Financier-Draft Dodger Faces U. S. Deportation

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Draft dodger Serge Rubinstein, onetime boy wizard of Wall Street, may come where his next dollar is coming from but he doesn't know where he will spend it.

Rubinstein is a man without a country. As he put it Monday at his deportation hearing, "I believe I'm stateless."

The United States wants to deport the Russian-born, 43-year-old financier because of his draft dodging conviction in 1943. After numerous appeals, Rubinstein served 18 months in 1947 and 1948.

Final decision on the deportation will come later in Washington. Rubinstein said he now is president of the Midway Victor Oil Co. of Texas; Mid-City Property, Inc., New York; and Carolina Property, Inc., a real estate operating firm. His current assets, his attorney said, are "top complicated" to describe.

Army Finds It Difficult To Purchase Beef Abroad

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The army is now looking abroad for 10,000,000 pounds of beef for armed services use in the United States. Announcement of this said up to 25 percent would be "good" grade instead of the customary "choice."

The army had previously announced it had been unable to fill in the United States a 10,000,000 pound beef order for use of troops in Europe, and was sending bids abroad.

On its first order, the army got only two responses, totalling 3,920,000 pounds, from Brazil and Uruguay. They were for "commercial" — the lowest beef grade, and the army rejected them.

Potato Grower Wins Congress Nomination

Bangor, Me. — (AP) — A potato farmer appeared today as the probable successor to the late Rep. Frank Felt (R) of Maine's Third congressional district.

Clifford G. McIntire, 43, was nominated by the usually victorious Republicans in a special primary Monday. He got almost 11,000 of 27,569 votes cast for a record field of seven candidates.

Democrats haven't won a Third district house race since 1932.

McIntire, who grows spuds at Penam, in Aroostook county, also is assistant general manager of Maine Potato Growers, Inc., the country's biggest potato cooperative, and a director of the National Potato council.

His opponents, in a special election Oct. 22 will be Mrs. Katherine M. Hickson, of Bangor, former Democratic national committee woman, and Ralph A. Dyer Jr., an Independent from Hampden.

Youth, 17, Identified As Lone Bank Robber

ROCKFORD, Ill. — (AP) The FBI says a 17-year-old Rockford youth had been identified as the robber who escaped with \$15,712 in cash Monday from the Woodford, Wis., State bank.

R. L. Murphy, agent in charge of the Madison FBI office, said Arthur Dredsko Jr., off jobs worker near Rockford, would be charged with violating the federal bank robbery statute.

Murphy said the agents who arrested Dredsko at his home recovered \$12,382 of the bank robbery loot.

FBI agents, authorities said, traced the Illinois license number of the automobile used by Dredsko to a Rockford car-renting agency. The car then was traced to Dredsko, who had rented it.

A lone gunman forced Jean Campbell, the bank teller, and a cashier Arleigh Johnson, to give up contents of a change box and then open the vault.

It was signed John Swarts, minister at the First Church of Christ in Portland.

Gregory said the heifer was gone all right. But there wasn't any \$180.

In Portland, available directories failed to list either the church or the signer of the note.

Beta Sigma Phi Chapters To Join In Celebration

Roseburg's six chapters of Beta Sigma Phi will commemorate international night Oct. 4 with a potluck dinner and program at the American Legion hall. This is one of the most important functions of the sorority year and will emphasize the organization's interest in world affairs.

Roseburg's 125 Beta Sigma Phi's will be joining with 100,000 members internationally reaffirming friendship and desire to help less fortunate people in other parts of the world.

Beta Sigma Phi was founded in 1931 and became international in 1937 and now includes chapters in the British Isles, Germany, Japan, Cuba, the Canal Zone, Alaska and Hawaii.

Chapters And Officials

The organization began in Roseburg with Mu chapter in 1936. Alpha Theta and Alpha Iota chapters were added in 1947. At that time also, Xi Epsilon, an Exemplar chapter, was formed. Last year, Gamma chapter, Nu Phi Mu, was originated as a little sister group composed of girls from 18-21. A sixth group, Si Omicron, Exemplar, has been formed this fall.

