Series On Radio Begun To Stress Civil Defense Job

County Director Brig. Gen. J. T. Pierce launched a series of civil defense radio lectures Wednesday night by comparing our home defense needs to our grandfathers'.

He said our forebears a couple of generations ago had to carry their guns with them when they worked in the field. That, in effect, is the method we must use in what he called "These dizzy times."

Pierce insisted that in another war, no nation will attack until it is ready to attack us on our own soil. Continuing, he said, the government is taking cognizance of this possibility and it is one which the individuals in Douglas county must face, too.

He said Russia may use "continuous emergencies" to dissipate our strength, but in the final showdown the war must come to us. The basic responsibility, to be

trained, rests on you, the citizen," he emphasized.

Pierce named three things the county must be prepared for: 1. Sabotage, 2. Hysteria from rumors growing out of an attack and 3. Disaster in a population center such as Portland, which may call for aid from the entire state.

The broadcast over KRXL was the first of a series of Tuesday and Sunday discussions by county civil defense officials and experts over this station.

Course For Sales Clerks Sponsored By Retail Assn.

The Retail Trades association, at its meeting Wednesday noon at the Hotel Umpqua, voted to sponsor a sales clerks orientation course.

The course would be conducted by the vocational educational division of the state department of education and administered by Jack Brookings, coordinator, through the Roseburg school system.

A nominal tuition fee would be born either by the enrollee or the sponsoring organization.

Brookings spoke to the Retail Trades association at its meeting Wednesday, explaining the course and advantages it offers in training prospective sales clerks for permanent or temporary positions in stores, especially during such periods as the Christmas shopping season.

The course would build up a pool of workers available through their registration with the Oregon State employment service.

George Foster, manager of the employment service here, said his office would cooperate in giving aptitude tests as a basis both for the individual to best choose his or her line of work, but also to give the employer an opportunity to study their qualifications.

A committee, Bruce Elliott, Harold Barber, Mable Lewis and Rod Nevue, with others to be chosen by those named, was appointed by John Hardiman, president, to work out a tentative study program, based upon prepared courses of study, but adaptable to the local situation.

Decorations Considered
Another matter discussed was Christmas decorations. City Manager W. A. Gilchrist was present and offered full cooperation of the city in putting up the decorations in any manner the retail association chooses. Louis Adamski, John Bates and Jack West were appointed to work with Gilchrist in checking the inventory of decorations and to make other arrangements. The decorations will be put up sometime during Thanksgiving week.

Hardiman announced that a trial "flash system" was to be run Saturday, to check any "leaks" in the organization. The spokesman said if the wet weather had been two more days in coming, the road work could have been completed.

Road men were attempting to get as much work as possible done this season in preparation for possible paving next year, the court said.

Military Construction Billions Voted By House

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House today passed a \$4,423,358,970 appropriation bill, chiefly for military construction and the Atomic Energy commission.

It refused by roll-call vote of 182 to 127 to knock from the measure \$12,821,000 for an airport at President Truman's home town, Grandview, Mo.

The measure now goes to the Senate.
