Coach Reder Alters Lineup For Big Game

Only Five Seniors Left In Starting Formation; Adds Weight Advantage

Tonight Coach Bill Reder has done some juggling in his starting lineup for the game at Marshfield tonight is the understatement of the year.

A quick glance over the opening squad shows only five senior starters. Even more startling, three of the starters are sophomores. They are Bill Steele and Jim Gilbert at ends and John Desbians at left half. These are all new faces not on last week's starting lineup. Leroy Wehde is back at a tackle spot after being out with an injury suffered in school. So, only Dennis Johnston is among the old guard on the right side of the line.

In the backfield, the juggling was comprehensive too. Steve Dancho was moved out of his tackle spot to fullback where he performed so well last week. Desbians has taken over the left halfback starting position. He right half slot is still undecided, but will probably go to Wayne Wither since Jim McKinney is still nursing a bad ankle.

With this new set of comparative figures, Roseburg comes out with a very slight weight edge over the Pirates in the line. The Indians average 168 to Marshfield's 167. Heaviest for Roseburg is Alan Winters at 191, while Marshfield has a 198-pound center in Dean Peterson. The backfield is a different story. Roseburg's pony edition averages 149 to Marshfield's 164.

Weight Added on Defense

On defense, the Roseburg line adds eight pounds per man and a 12-pounds per man increase in the line. With the addition of two 200 pounders, the line checks in at 177 and the backfield is up to 161. Gilbert and Winters remain from offensive in the six-man defensive line while Dancho holds a defensive backfield berth.

Roseburg Eighth Graders Defeat Myrtle Creek

Roseburg and Myrtle Creek eighth grade gridders divided the touchdowns two apiece, but Roseburg added an all-important conversion to edge a 14-13 win Friday night.

Playing under the lights at Finlay field, Roseburg right halfback, Stout, scored all 14 points to wipe out that 13-13 deadlock both teams played to two weeks ago.

The teams started like a couple of counterpunchers. Roseburg struck first when Stout made one of the best runs of the evening.

At one time they had the ball down to the Myrtle Point 12, but that extra punch wasn't there. It was on the bench in the person of Kenny Wahl, who had to be jerked from the game when he wrenched his knee in the third quarter. Chuck Enyart had been pulled from the tackle spot to handle the fullback chores. He did a surprisingly good job in this unfamiliar position, but didn't have the experience to shake free when the chips were down.

Coach Anderson said he couldn't give any special credit to a particular person, but he said the line was at its best. It opened gaping holes and held like a steel trap on defense.

Texas Hoping To Whip Jinx Plus Oklahoma

Other Top Grid Teams Clash In Major Games Over Country Today

NEW YORK — (AP) — Texas

not only hopes to whip Oklahoma's football team in one of today's better games but also has hopes of licking its Cotton bowl jinx.

No matter how good the Texans have been in recent years, they always have trouble in the Cotton Bowl. A year ago their only defeat was by Oklahoma, 14 to 13 in the Cotton bowl. Then came Jan. 1 and the big Dallas bowl again worked its jinx: Tennessee 20 Texas 14.

Will the jinx hold again? This time Texas goes into the fray with a team that has yielded only four touchdowns while piling up 10 in scoring three triumphs. Talented Oklahoma is hampered by injuries.

A lot of other football questions will be up for quick answers today. The big ones are: just how good are Holy Cross, Georgia Tech, Maryland, Louisiana State, Notre Dame, Southern California and Princeton.

Better Than Expected
Of those seven, all have done better so far this season than was expected of them, except Maryland. And Maryland, rated one of the nation's best in August, is making the forecast stand up.

Tonight the Marylanders are the guests of a Georgia team that romped to two easy victories before being stopped by Mississippi State.

There will be a very quick answer regarding the abilities of Georgia Tech and Louisiana State. They meet in Atlanta, going into and battle with identical records of three victories each.

