Investigators Hint Of Late Scandals In Tax Department

WASHINGTON — (AP) — House investigators hinted today at new revelations of scandals within the Internal Revenue bureau in the wake of mounting allegations of tax shake-downs and sideline profits by key tax collection officials. But the probers would not say what was to come when they get back to work Tuesday.

As unfolded thus far by a house ways and means subcommittee, it was a story studded by grand jury indictments, dismissals and resignations featuring district tax collectors in such scattered spots as New York, Boston, St. Louis and San Francisco. However, Chairman King (D-Calif.), indicated investigation has halted the alleged irregularities.

When the subcommittee recessed last night, King stated:

"I think that during this week's hearings we have seen enough to indicate that we are dealing with a scheme that was intended to embrace more than just a single collector's office, and that had begun to spread across the nation when it was frustrated."

Meanwhile, Internal Revenue Commissioner John B. Dunlap announced the resignation of Carroll E. Mealey as deputy commissioner in charge of the alcohol tax unit, for reasons of ill health.

Mealey's letter of resignation, in the deputy's handwriting, was made effective at the close of business yesterday. It was dated the previous day, Oct. 4, from Mealey's home at Albany, N. Y.

Mealey informed Dunlap he had suffered a recurrence of a heart condition, and that on doctor's orders he was forced to take at least a 30-day rest.

Dunlap accepted the resignation. In a letter to Chairman King Dunlap termed Mealey "an outstanding public servant." He said he was making the announcement through the committee to "centering on the internal revenue service would not reflect on Mealey's resignation."

King said the committee had planned to call Mealey in its investigation because of testimony received from James B. E. Olson, alcohol tax unit supervisor in New York who resigned last August when the committee first began its inquiry.

Driver of the other car was Charles J. Veal, 145 East Taft road, police said.

Barbara Payton Asked To Give Murder Details

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Barbara Payton, blonde prize in a recent Hollywood brawl, will be asked to tell a federal grand jury what she knows about the killing of an underworld informer.

U. S. Attorney Ray H. Kinnison said yesterday the actress has been served with a subpoena ordering her to appear before the grand jury 12 days hence.

He explained that an inquiry is being reopened into the million dollar narcotics ring which operated in California until Abe Davidson, gang member and key witness in the case, was shot to death as he slept in a Fresno apartment on Feb. 28, 1950.

In court last year, Barbara Payton provided an alibi for one Stanley W. Adams, suspected as a member of the ring and in the Davidson killing. She said Adams was in her apartment the day Davidson was rubbed out.

Two Big Bills To Get Priority

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Two of the biggest bills of the 82nd Congress — a \$56,937,808,030 defense budget and a \$7,483,400,000 foreign aid measure — are slated for a high priority when the Senate meets Monday. Administration leaders are confident they will be pushed through rapidly and with little trouble.

The defense budget measure, biggest peacetime appropriation bill in the nation's history, cleared the House yesterday. It previously had passed both branches but differences over amounts forced a second trip through Congress.

Its total includes \$19,888,032,030 for the army, \$15,877,801,000 for the navy and marine corps, \$20,642,785,000 for the air force and \$529,100,000 for the office of Secretary of Defense.

The services have in addition an estimated \$37,000,000 in carry-over funds from previous appropriations, making a total of \$94,000,000 available for spending. Of this, an estimated \$40,000,000 is expected to be actually spent during the fiscal year ending next June 30.

Dean Confirms Report On U. S. Atomic Missiles

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gordon Dean, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, said in testimony made public today that the United States will have some atomic guided missiles "and things of that type" by next year.

Testifying before the senate appropriations committee, Dean was asked about a recent speech by Senator McMahon (D-Conn.) in which McMahon spoke of "more and more specialists equipped to fire an atomic shell . . . and more short-range guided missiles with atomic warheads."

Senator Gordon (R-Ore.) asked Dean whether these weapons are already available or "will be" next year.

"Some of these will be," Dean replied.

Dean's testimony was given two weeks ago. The committee was considering a supplemental appropriation bill.

Women Control 65 Percent Of Wealth Forum Is Told

"Statistics show that 65 percent of the wealth of the United States is controlled by women," stated R. M. Alton, vice president and trust officer of the U. S. National bank, Portland, at the Women's Trust forum held from 2 to 4 p. m. Friday at the Hotel Umpqua civic room.

Since so much of the wealth of this country is controlled by women the U. S. National bank of Portland has been conducting forums throughout the state to assist women to know all they should regarding wills, estates and trusts.

Harold E. Schmeer, manager of the Roseburg branch, was master of ceremonies and introduced the three speakers, Col. Alton, who talked on "The Women's Trust Forum," L. B. Staver, "Wills and Estates," and D. W. Mackay, "Modern Trusts."

Col. Alton, elected national president of the Trust division in 1948, explained the advantages of sponsoring the forums and of the information available to all persons desiring to contact bank executives.

Staver, who is a trustee officer, gave a complete outline on how wills are made and the legal administrations necessary to settle estates. At the close of his talk, a number of questions were asked, which he answered.

