

Three Walker Cup Stars Take Beating

BETHLEHEM, Pa. — (AP) — If anyone had told you that seven Walker Cup stars would be on the sidelines after three days of competition in the 51st national amateur golf championship, you'd probably have recommended a doctor.

But that's just what has happened. Oklahoma City's thin man, Charley Coe, is the only big name golfer left in the tournament. With the exception of bespectacled Harold Paddock, Aurora, O., linksman, all of Coe's Walker Cup team mates, Frank Stranahan, Willie Turnesa, Bobby Knowles, Jimmy McHale, Sam Urzetta, Dick Chapman and Bill Campbell, are on the sidelines.

In fact, there are so many

strange names teeing off in today's round of sixteen, even the golf experts can't tell a contestant without a program. Lightning not only struck once in this upset-riddled tournament, it flashed seven times.

Yesterday, defending champion Urzetta, usually a picture of consistency, fell apart like a youngster in his first big tournament and was eliminated, 2 and 1, by a 39-year-old Mamaronck, N. Y., father of five children. This came shortly after McHale of the host Saucon Valley Country club, bowed out of the tourney.

Before the Tumult and shouting was over, bang, out went Chapman, British amateur champion from Pinehurst, N. C.

Among those teeing off in the

upper draw today will be Joe Gagliardi, conqueror of Urzetta, against Robert E. Evans, unknown from Cleveland, O.; George E. Victor, who coincidentally hails from Golf, Ill., facing Coe; and Billy Picard, Charleston, S. C., son of well known professional Henry Picard, against Tommy Jacobs Jr., national junior champ from Monticello, Calif.

11-Man Teams Open Season

All the 11-man prep football squads in the county get their test of fire this weekend.

Only two of the six games will be played in the county.

Heading the list of season openers is the Roseburg Indian-Springfield Miller tilt. Slated for the Springfield stadium, it will also mark the first encounter in the newly created district 6-A-1.

Myrtle Creek's tussle with Bandon will draw the greatest interest for games within the county. The game is scheduled for the Viking field Saturday afternoon.

The Bandonites were state "B" 11-man champions last year. The other A-2 school, Sutherlin, goes to Creswell Friday night for an inter-league affair.

Meanwhile, the ReedSPORT Braves will be the only other Douglas county host. They pit their apparent power against Del Norte high of Crescent City, Cal.

The two county "B" elevens also go into the battle for the first time Friday. Oakland makes its first appearance ever under the 11-man system at Rogue River high school. Drain's power-packed Warriors move to Lowell for the season's curtain raiser with the hope of repeating 1950's 45-0 slaughter.

Washington Set For Mineral, Water Surveys

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Almost a million dollars is to be spent in Washington state this year on water and mineral surveys and mapping operations, the U. S. geological survey disclosed.

Aides of Rep. Jackson (D-Wash.) said the interior department agency informed them that from 25 to 35 persons will be employed in the state in various survey programs.

The stepped-up search for scarce minerals will send crews into the magnesite areas of Northport, Holden, Glacier Peak and Chelwah. Mapping and investigation of western Washington coal resources and oil and gas studies in the Lake Crescent region also are contemplated. This program has been allocated \$128,000.

Approximately \$541,000 will be spent on surface and underground water investigations. Additional funds will be available on a matching basis by various state and local government units.

Topographic mapping to facilitate water storage, soil conservation and other programs has been allotted \$280,000 and an additional \$28,800 will be spent on land classification mapping. The latter, the agency reported, will include preparation of maps of the Wenatchee creek-mile 52 district, a dam site on the Lewis river; and of the Kettle, Dosewallips, Duckabush and Hama river sectors.

Washington State Cougars Regarded Best Since War

PULLMAN, Wash. — (AP) — The Washington State Cougars, equipped with among other things, a 145-pound halfback and a star tennis player at quarter, have a better team than in 1950.

The coaching staff admits this much. Other observers aren't so cautious and claim it's the best WSC football team since the war. In practice it has looked good from the single wing with a sprinkling of T stuff.

Forest Efashevski, the 33-year-old ex-Michigan ace starting his sophomore year as head coach, has 24 lettermen back for a rugged 10-game schedule that starts Sept. 22 against one strong coast conference contender (Southern California) and ends Nov. 24 with another (Washington).

In between, the Cougars play Santa Clara, Oklahoma A&M, California, Oregon State, Stanford, Idaho and Montana on successive Saturdays. WSC won four, lost three and tied two last fall.

Except at end, the Cougars have a strong line to meet the state, with seven lettermen tackles returning. Lettermen Don Steinbrun, 210, and Ed Barker, 190, are a capable offensive pair at ends but there is little to back them up.

