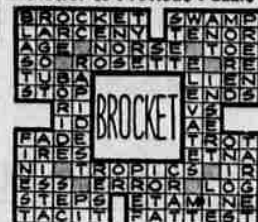

Would Salary Raise Mean Improved Type of Congressmen? Question raised By \$25,000-A-Year Proposal In House

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Members of the Senate and House get a salary of \$12,500 a year, plus \$2,500, tax-free, for expenses. But this doesn't seem enough to Rep. McCormack of Massachusetts, Democratic leader of the House.

In fact, he says the pay is "unfortunate." And to correct this situation he got up in the house and suggested salaries of members of Congress ought to be \$25,000 a year. He was widely applauded.

When he heard about McCormack's proposal an eager-beaver of my acquaintance, a serious young man who takes a great interest in government, raised a question.

He said: "If all members of Congress got \$25,000, I wonder if we'd have a better Congress, better men."

It's quite possible there are a lot of men, more capable than a lot of members of Congress, who feel they can't afford to run for Congress because they're making more than \$15,000 although less than \$25,000.

And if the pay was raised to \$25,000 they might be willing to have a go at it, but when he tried to examine his problem from all sides the eager-beaver wasn't sure that good pay alone means a better Congress.

First of all, he'd like to see there a man who put the interests and welfare of his country above the interests of himself and his party. He was sure quite a few did, although a few crooks have been discovered in Congress and jailed.

And he was badly disturbed many times by the haggling in Congress when he felt the members were lining up on an issue not so much on its merits but on party lines.

But, anyway, the second most important thing to the eager-beaver was this: he'd like to see a cross-section of American life in Congress since whatever Congress did cut across all sections of American life.

And sure enough, when he examined the record, he found that members of Congress drawing the present \$15,000 are a cross-section: doctors, lawyers, educators, tradesmen, businessmen, millionaires and men apparently without a dime.

By this time the eager-beaver was getting a headache. He thought he'd wait and see whether Congress, which has been screaming about cutting down expenses although raising some government pay, would raise its own. There didn't seem much chance it would this year.

Bolting Mother Church Costs Priest His Frock

FRESNO, Calif. — (AP) — A Fresno Armenian priest has been defrocked for leading his congregation out of the mother church after accusing it of being Communist-dominated.

Vartan Kasparian, San Francisco, archbishop of the California diocese of the Armenian Apostolic church, reduced the Rev. Y. Egeho Mekhitarian to layman.

Mekhitarian and his congregation bolted the mother church last Friday.

U. S. Will Buy Oregon, Washington Apples

PORTLAND — The government will buy 264,000 boxes of surplus apples from Washington, another 30,000 from Oregon growers this year.

The purchase program, disclosed here by a department of Agriculture spokesman, began Oct. 1. It will continue through Dec. 31, although the deadline for offering apples to the government will come Nov. 10.

Jonathan, Golden Delicious and Rome Beauty varieties will be bought with prices ranging from \$1.90 down to \$1.60 a box. Last year the government paid \$1.65. The apples go to the school lunch program.

If another purchase program is needed, it will be held after Jan. 1 with Newtons and Winesaps, on the purchase list.

The prices in the coming purchase program: Size 180 or larger, 2 1/2 inch min., place or tray pack \$1.90; other acceptable packs \$1.80. Size 198-216, 2 1/4 inch min., place or tray pack \$1.70, other acceptable packs \$1.60.

Washington 'Grassman' Champion Is Chosen

PORTLAND — (AP) — The last of the finalists was named Wednesday for the Pacific Northwest "grassman of the year" contest.

He is Laurence Møllergaard, route 1, Ellensburg, named the Washington champion. Named as other state champions earlier were Harold E. Smith, Darlington, Idaho, and Walter Lierman, Polk county, Oregon.

One of them will be crowned northwest champion of the Pacific International Livestock exposition here Oct. 10.

Møllergaard, a native of Denmark, was selected by a committee named by the Portland chamber of commerce. He won the award for restoring to pasture some 3200 acres overgrazed by sheep, wild horses and other stock.

Elmer Adams, Sequim, was a runner-up in the Washington contest.