Mackay, also a trustee officer, gave a detailed outline regarding

the various types of modern trusts and explained the difference between revocable and irrevocable trusts. He also answered questions asked following his talk.

Four Gangsters Slay Man Who Talked Too Much

CLIFFSIDE PARK, N. J. — (AP) Authorities said today they are moving in a half-dozen directions to track down four killers of underworld chatterbox Willie Moretti.

Deputy attorney general Harry Towe said progress was being made although there were still no identified suspects nor a motive for the old-fashioned gangland slaying of the roly-poly gambler under subpoena to appear before a special racket grand jury next Tuesday.

No clues as to who pumped two .38 calibre bullets into Moretti's head in a local restaurant shortly before noon Thursday have been found.

Moretti boasted that he was a pal of underworld czars Frank Costello, Lucky Luciano, Joe Adonis and the late Al Capone but he denied before the senate crime committee that he was ever a director of Murder, Inc., a group of hired gunmen. He had been identified as such by former Mayor William O'Dwyer of New York.

Moretti, who had sold his \$100,000 Hasbrouck Heights home and was reported ready to quit the committee most cooperative witnesses by Sen. Estes Kefauver.

"It is pretty clear that Moretti talked too much and had been talking too much for too long," Kefauver said when he learned of the Paddy Gambler's death. Rudolph Halley, former counsel to the committee, said that at one time Costello ordered Moretti to go to California because he talked too much.

Towe said the killers were obviously Moretti's friends and that a planned ambush had been arranged to kill the man who once bragged that he was too well-liked to be murdered.

Wisconsin GOP Leaders Plugging For Senator Taft

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Prominent Wisconsin Republicans who supported Harold E. Stassen in 1948 have shifted to Senator Taft of Ohio as a candidate.

Thirteen men described as the "dominant group" in Wisconsin Republican ranks have urged Taft to enter their state's presidential primary next April 1.

Although many of them backed Stassen in the last race, they told Taft "without any obligation on your part, we will support your candidacy in every way possible."

Taft has been making speeches and sounding out sentiment he says will help him make up his mind. A group of St. Louis Republicans have opened a Stassen headquarters and Stassen, now president of the University of Pennsylvania, has promised to confer with them before making any announcement.

Republican leaders here regard the Wisconsin move as significant because Wisconsin has been a Stassen stronghold. He won the 1948 primary easily, getting 19 of the 27 delegates then elected. Gen. Douglas MacArthur got the other eight.

Carpenters Union Joins Fight On Plywood Co-Ops

PORTLAND — (AP) — The AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union has received promise of support in an announced campaign against co-operatives in the plywood industry.

Frank Chapman, co-ordinator for the carpenters' union, said his union would demand that employers put a union label on all wood produced by L.S.W.U. members, and insist that contractors use only the labelled wood.

He spoke at the northwest district convention of the L.S.W.U., which earlier condemned the plywood co-operatives as "union-busting" firms.

Heroism Shown By Dad In Saving Family In Wreck

GATLINBURG, Tenn. — (AP) — A 28-year-old father's heroism played a leading part in getting his family to safety after their car plunged down a steep mountainside.

Sherman Burnette, a rubber worker from Akon, O., carried one of his three injured children to safety by climbing 150 feet up the precipitous bank.

Passing motorists formed a "human chain" partway down the bank to aid Burnette in bringing another child to safety.

Then he collapsed.

A physician and Smoky mountain park rangers used ropes to haul Burnette's wife and another child up the almost vertical bank. Burnette was only slightly hurt when the car went down the mountainside Tuesday night, but his wife suffered head and internal injuries, and may have a broken back. Four-year-old Sheron was the most seriously hurt among the children; she received possible internal injuries. Another daughter, Gloria, 6, and an infant son, Kenneth, were scratched and bruised.

Sea's Search Continues For Ship's Survivors

ELIZABETH CITY, N. C. — (AP) — Ships and planes searched a 60-mile area off Cape Hatteras today for possible survivors of a freighter that broke in two in hurricane-swept waters Friday.

Seven survivors and five bodies have been picked up. One survivor died. But there was little hope today that more members of the 23-man crew would be found alive.

The 3,325-ton Southern Isles, a converted LST (landing ship, tank), snapped amidships early Friday in heavy seas about 200 miles southeast of Cape Hatteras. She was bound from San Juan, Puerto Rico, to Cheter, Pa., with a cargo of iron ore.

Administrator Of Estate Files On Death Claims

Leslie C. Roots, administrator of the estate of Carlisle F. Roots, Thursday filed suit against the Southern Pacific company and J. O. Eifert asking damages on a fatal car-train collision.

Roots asks a total of \$16,400 damages on two causes of action, alleging the S.P. company and Eifert, engineer on the locomotive, were negligent and careless in the operation of a locomotive which collided with the car on the Garden Valley road-S.P. tracks junction.

Roots was killed Aug. 13, 1950.
