PASADENA, Calif. — (AP) — Donny Marton, four, his head scarcely healed from a series of three brain operations, is to undergo a fourth.

The new surgery is needed to relieve pressure at the base of the brain which is retarding Donny's recovery.

The boy was brought here several months ago from Canada by his father, Arthur Marton. Marton returned to harvest crops on his farm at Archerwill, Saskatchewan, after the first three operations.

Donny has gained 15 pounds since his arrival. He weighed 29 then.
