congregation of the North Roseburg church. The Rev. E. Clark Robb has served as pastor from the beginning.

In the first two years the church has experienced remarkable growth. Largely from voluntary labor, an all-purpose building was constructed with a seating capacity of 200. The morning worship services have grown to about 100 in attendance, and the Sunday School enrollment reached a peak of 135. The new congregation was happy to present Oregon's first drive-in service for the second season this summer.

Special Broadcast Set

Sunday's observance will begin with a special broadcast over "Moments of Devotion," at 8:15 a.m., on station KRNR. The Sunday school has planned a surprise at 9:45, and the message for the morning worship at 11 will be "Pressing On." During the noon hour, a potluck dinner will be held with a baptismal service scheduled for 3 p.m. or the Edward Smith farm on Deer Creek. The remainder of the afternoon is being observed as "Home Fellowship Time," when members and friends of the congregation are encouraged to invite each other into their homes for leisurely visiting. This will give the out-of-town members attending the home coming opportunity to renew old acquaintances.

The evening service, moved ahead to 7 p.m. for the convenience of the out-of-towners, will include special music, sharing of testimonies, and the showing of the 30 minute color film "Out of the Night," which portrays the conversion of an alcoholic. The days

activities will be climaxed as the inter-denominational Youth Council conducts its monthly "sing-spiration" at the North Roseburg church at 9:00 p.m.

Treatment Plant Need For Riddle, Oakland Pressed

PORTLAND — (AP) — The state sanitary authority yesterday took action against four Oregon cities to spur construction of sewage treatment plants.

The four cities are Toledo, Oakland, Riddle and Heppner.

The authority will ask the state attorney general to institute an injunction against the city of Toledo to prevent pollution of the Yaquina river. If the injunction is granted, the city will be forced to install an adequate sewage treatment plant.

Oakland has failed to take action on a 1950 order to begin a sewage treatment plant program, the authority said. The attorney general will be asked for advice on what the next step should be to force action.

A deadline of Dec. 1 was set for Riddle to complete its treatment plant.

City officials at Heppner were urged to step up their engineering plans and bonding program so its plant can be installed in 1952.

Other action:

Hillsboro will be asked to expand its present disposal system to include pollution conditions in the lower Tualatin river.

T. M. Gerow, assistant sanitary engineer, Grants Pass, was authorized to continue his study of the Rogue river.

1 Special Oregon Hunt For Elk In Burn Area

PORTLAND — (AP) — Only one special Oregon hunt — for bull elk in the Tillamook Burn — remains open to applicants. The closing date for that Nov. 10-15 event is Sept. 19, and a public drawing will follow to name the successful 200 who will get permits.

The State Game commission in a report today said the purpose of the bull elk hunt was to get some of the mature animals from herds in the Burn's northern section and to scatter animals over adjacent unrange.

Normally Roosevelt elk have a tendency to range a limited area, the report said, but "they can be scattered by light hunting pressure."

Two jockeys also were suspended but their names were not disclosed.

Charles Evans, presiding judge of the race meet, said city police made a lengthy investigation, and discovered that the electrical shocking devices were used in a least two races to make the horse run faster.

YOUR BODY

The skin is an organ which protects the body from the outside world. It forms, in the first place, a sensory covering for the body. Nerve fibers of pressure, temperature and pain are distributed over its surface, and by means of these fibers reflexes of various kinds are effected which keep the body adapted to environmental changes.

The skin plays an important part, and is of immense value in helping to regulate the body temperature. This is done by the variation of the blood supply to the skin. The skin is also an excretory organ. It being an organ of elimination, it helps to rid the body of toxins and waste by throwing impurities out on the body surface by way of the sebaceous glands and the sweat glands. There are 4,000,000 to 5,000,000 glands in the skin of an ordinary person. About one half of this number are sweat glands. Nature has regarded the skin to be a very important organ of elimination to have put so many openings therein.

The sebaceous glands produce a secretion of an oily substance for protection of the skin. Its oily secretions serve to protect the hair from becoming too brittle, on the other hand from being too easily saturated with external moisture, and also to protect the skin from becoming irritated by the chemical reaction of the sweat which in turn is acid in reaction. If the sebaceous glands are at a disfunction, the chemicals of the sweat set up a reaction which causes the skin to become dry and irritated, and often times an itching sensation of the skin results. Invariably a dry, scaly skin can be checked back to a liver disorder by virtue of the fact the liver stores vitamin A. In all dry scaly skins a deficiency of vitamin A is found. Likewise when the liver is not properly functioning, poisons are thrown back into the bloodstream and nature carries the poisons to the surface and eliminates the poisons through the glands of the skin and in turn the poisons set up an irritation in the sebaceous glands causing pimples and acne.

Too many people upon bathing use too strong a chemical in the form of soap. In bathing, one should not use a strong soap unless the skin has become covered with a layer of dirt, or other articles. By using warm water and a wash cloth, the body chem-

icals which have been thrown onto the surface for elimination can be easily dissolved and removed. If one uses a strong soap and rubs it into the pores of the skin, the soap chemicals will in turn irritate the glands in the skin and set up a chemical irritation. Likewise, it has been found that body odors occur where strong soaps have been used and by the chemical reaction of the soap and the chemicals of the glands, set up a putrefaction causing body odors.

To the practicing physician the skin is used as an important item in diagnosing deep-seated trouble. A number of diseases which cause reactions of the skin become a book of information to him. Ailments such as hives denote digestive disturbances and idiosyncrasy to certain foods. Shingles denote a condition of the spinal nerve roots. Acne denotes glandular disturbance, anemia or gastro-intestinal disturbance. Psoriasis denotes an imbalance of body metabolism. Eczema, of which there are many kinds, denotes digestive disturbance, debility, or toxic blood. Impetigo denotes undernourishment of minerals and vitamins. Many other ailments can be diagnosed by the skin. Among them are the contagious and infectious diseases such as measles, small pox, chicken pox, scarlet fever, etc. Likewise, discoloration of the skin indicates different internal conditions. Certain rashes called dermatitis can be caused by chemical irritations.

It is never advisable to take an extremely hot bath unless it is for the purpose of taking a sweat to eliminate toxins. When one exposes the glands of the skin to extreme hot water, the glands dilate and empty the secretions upon the surface. When the sebaceous oil is removed from the body, the skin can be exposed to the chemical reactions of the sweat, causing damage. Likewise, the extreme heat fatigues the tiny muscles located in the skin, and the skin has a tendency to become prematurely wrinkled when extreme hot baths are practiced daily. Upon taking a hot bath, the skin should be thoroughly dried with a turkish towel followed by a cool shower to regain the tone of the tiny muscles and to activate the glands.

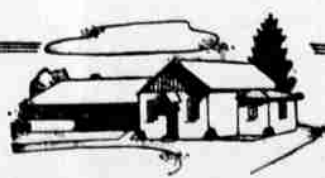
