All veterans are urged to apply for the bonus as soon as possible. Even though they are doubtful of their rights to the state benefits, they are asked to make out the application and submit it for certification.

The original discharge is not to be submitted. Those in charge of the both in the Grand hotel can make out the application on the basis of the original, but the one being sent in must be a certified copy obtained from the county clerk.

DENVER — (AP) — The International Woodworkers of America (CIO) will not take a no strike pledge as asked by Economic Stabilizer Charles E. Wilson.

Five hundred delegates to the

annual convention of the IWA voted against the pledge.

"The IWA will not give a no strike pledge as long as profiteers gamble with the destinies of our servicemen and the general public with the only thought being to maintain and increase profits," asserted union President James E. Fearling of Portland, Ore.

Delegates approved resolutions which:

Call for a timber management policy and federal regulations of all cutting on private timberlands.

Oppose "anti-labor injunction" provisions of the Taft-Hartley law.

CHICAGO — (AP) — The editor of the University of Chicago's student newspaper has been fired for sponsoring and attending the Communist World Youth festival in East Berlin last August.

A university statement said the dismissed editor of the weekly Chicago Maroon is Alan D. Kimmel, 24, a graduate geography student, who is still in eastern Europe.

The Maroon staff said that an all-campus meeting would be called to protest Kimmel's dismissal.

Coach Bill Reder Has Confidence In Indian Eleven

"The Indian football players are better boys than those on the Grants Pass team, which is rated number one in the state," high school Coach Bill Reder told Rotarians Thursday.

He addressed the Rotarians in the Civic room of the Hotel Umpqua during a noon luncheon, and was introduced by Cecil Sherwood, athletic director at the high school.

"Once we have instilled our team with the spirit to win, we will definitely have a winner," the tall coach stated.

In explaining the poor showing that Roseburg gridders had against smaller schools in the past, he pointed to the lack of an elementary build-up program.

"All of the top teams in the state have a rigid system of creating a strong team," he said. "Medford, especially, has been laying a groundwork for winning squads in their lower grades for years."

Stresses Grid Camp

Reder turned his attention to the pre-season football camp that was held this year. It is a necessity now he explained, because most of the other schools have them and they acquire an athletic advantage.

"But the main reason for building a winning team is to increase school interest," Reder noted. "It keeps those students in school who would otherwise leave and, because they are required to maintain a certain scholastic standard, they also get an education."

Looking toward the future, Reder stressed the growth in population and said that from the increase in student enrollment more talent would be available.

"Once the Indians have found that they possess as much playing ability as their opponents, they will be hard to stop," the coach explained. "When they come up against a high school now, they lack the winning attitude."

When asked about the outcome of the game with Medford tonight, Reder said that his team was capable of an upset.

Prices Of Beef Switch Public To Other Foods

of five in Seattle, Wash., scanned the price lists and said:

"Little by little we are being driven to a pork diet."

A meat market operator in an exclusive residential area of Denver summed up consumer reaction this way:

"Most women don't know the prices they used to pay for meat in comparison with what they're paying now. But they have been reading in the newspapers and hearing on the radio that beef prices are high."

"So they are trying to buy less beef. We never have sold as much pork, poultry and fish as we are now."

Beef Prices Soar

The Office of Price Stabilization's new order permitted retailers to change their beef prices Monday. It was an up-and-down adjustment. The changes ranged from a reduction of 20 cents a pound on some choice (high) grades to a hike of as much as 25 cents a pound on some utility (low) grades.

But, overall, it increased beef prices an average of 14 to 20 cents a pound at the butcher's counter.

U. S. department of Agriculture meat experts say the high prices reflect a demand that is greater than the supply.

The American Meat Institute, trade organization of packers, says the number of cattle delivered to 12 major livestock markets in the last four months showed a drop of 12 percent under the number received in the corresponding period of 1950.

It adds that there was a decrease of 29 percent in the same period in the number of beef animals slaughtered at 95 leading beef-processing plants.

"These plants," said an AMI spokesman, "were unable to buy more beef animals without running the risk of violating OPS ceiling regulations."
