Italy Splitting Estates To Dole Among Peasants
ROME — (AP) — Five thousand more landless peasants will be given arms of their own within the next three weeks under Italy's land reform program. It is being pushed hard to counter a Communist-inspired "invasion" of Italy's big estates.
The new allocations are the second major step toward land distribution since Italy passed her land reform laws. The first breakdown of the big estates started a year ago. At that time 15,000 acres of government expropriated lands were parceled out to 1,000 peasant families who never before had owned the soil they tilled.
The new divisions will raise the figures to 65,000 acres distributed among 6,000 farm families.
That is only a start. The law provides for the carving up of one-tenth of Italy's farmland — giving more than 100,000 peasant families nearly 1,500,000 acres of land that will be their own.
Italy's strong Communist party is crying out that the program is too small and too slow.
Less than one percent of Italy's 77,000 private landowners have held over 42 percent of the total lands. Most of Italy's four million farmers are share-croppers, tenant farmers, or laborers on land they cannot own.

LONDON — (AP) — The British Broadcasting corporation has banned a political speech entitled, "Having a Baby in 1951."
It was to have been given by a social service worker during a women's hour program.
The government-owned BBC is not carrying anything that smacks of politics during the present election campaign. Only elections are five political speeches allowed the Labor and Conservative parties and a lesser number for minor parties.
In Friday's instance, BBC said the talk was ruled out because it dealt with the government health service, which gives aid to expectant mothers. That service was introduced by the present Socialist regime.

First Quarter's U. S. Deficit Not Up To Forecast
WASHINGTON — (AP) — The government wound up the first quarter of this fiscal year \$2,614,986,764 in the red — biggest single quarter deficit in history except in all-out war years.
Defense spending was one big reason. The Treasury reported defense outlays from July 1 to Oct. 1 amounted to \$9,232,000,000, compared with only \$3,394,000,000 for the same period last year.
This year's first quarter deficit compares with a net surplus of \$296,347,044 at this time last year, after the first full quarter of the Korean war.
Total spending for the past three months jumped to \$14,888,766,353, compared with cash outlays of \$9,048,608,072 in the first quarter last year.
Income from taxes and other sources amounted to \$12,373,779,588 in the first quarter this year, an increase over last year's figure of \$9,344,955,117.
The Treasury gave this breakdown in spending by major defense agencies, compared with last year:
Air force, \$2,590,399,918 to \$1,182,668,040 last year; army (military functions), \$3,426,269,527 to \$809,527,688; navy \$2,211,571,238 to \$900,280,510; atomic energy commission \$333,534,206 to \$154,045,129; military aid to foreign countries \$372,751,880 to \$60,766,482.
Actually, the current deficit still is not as bad as predicted. Treasury Secretary Snyder said at the outset of the fiscal year, July 1, the government might run as much as \$3,500,000,000 in the red the first quarter.

Dealers Given Permit To Increase Coal Price
WASHINGTON — (AP) — The government has authorized retail dealers to charge consumers an additional 14 cents per net ton for coal because of higher freight rates approved in August.
Previously the Office of Price Stabilization had permitted the estimated 18,000 dealers to pass along a six cents per net ton freight rate increase granted by the Interstate Commerce commission last April. The ICC approved the additional rate hike Aug. 8.