Even when Notre Dame was a veteran powerhouse it had trouble with Southern Methodist. This time the Texas Mustangs come into South Bend to face the youngest Irish team Frank Leahy ever has coached. But the teen-agers already have crushed Indiana and Detroit.

Southern California changed coaches after last season and was to have a character building season this fall. But the Trojans already have beaten Washington and Washington State and now must oppose Oregon State, good enough to hold Michigan State to a 6 to 0 triumph.

All-American Back
Only Dick Kazmaier, all-American Halfback, is back from Princeton's all-winning team of a year ago, but the Tigers so far have stormed through New York U. and Navy. Today's test is Pennsylvania, and the winner will benefit the co-favorite with Cornell for the Ivy league title.

Michigan State, No. 1 in the Associated Press top ten poll for the past two weeks, has it relatively easy with Marquette as its opponent. Ohio State, No. 2, visits Wisconsin, and the loser here will be forced to wait until next year for any Rose bowl planning. Tennessee, the No. 3 team, has a breather in Chattanooga.

Holy Cross, making rapid comeback strides, takes its aerial circus to the New Orleans Sugar bowl, where quarterback Charles Maloy will try to show Tulane new tricks in passing. The Crusaders have won their first two, including a 54 to 20 conquest of a good Fordham team.

In Friday night's top games Miami (Fla) edged Purdue, of the Big Ten, 7-0; Villanova trounced Alabama 41-18; and Fordham crushed Boston college, 35-19.

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Drain Warriors Demolish Oakland's Newly-Formed Team; Win Shot At Bandon

Drain's rugged Warriors demolished the newly formed Oakland squad, 56-13, Friday night to get a second shot at Bandon for the district crown.

Playing on their own field, the Warriors slammed across two touchdowns in every period but the third, in which they got three, to win the county championship. They will play Bandon, the defending district and state champion, Oct. 26 at Drain. Last year Bandon won 13-0 in a blinding wind storm.

The Warriors forced the Oaks back to their own goal line in the first quarter, where defensive right guard Howard Nutt intercepted a pass. One play took it to the Oakland two and the next was the game's initial score.

Oakland was held scoreless through the first three quarters, while Drain was scoring almost at will. The third of these touchdowns was set up by the outstanding passing of quarterback Allen Brown. He rifled one to Earl Simpson who swiveled his way to the Oakland three. Simpson bucked it over. The play covered 58 yards. Later in the scoring parade, Larry Oatney returned a punt 33 yards to the Oakland eight. He took it over on the next play.

The strong hearted Oaks were trailing by 44 points before they lashed back with two scores in the last period. Both were made on Jerry Blacklock-to-Roy Clem passes. The first was set up on the Drain 43 on a recovered fumble. Blacklock passed to Clem for the entire 43 yards. The same play accounted for the conversion. Later in the period, Clem took another Blacklock pass from the nine for a score.

Drain had a 464 total yardage tally to Oakland's 193. This included kickoff and punt returns. In the rushing department Drain had 183 to Oakland's 65. Drains 12 completions out of 16 were good for 170 passing yards. Oakland had three out of 11 for 68 yards.

DiMaggio Finally Decides To Quit

NEW YORK — (AP) — The question of whether Joe DiMaggio, whose spectacular career with the New York Yankees began 15 years ago, is going to retire, apparently was settled today — the clipper had made up his mind to quit. He declined to come right out and say he was finished, but he made it plain before heading for California by plane last night that only in deference to the wishes of Yank President Dan Topping, with whom he talked for two hours yesterday.

"I have made up my mind to retire and that is my present intention," said the great outfielder. "I have given it considerable thought."

When DiMaggio entered Topping's office for the confab, he was ready to lay his cards on the table. Topping listened to the slugger and instead of just saying: "OK, Joe, it's up to you," asked him to delay the decision for a time.

"You might feel differently a month from now," Topping told DiMaggio. "Why don't you go on your trip to Japan (where DiMaggio and teammates Billy Martin and Ed Lopat, along with Lefty O'Doul, will entertain the troops) and give this matter a little more thought."

DiMaggio agreed.
