Advice On Farm Income Increase Given By Jackman

The percentage of population in the three Pacific coast states is exactly the same as the agricultural income — California 72 percent, Washington 17 percent, and Oregon 11 percent — according to E. R. Jackman, Oregon State college agriculturist.

Jackman, speaking before the Roseburg Kiwanis club Tuesday noon, pointed out means where Oregon could increase its farm income, and thus support a larger population.

These means include greater productivity on smaller acreages, brought about by irrigation and use of fertilizer and by planting crops which are more productive per acre.

In the past much land has been devoted to hay and grain, and this same land will bring greater revenue by planting of berries and truck garden crops, he said.

Production of seed is becoming one of the most important phases of Oregon farming. Today there is not one seed store in the United States which does not handle some Oregon seeds, Jackman stated.

Efforts of the experiment station at Corvallis have been to interest more farmers in seed production, because Oregon soils are especially adapted to this purpose.

The only way to increase population in Oregon is to create more wealth from the land, Jackman contended. The farm income circulates about 7 1/2 times, through the various trade channels before becoming dormant, he stated.
