

Youthful Marine, Killed in Korea, Given High Praise

IHLEN, Minn. — (AP) — A Minnesota marine corporal killed in action last week in Korea was described by a marine corps general last night as "among the truly great patriots of our country."

At the age of 12, Tommy Johnson of Ihlen had offered to join the marines in 1942, saying "I am not afraid of danger."

"I am sure that marines all over the world will be proud to stand with me tonight in saluting your son," Major General MacQueen told Mrs. Gerard Johnson of Ihlen by telephone.

Corporal Johnson had written his parents that he was injured by shrapnel on September 7. By September 14 he was back in action. The defense department informed his parents that Tommy was

killed in action just three days later, on September 17.

Back in 1942, when Tommy was only 12 years old, he offered his services to the marine corps. Tommy wrote the commanding general of the marine corps base at San Diego:

"I am 12 years old and not afraid of danger. When I heard how the marines defended Wake Island, I decided to join them if I can."

Tommy was made an honorary corporal at the time and a complete marine uniform was sent to him. Soon after he was 18 he became a marine.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson have received no details of their son's death.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Lewis Howard, 31, stood at a Broadway shooting gallery with a .22 rifle and fired away at three targets — a bull's-eye, some envelopes he tossed in the air, and his own chin.

The envelopes, police said, contained suicide messages.

Howard was taken to a hospital in serious condition. The bullet passed through his chin into his head.

Vets' Eligibility For Fresh Loan Noted In New Act

World War II veterans, who in the past have used all or part of their GI loan benefits to buy homes, farms and businesses, may be eligible for additional GI home loan guarantees under the recently enacted defense housing act.

According to the Veterans administration, the housing act of 1950 raised the maximum guaranty on a GI home loan from 50 percent to 60 percent of the loan, and from \$4,000 to \$7,500, but only for veterans who previously had used none of their guaranty entitlement.

The new law grants to most veterans who used all or part of their guaranty rights the difference between what they already have used and \$7,500 for additional home loans. No additional guaranty is provided if the veteran obtained a home loan after April 20, 1950.

The VA said the defense housing act also reduces the minimum down payment required for GI loans on homes priced up to \$12,000, and revives the direct loan program for veterans in rural areas where a 4 percent mortgage financing is unavailable from private lenders.

The new minimum down payment schedule is as follows: Four percent on homes costing under \$7,000; six percent for homes from \$7,000 to \$10,000, and eight percent from \$10,000 to \$12,000.

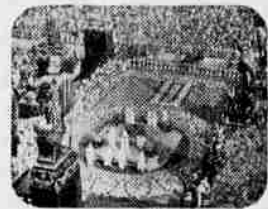
