MEDFORD — (AP) — John W. Strong, who lived at Slide creek on the Umpqua, a Roseburg postal address, died early today in the crash of his skidding car. He was alone in the car which left the highway seven miles above Prospect on the Crater lake highway and hit a tree.

## Course Offered In Psychology

A course in psychology, offering university credit, will be conducted in Roseburg this winter if there is sufficient demand to make the class possible.

Robert Cartwright, well-known psychologist from the University of California who has just joined the Veterans hospital staff in Roseburg, would conduct the course, which would be sponsored by the University of Oregon extension department.

It would consist of 11 two-hour class periods, the classes to be held weekly. Three hours credit would be offered.

The course would be in either methods in psychology or character and personality, dependent upon the desire of persons enrolled. The course would begin in October and classes would be held either at the Veterans hospital or the Junior high school.

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## Unander-McCall Dispute Starts Smoking Over Which Should Run For Treasurer

SALEM (AP) — A long-smoldering dispute between Thomas Lawson McCall and Sigfrid B. Unander has been fanned into a white heat over which one should make the Republican race for state treasurer.

Both are politically ambitious young Portlanders in their late 30's. McCall is secretary to Governor Douglas McKay. Unander is the wealthy state Republican chairman, and he used to be secretary to former Gov. Charles A. Sprague.

The battle flared up here several days ago at a secret meeting of the top Republican brass. They were here to make plans to win the state treasurer's post next year. It's the only Democratic post in high Oregon officialdom.

With Democratic state Treasurer Walter J. Pearson's recent statement that he won't run for reelection, the Republican leaders are drooling over the chance to take over his job next year.

Among these Republican bigwigs were Unander and Ralph Cake, Republican national committeeman. Their first question was: Who should run?

Their answer was McCall, and Unander hit the roof. He said he's entitled to the job because he ran for it three years ago. He was defeated in the primary by state Sen. Howard C. Belton of Canby.

## Flower Show Requirements Listed For Classifications

Exhibits for the Roseburg Fall Flower show will go on display at noon Thursday, Sept. 20, in the Methodist church social hall, under auspices of the Roseburg Woman's club.

Entries will be received from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. Thursday and judging will follow after the exhibits have been registered. Any gardener in Douglas county is eligible to participate in the show. Names must be on containers.

On Friday, the show will begin with individual children's entries or No. 1 entries are to be removed until the show closes Friday afternoon.

The following classifications will be judged, and first, second and third prizes will be awarded. Only one exhibit in each classification may be entered.

Floral arrangements composed of any variety of flowers and foliage of any variety. They will be classified as low or flat, of medium height, or tall and wide spreading arrangements.

Novelty arrangements to cover entries of fruit, berries and dried materials alone or in combination with fresh flowers.

Miniature arrangements of any entry fresh or dried within the following measurements: three inch or five inch arrangements. This measurement is overall, including container and flowers.

Classifications that will not be judged are named varieties, specimen blooms or plants as follows: Tuberous begonias, fuchsias or dahlias.

**Special features included**  
Special features will include individual children's entries or exhibits from any youth group. Judging in this division will be done by a separate judge or judges.

Mrs. Frank Ashley is chairman of the special exhibit committee. There will also be a special table setting with a children's party sponsored by the Junior Woman's club.

Conversation pieces will be entered by the garden department of the Woman's club. These will be low, small arrangements suitable for use on card table settings or for coffee tables. China and accessories will be shown with the arrangements in an effort by each entrant to blend the arrangements with the table setting.

The junior division will include a bouquet for teachers, zinnias, chrysanthemums, hospital arrangements, collection of weeds or natural foliage correctly labeled, small dish gardens, miniatures, three or five inches overall, and any reasonable arrangements.

## Injuries From Accident Prove Fatal To Pate

REEDSPORT — (AP) — Injuries from a highway accident Monday proved fatal yesterday to Alvin Pate, Scottsburg. He died in a north Bend hospital.

Pate was in a truck that collided with a car, then went off highway 38, east of Reedspport. The truck landed in the edge of the Umpqua river. Pate was removed by tugboat.

Two other Scottsburg men recovered from the crash. George Curry suffered a broken arm, and Guy Blondell, face cuts.

## Three Men Killed In Plane Crash

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Salvage crews today will comb the mudflats of San Francisco bay and the mangled wreckage of a giant stratorcruiser airliner for the bodies of three men killed when the huge plane plummeted into shallow water.

The three — two veteran pilots and a flight engineer — were the only ones aboard when the \$1,500,000 United Airliners plane went down 20 miles south of here 45 minutes after takeoff from San Francisco airport yesterday.

## Coos Bay Man Charged With Intent To Murder

COOS BAY — (AP) — A charge of intent to commit murder was filed here Wednesday against Haves Ratterree, 38, Coos Bay, accused of shooting Charles Edwards, about 38, Tuesday.

Police chief Cecil Wood filed the charge in justice of the peace court, bail was set at \$5000.

Edwards was reported in fair condition at a hospital with a 25 caliber bullet wound in his abdomen.

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
