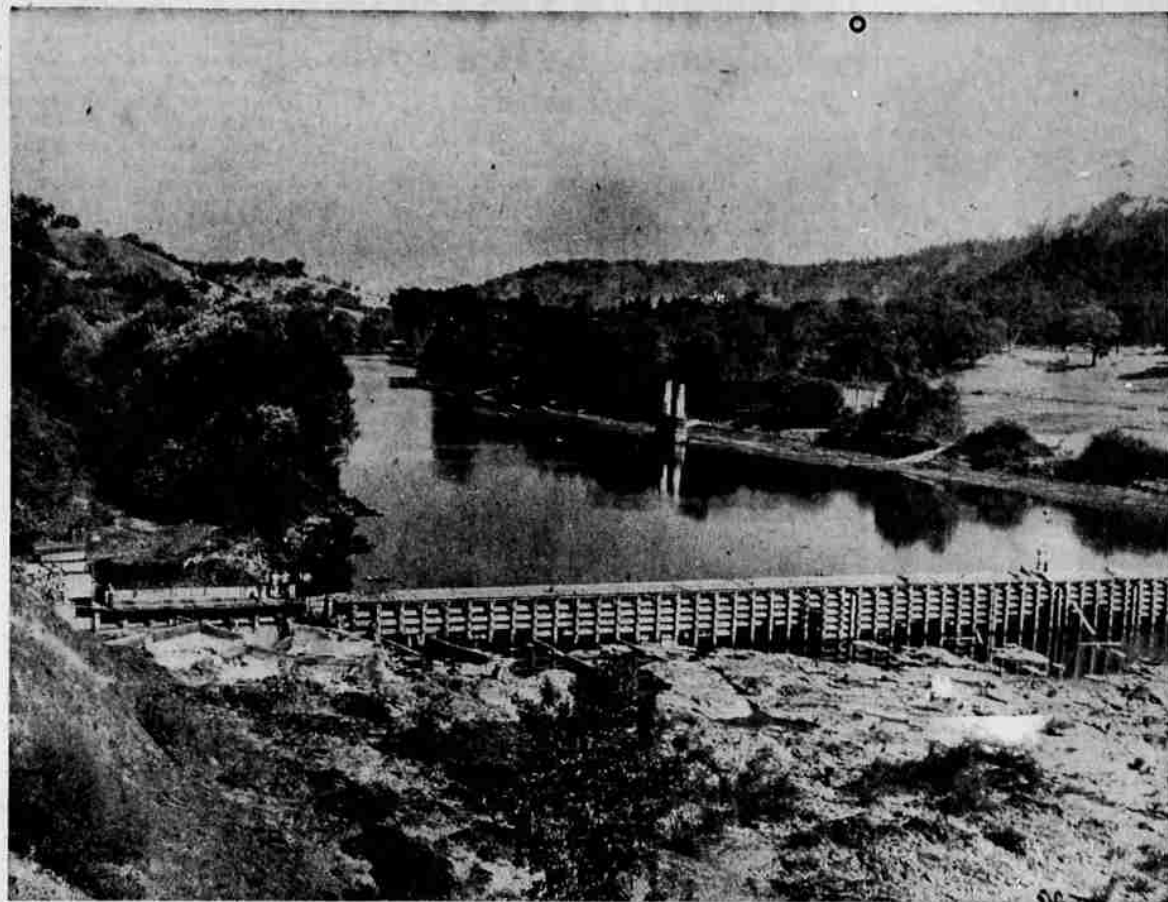

Ex-Mayor Curley Begins Comeback Effort in Boston

BOSTON — (AP) — Staid old Boston today saw one of the nation's last big city political "bosses" fighting in an attempted comeback — in the role of an underdog.

The 77-year-old James Michael Curley, four times mayor of this historic city, won one of two nominations in a non-partisan mayoral primary.

But "the old man" — as he's known among supporters — trailed Mayor John B. Hynes, seeking a second term, by more than 30,000 votes — a clear majority in the four-cornered preliminary race.

The 54-year-old Hynes, a little known clerk at city hall during Curley's regime, rolled up 108,428

votes to 77,011 for the man he once served under.

Curley An Ex-Convict

The final showdown comes in the Nov. 6 election. Two years ago Hynes edged out Curley by 12,000 votes.

Still confident even though the records showed Hynes made inroads into his one-time strong holders, Curley told his workers: "Now there's just two of us. The road is now clear, the issues are clear, and we start working at once for our success in November."

Hynes, who first came into the political limelight when he sat in as "acting mayor" while Curley

served a five months term in a federal penitentiary for fraud, declared:

"I have always believed that if you do right by the people, they will do all right by you. The preliminary election confirms my belief."

Pardoned By Truman

Curley was convicted of being a member of a group which took \$20,000 from clients on a promise of helping them get war contracts — even though the court conceded there was no evidence he profited personally.

President Truman gave him a pardon — clearing his record on this and a previous conviction

Youths, 17, Facing Kidnaping Charge

KLAMATH FALLS — (AP) — Federal charges of kidnaping have been filed against two St. Paul, Minn., boys, Buford Frederick Faust and William Charles England, each 17, accused of abducting a Medford man from Klamath Falls and taking him across the California state line.

The boys were arraigned before a U. S. commissioner at Redding, Calif., and returned to the Yreka, Calif., jail. Sheriff Al Cottar there said he would take them to Sacramento.

Faust and England are accused of kidnaping James R. Edwards, 24, of Medford at a tourist camp here and forcing him to accompany them in his car into California. Edwards escaped at the highway checking station below Dorris, Calif.

The boys were captured a few hours later Friday morning south of Dorris.

Faust said he is on probation from the Redwood reformatory at St. Paul on two burglary counts. They said they left St. Paul "10 or 12" days before meeting up with Edwards at Medford last Thursday afternoon. Edwards gave them a ride to Klamath Falls. A 32-cal.

Scientists Discover New Mountain On Ocean Floor

LA JOLLA, Calif. — (AP) — Two seafaring scientists have discovered an 11,400-foot mountain rising from the floor of the Pacific ocean. They believe it is the largest known seamount, as undersea peaks are called.

Its top is about a mile beneath seafloor 700 miles northeast of Hawaii and it is 18 miles across at the widest point of the base, the scientists said. They expressed surprise that it has not been noted before.

Warren S. Wooster, assistant oceanographer of the Scripps Institute of Oceanography, and Dr. Henry W. Menard, of the U. S. navy electronics laboratory, announced their find when they returned from a two-month exploration cruise.
