New Parley Looms
Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway has accepted in principle the Communist proposal that Korean cease-fire talks begin anew near Panmunjom.

The supreme Allied commander said a site in the "immediate vicinity" of that Red outpost, six miles southeast of Kaesong, would meet the "fundamental condition of equality of movement and control."

The Reds broke off the talks at Kaesong Aug. 23. Ridgway told the top Communist commanders in Korea he was instructing his liaison officers to meet Red liaison officers Wednesday to hammer out details for reopening talks.

Inspector U. T. Bartholomew identified him as Pfc. Norman Seidenzahl of Baltimore, Md., stationed at Fort Campbell, Ky., with the 11th airborne division.

His two paratrooper buddies told police Seidenzahl vaulted the bridge rail after they had jokingly challenged him to make the jump. They said he wrenched away when they tried to hold him.

Reseeding Begun On Burned Areas

Reseeding operations of forest fire burns in the upper Elgarose area of the Hubbard creek fire and also in the Vincent burn have been started.

George Felt, local airport operator, is sowing grass seed for farmers in the Elgarose area. Seed sown before last week's rainfall is already growing, Felt said.

Thus far, Felt said, an area of some 500 acres has been covered in the Hubbard creek burn. Figures on acreage reseeded in the 23,000-acre Vincent creek fire were not available today.

Seeding of additional areas in the Hubbard creek burn will be done sometime within the next week or ten days for the state game commission, Felt said.

Felt is flying a Stinson Reliant for the seeding operations. The areas to be seeded are marked off on the corners by markers visible from the air. The sowing of the seed is done by another person in the plane operating the seeder.

Complete coverage of each area is assured through making passes in two directions over the section, Felt said.

Tuna Fishers Retaliate

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — San Francisco's commercial tuna fishermen retaliated 50,000 pounds of albacore on fishermen's wharf Sunday — at 25 cents a pound.

The bargain sale of the small tuna fish started in protest against absence of a protective tariff on Japanese tuna. It developed into a thriving business.

"This thing may develop into something like a farmer's market, with the middleman cut out," said Jeff Kibre, secretary of the independent fishermen's union. "We'll keep selling as long as this demand keeps up."

He found Dillard's pickup truck in the Lilly lake area just south of the Oregon line and not far from the stalene town of New Pine Creek.

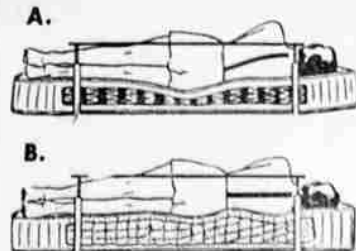
DRUNK CHARGE FACED

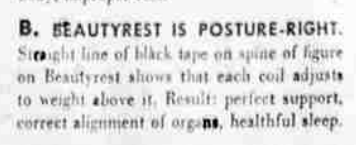
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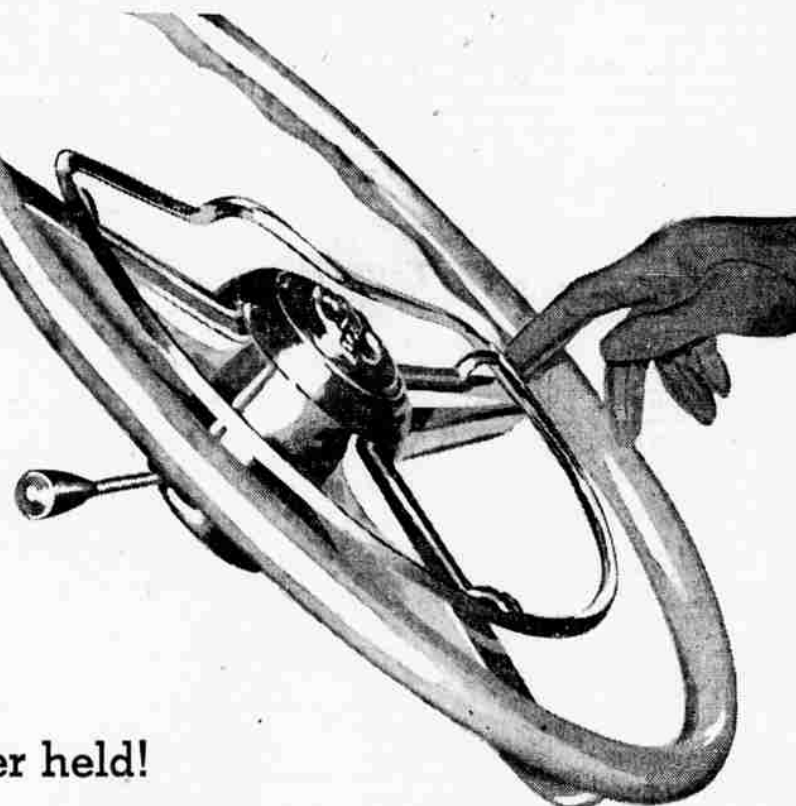
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
