The Arab league last night promised "unqualified support" to Egypt in her struggle with the British. Representatives of Saudia Arabia, Jordan, Syria, Lebanon, Iraq and Yemen met with Egyptian delegates in Alexandria and announced the Arab nations "support" Egypt unconditionally in her struggle toward realization of her national aims.

Legislation to cancel the 1899 and 1936 treaties with Britain was being speeded through the Egyptian parliament. A senate committee unanimously approved the government bills abrogating the 20-year mutual defense alliance of 1936 and the older accord setting up joint Anglo-Egyptian rule of the Sudan. The Egyptians want sole control of the cotton-growing Sudan, which adjoins Egypt to the south. This one question has been the stumbling block to agreement on revision of the 1936 pact through five years of negotiation.

The Foreign Minister of Egypt Pasha told newsmen that when the abrogation laws are ratified the government will apply "strong measures" to enforce them. He did not elaborate. An informant from the ruling Wafdist party said however, that the government might cut off supplies of fresh food and drinking water to force the British troops to leave.

The 1936 treaty permits Britain to keep up to 10,000 soldiers and an air force of 400 planes in the Suez canal area. Egypt has charged the British forces exceed these numbers.

Pavement To Be Installed On High School Street

Workmen will start paving the street between the old high school building and the new Library Arts building Thursday, reports Roseburg District 4 School Superintendent Paul S. Elliott.

Grading and foundation work was begun on the street last Friday. Superintendent Elliott said it would take about two days to complete the paving. When completed, the improved road will extend to Corey and Harvard streets.

The street is being paved to protect the buildings from mud and rocks, which were thrown against the structures by passing vehicles.

Balloon Enjoins Fire Prevention Observance

No, the earth hasn't developed a new satellite, as one might suspect if they had viewed the strange apparition above the city of Roseburg in the hazy mist of early dawn today.

It's just a war-surplus weather balloon, and on it is painted the letters, "P. F." Those letters stand for prevent fires.

The balloon is suspended 500 feet above the city hall and is being used to advertise National Fire Prevention week. Today is open house at the fire station.

The balloon, said Fire Chief William Mills, is 13 feet in diameter. It is filled with 60 percent air and 40 percent helium gas.

Filling the balloons was no easy task. Four were acquired by the chief, but in filling them with air and gas, three broke. Only one was successfully inflated and sent aloft Tuesday afternoon.

Improvements In B. L. M. Work Lead To Awards

The Pacific Northwest office of the bureau of land management announced that John C. Hunt and Otto C. F. Kreuger have been awarded one hundred dollars each for work improvement suggestions.

Roscoe E. Bell, regional administrator of the bureau, said Hunt, who is regional fire control officer for the B.L.M. forest districts, won his award for a suggested change in the first aid treatment of burns and the burn remedies to be carried in bureau first aid kits.

Kreuger, district forester of the Eugene district, submitted a proposed questionnaire explaining the O. & C. timber sale program to prospective bidders. The award was granted the district forester when it was estimated that his idea could save the government \$3,000 or more per year.

Bell explained that the bureau maintained a constant campaign to improve the efficiency of its activities and increase its services to the public, but at the same time it strives to find quicker and more economical ways of doing the work. All employees are encouraged to study closely their job, and so far as possible, the whole bureau program, and to make suggestions for work improvements. The suggestions are carefully screened by a committee. Occasionally there is an outlined plan or suggestion of sufficient importance to be given an award.

Bill was the champion steer wrestler at the Roseburg rodeo this last year.

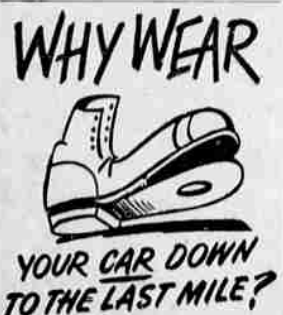
ESTATE IN PROBATE
