

Fathers, Students Draft Law Revised

The draft status of married men who are going to become fathers and college students have been modified, according to John L. Saunders, chairman of the local selective service board, 14.

More information than is listed below can be obtained at room 205 in the Carter building, Roseburg.

Married men with wives only are no longer classed in 3-A unless the induction of the registrant would result in extreme hardship and privation to the wife. These married men are being reclassified at the present time, and this reclassification should be completed before the end of the month of October. No registrant shall be placed in class 3-A because he has a child which is not yet born, unless there is filed with the local board the certificate of a licensed physician stating that the child has been conceived, and the date of delivery.

Students now attending college will be given the privilege of taking a college qualification test on either Dec. 13, 1951 or April 24, 1952, so that they may qualify for deferment to continue in school. Applications for the Dec. 13 test must be postmarked not later than midnight Nov. 5, 1951 and applications for the April 24 test must be

postmarked not later than March 10, 1952.

To be eligible to take the selective service college qualification test, an applicant, on the testing date he selects, 1. must be a registrant who intends to request occupational deferment as a student; 2. must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course, either under-graduate or graduate, leading to a degree; and 3. must not previously have taken the test. All registrants who wish to take the test should apply immediately. Further information and blanks may be obtained from an Selective Service local board.

Boeing Co. Loses Suit For Damages Against Union

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Boeing Airplane Co. of Seattle has been denied a supreme court review of its unsuccessful suit for \$9,045,000 damages from two unions for alleged violation of an agreement not to strike.

The strike began April 22, 1948, lasted more than four months, and paralyzed Boeing's operations in Washington State. The firm sought damages on the basis of a 1946 bargaining agreement which included the no-strike clause.

When the strike began, a Boeing official sent union officials a letter stating that because of the strike the bargaining agreement "is terminated and at an end."

The U. S. district court in Seattle interpreted the letter as in irrevocable election to rescind the labor contract and therefore a bar to the suit for damages. The court dismissed Boeing's suit and was upheld by the U. S. circuit court in San Francisco.

Boeing asked the supreme court to review and overturn this ruling. Its suit was against the International Association of Machinists and the Aeronautical Industrial District Lodge No. 751 of that association.

Other Cases Acted On
Granted a second hearing to Mrs. Marianna von Moltke, a former German countess who was sentenced to prison on an espionage charge.

Refused to reverse itself on a decision made last June that cities may compel their employees to take loyalty oaths. The decision was given an appeal by 17 Los Angeles municipal workers who were fired for refusing to sign statements required by a city ordinance.

Refused to reconsider a decision giving broad powers to legislative investigating committees. The ruling, announced last June, denied William Patrick Brandhove the right to sue the California senate committee on un-American activities for \$250,000.

Denied a hearing to a group of about 4,000 persons of Japanese ancestry residing on the west coast who seek official declarations that they are U. S. citizens.

All of the group were born in this country. While held in relocation centers during World War II, they signed renunciations of American citizenship.

Declined to reconsider its decision upholding the right of cities to ban door-to-door peddlers.

H. C. Aiken, Former State Demo Chairman, Passes
SALEM — (AP) — Henry Case Aiken, 51 former Democratic state chairman, died here today at the home of a sister, Mrs. Albert C. Gragg.

He had been ill here for 2½ months with a liver and heart ailment.

He lived most of his life in Heppner and for a number of years operated a Pastime club there.

In 1944 he was elected chairman of the state Democratic committee, and held the position four years. A delegate to the national convention nominating Franklin D. Roosevelt, he went to Washington to attend the 1945 inauguration.

Family Of Seven Left Homeless By Night Blaze

A family of seven was burned out of its nine-room rented home south of Lookingglass Monday night as fire started in the kitchen and swept through the building in two hours.

The occupants, Mr. and Mrs. John Sweek and five children, returned from visiting in Roseburg to find the house in ashes.

The blaze, on the Lookingglass-Brookway road about a mile south of Lookingglass, started about 8 p.m. By 10 p.m. the house was destroyed.