Someone to replace linebacker Lavern Torgeson is another problem.

WSC has substantial depth at three backfield spots but is admittedly weak at quarterback where the graduated Bob Gambold held forth last fall.

Fullback appears to be the strongest Cougar position. Sophomore Jim Head, a 205-pound speedster who came to WSC unannounced, has looked so good he's likely to beat out the veteran Dick Bover who averaged 4.4 yards a try in 1950.

Ray Hobbs, a two-year letter-

man, is also available at full. The outlook is dim by comparison at quarterback. Here young Terry Campbell, a sophomore who is one of the Northwest's leading tennis players, and sophomore Bob Burkhardt will share the chores. Campbell is a fine passer, completing 28 of 36 aeriels in a practice game this spring.

Backs Carry Punc

Byron Bailey, a senior 185-pounder, and Al Charlton, a defensive ace who will carry the ball this year, give WSC a good 1-2 punch at right half. Evashevski has called Charlton one of the best fundamentalists he's ever seen.

Little Carl Williams, a 145-pound, 5-foot, 4-inch sophomore speedster, will see lots of action at left halfback. A transfer from Compton J. C., his darts around defensive alignments have been a feature of spring drills.

While Williams will be the constant touchdown threat, the veterans Dwight Pool and Bud Roffler will get most of the tailback duty. Roffler will also do the punting.

The tackles are Andy James, 230, John Turner, 250, Hal Lokovsek, 200, Bill Geppert, 195, Bill Bowen, 195, Elmer Messenger, 200, Bill Mayberry, 195, and Milt Schwenk, a sophomore surprise at 220.

Bradley Players Will Explain Fix

PEORIA, Ill. — (AP) — Bradley basketball players Fred Schlitzman and Jim Kelly, both involved in point-rigging a game last winter, have agreed to tell a grand jury "exactly what happened and give our stories."

The two players, both juniors last season, yesterday signed immunity waivers and agreed to appear before the Peoria county grand jury now in session.

Two other Bradley players connected with the bribe scandal, Gene Melchiorre and Aaron Preece, have not yet been heard from in regard to a grand jury appearance, State's Attorney Michael Shore said.

The four players have admitted participating in a \$4,000 payoff by gamblers for rigging point spreads in Bradley's game with Oregon State in Peoria, Dec. 7, 1950.

Evidence against five gamblers who tampered with Bradley players over a two-season period is being prepared by Shore for the grand jury. Shore said foremost among them was Jack West, who recently surrendered to New York police after being indicted by a New York grand jury for basketball bribery.

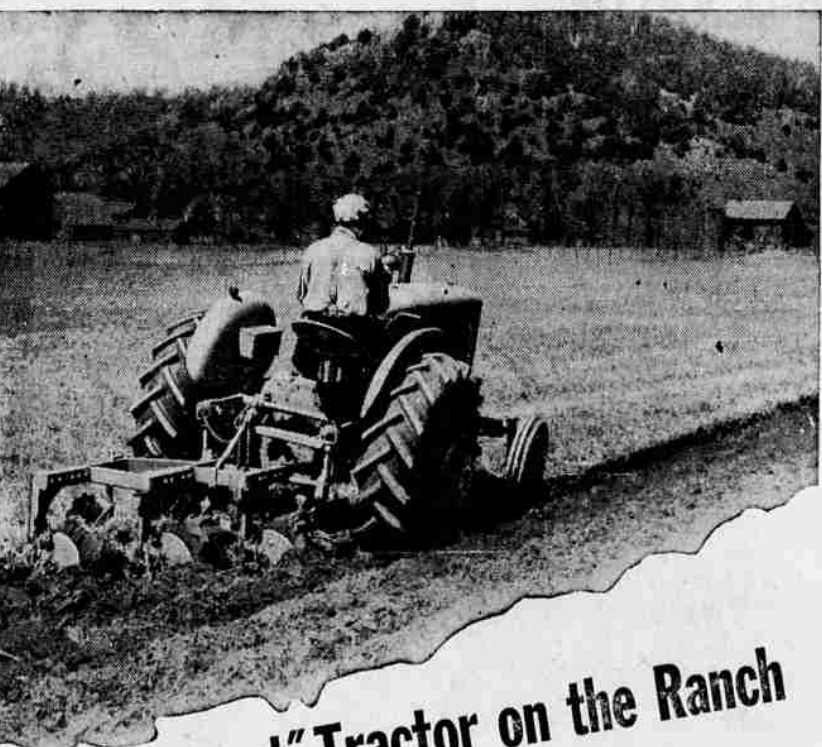
