He attended the Roseburg public schools and was graduated from Linfield college, McMinnville. He taught in the public schools of Myrtle Creek, Riddle and Roseburg for a number of years.

He was married in 1914 to Miss Evelyn Burlingame in Pasadena, Calif. She preceded him in death in 1933. In March of 1938, he was married to Blanche Wright.

In later life he engaged in stock raising on his farm on the Camas Valley Star route. He had been

active in all community affairs. He was a member of the First Baptist church of Roseburg; of the Phillarian lodge, 8, of the Odd Fellows; was secretary of the Roberts Creek water district and was present master of the Evergreen Grange.

The Iranians are taking over 2,500 vehicles which the British brought in, including a bus fleet of 250 that daily transported 30,000 Iranian workmen to their jobs.

They also control housing built by AIOC for about 11,000. One of the last AIOC acts was to pay out about 90,000 pounds to contractors housing projects.

The national Iranian oil company also inherits the former AIOC headquarters — for example, a payroll of about \$3,000,000 monthly for the Iranian employees both here and in the outlying oil fields.

The British figure the Iranians may have some trouble, too, in maintaining the public facilities. Ross said he believed from conversations with top Iranian officials that they would accept "some sort of foreigners to come in and run the industry."

For the Iranians, it marked at least temporary success in getting rid of the British they accuse of exploiting the country.

Iranians credited President Truman with stepping in and advising the British not to use force to keep a foothold in the Persian gulf refinery. Britain had indicated earlier it might land troops to protect its technicians, if needed, and to hold Abadan until the nationalization issue is finally settled.

Home Extension Unit Meetings To Begin Friday

"Party Planning" will be the project demonstrated at the first meeting of the year for the Melrose Home Extension unit Friday, Oct. 5, at 11 a. m. at the Melrose Grange hall.

The Melrose unit is one of 19 such groups in Douglas county. The extension program is a public educational service carried on cooperatively by the federal, state, and county governments. In Oregon it is under the direct supervision of Oregon State college at Corvallis.

Home extension units meet once each month from October to May. At these meetings the officers preside over the business session, and in addition, there is always a demonstration on some phase of home-making. This year Betty J. Peterson, Douglas county extension agent, will present three demonstrations for each unit. The others will be conducted by project leaders from the units, to be trained by staff members of the college.

Here is the list and dates of demonstrations scheduled for the Melrose unit this year: Party Planning, Oct. 5; Nutritious Meals at Low Cost, Nov. 2; Holiday Decorations from Nature, Dec. 7; Window Treatments, Jan. 4; Oven Meals, Feb. 1; Draperies, March 7; Dry Cleaning, April 4; Accessories for the Home, May 2. In addition, on Jan. 23 there will be a special meeting on the use of sewing machine attachments, a Homemakers' festival on May 9 for all Douglas county units, and a Better Dress workshop in March for those who participated in the Cotton Dress workshop.

The party planning project includes planning for a party from selection of a theme, activities, favors, and general suggestions for having a successful party whether at home or for a large community gathering.

The business meeting will begin promptly at 11 o'clock. Those attending should bring a sandwich and piece of fruit. A committee will serve dessert and coffee. Plans for the care of children during meetings will be decided upon so that mothers with young children may also attend. All are welcome.

Poverty Plea Fails To Free Contino Of Fine

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Despite his plea of poverty, Dick Contino, onetime \$4,000-a-week accordionist, must pay a \$10,000 fine for draft dodging.

Contino is serving a six months sentence at McNeill island prison farm. His attorneys told Federal District Judge Michael J. Roche that Contino is so poor he could honestly take a pauper's oath.

Judge Roche said Contino's financial status was brought about by people who were "avaricious."

"I'm satisfied that those who took his money can raise his fine," Judge Roche said.

Contino's attorney, James T. Davis, said the 21-year-old entertainer was in debt "between \$20,000 and \$25,000."

Seventy eight others pleaded innocent and 20 received continuances. Bonds of 18 defendants were forfeited when they failed to appear.

Fund Approved To Pay Vets' Death Indemnities

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House appropriations committee has approved an immediate allotment of \$5,000,000 to pay the \$10,000 death indemnities approved this year for servicemen killed in action.

The death benefits, payable over a period of 120 months, are for beneficiaries of men of all branches of the service who lost their lives while in uniform. They are in lieu of the insurance previously offered to men in service at small cost, and amount to \$10,000 free life insurance.

The appropriations committee said the money is needed at once because payments to an estimated 12,000 beneficiaries are being held up.

8 Missing Deer Hunters Found

Howard Bybee, 30, Ontario, found his way out of the woods near Unity in Baker county. He was reported missing Tuesday night.

State police said they were not searching for Andrew Christianson, Portland. He was reported missing east of Bend Sunday by a hunting companion. The companion returned to the woods to search for Christianson and presumably found him as he did not call police again.