Presidents of these groups include Mrs. Daniel Dimick, Mu; Mrs. Bernard Saar, Xi Epsilon; Mrs. Robert Davie, Alpha Iota; Mrs. Jack Cummings, Alpha Theta; Miss Glenna Gill, Nu Phi Mu; and Mrs. Eugene Powell, Si Omicron. All the chapters are coordinated under a city council made up of representatives from all local chapters. Mrs. Don Gum is president of the council.

Beta Sigma Phi is both cultural and social and follows various courses of study prepared by international. Members present the programs by means of reports, forums, discussions and guest speakers at bi-monthly meetings. Social affairs include potlucks, dances and picnics.

In addition to passenger, air mail, air express and air freight, the planes can handle turkey, poultry, chicks, cut flowers and other like freight needing quick shipment.

Bullet Shower Misses In 5th Slaying Attempt

MANCHESTER, Ky. — (AP) — Fifteen bullets missed their mark in the fifth attempt on Walter Webb's life.

The 48-year-old Webb said he and his 17-year-old daughter, Zola, were wounded slightly when a flurry of bullets was rained on them from a mountainside.

Sheriff Oscar Hubbard said Webb's mule was killed by one of the bullets. Webb was working the mule in a field when the shots were fired.

Webb was hospitalized in Lexington recently for treatment of a bullet wound.

The man said a "certain clique" was after his life. He declines to name his enemies.

WOMAN NAMED MAYOR

OTTAWA — (AP) — Canada's capital has a woman mayor today, the only one of a Canadian city. She is Charlotte Whitton, a former welfare worker, who has been acting mayor since the death of Mayor Grenville Goodwin in August.

The city council elected her unanimously to fill out Goodwin's unexpired term.

Feeble-minded Children's Birth To Be Prevented

The birth of 760 feeble-minded children in Oregon will be prevented by the eugenic sterilizations thus far performed in this state, according to the estimate of Dr. Clarence J. Gamble, in the issue of the American Journal of Mental Deficiency which has just appeared. Dr. Gamble is a geneticist, formerly on the medical faculties of Harvard and the University of Pennsylvania.

In Oregon, 1,031 mentally deficient persons have been protected from parenthood at governmental expense. To have accomplished this by keeping them in institutions would thus far have cost more than \$5,880,000 and required more than 16,900 patient-years of institutional life.

By a recent study made in New Hampshire it was found that each female sterilized would otherwise probably have had 2½ more children. Of those born before sterilization, 36 percent were found to be feeble-minded. Consequently each sterilization of a mentally deficient female will prevent the birth of about one feeble-minded child. For males the number of children was about half as great.

At this rate Dr. Gamble estimates that the protection of the 1,031 persons in Oregon will mean that 760 children will be spared the inheritance of mental deficiency, and the upbringing by feeble-minded parents. In all of the 27 states having sterilization laws, the 25,903 sterilizations so far performed will prevent the birth of 19,000 feeble-minded children.

Newlyweds Mistakenly Jailed In California

Two teen-age newly-married couples from Glendale spent their wedding night in the custody of juvenile authorities at Yreka, Calif.

The Yreka police, suspecting them to be runaways, had jailed the foursome pending word from their parents.

The parents had granted permission for the marriages, it was learned by local state police, who were asked to make the investigation.

Congress May Erase Relief Publicity Ban

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Congress will begin studies early next month on whether to lift the federal ban on making public the names of persons getting relief payments.

Chairman Doughton (D-NC) said his house ways and means committee will begin hearings Oct. 8 on the 1939 law which also requires states receiving federal aid funds to comply with the secrecy ban.

Indiana was cut off from federal funds in July because of a new state law making its welfare rolls public.

Rep. Harrison (D-Va) introduced the bill to repeal the secrecy requirement. His measure not only would make possible publication of the names of relief recipients, but the amounts received.

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