Mr. A. E. Wennerburg, 120 W. Third Ave. North, Roseburg, owner of the house, estimated the loss at \$10,000.

Also destroyed were two nearby sheds.

Goods Saved By Neighbors
Hampered by the lack of any fire fighting organization or equipment, neighbors confined their activities to saving furniture and household goods.

More than a dozen men helped carry out articles. Most was saved except for kitchen furniture.

The blaze was discovered by Cliff Boling, route 4, who was driving by and discovered flames shooting out from the rear of the house.

He entered to find the kitchen a mass of flames. Boling said the only water supply was from a well in a pump house — which was also in flames.

Articles saved from the fire were stored at the Rudy H. Meyer home, about a quarter mile to the south.

The Sweek family, which had moved into the home only three weeks ago, is now staying with neighbors.

The house, a large frame structure built in 1912, was partially insured, Mrs. Wennerburg said.

Swiss Court Convicts U. S. Negro Of Espionage

LAUSANNE, Switzerland — (AP) — A Swiss federal court today convicted Charles E. Davis of political espionage in connection with charges that he furnished information to Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) and United States agents.

Davis was sentenced to eight months in jail and ordered expelled from Switzerland.

Davis is a 23-year-old Pasadena, Calif., Negro.

Davis, who also worked as a leftist journalist, was accused that he furnished information to United States agents and to Senator McCarthy concerning activities of Communists and U. S. diplomatic personnel in Switzerland.

Spruce Budworm Toll High In Spraying Job

SALEM — (AP) — The million-acre spruce budworm project carried out in Oregon last spring by the state and federal foresters resulted in a 98.6 percent kill, the state forestry department said.

The department has been making extensive surveys in the treated areas to find out how many of the insects were killed.

The department now is making surveys in other areas to determine if spraying is needed again next year. The spraying is done by airplanes.

Death Toll In 2 Plane Disasters May Reach 28

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rescue patrols rose at dawn from air force bases around the North Atlantic to scan the waves for a big plane lost Monday out of the Azores with 11 men.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — (AP) — A South African airways plane crashed on a 7,000-foot peak about 100 miles southwest of Durban in a heavy fog Monday, killing all 17 persons aboard.

Oregon Milk Law Repeal Sought By Women's Clubs

PORTLAND — (AP) — The Portland Federation of Women's Clubs will open offices in Portland next month for its campaign to repeal Oregon's milk control law.

The federation, made up of 72 women's clubs, voted to endorse the milk control repeal plans advocated by its affiliated milk committee.

Mrs. Vivien McMurtry, committee chairman, said the repeal bill already has been drafted. It calls for the elimination of the milk

control act except for those portions which provide a price floor to producers. The present quota system also will be repealed to permit additional producers, who meet sanitary standards, to enter the Portland market.

She said she hoped the committee would be able to obtain enough signatures to put the repeal measure on the primary election ballot next May.

Snag Falls Onto Auto; Man Killed, Wife Hurt

WHEELER, Ore. — (AP) — A sawmill worker was killed and his wife critically injured when a large snag fell from a tree, smashing the top of their car.

Raymond Frederick Bottle, 60, Manzanita, an employee of the Morgan shingle mill in God's valley north of here, was fatally crushed by the snag, which was four feet in diameter.

Mrs. Bottle was trapped inside the car until freed by rescuers, Allan Lundberg, Tillamook county coroner, reported. She was brought to a hospital here.

The Bottles were driving out of the valley when the accident occurred.

Ohio senator lashed out at "the disastrous policy of Yalta and Potsdam."

The administration, he said, caused the loss of China by "turning Manchuria over to Soviet Russia."

Korean War Denounced
He denounced the Korean war as "an unnecessary war which would have been prevented by common sense and a planned program against communism." Such an overall program, he said, is lacking.

America's entry into the Korean war, the senator said, was by a "hasty decision" by President Truman, although "under the constitution, only Congress can declare war."

The result, he said, is that today "we cannot withdraw without admitting a military defeat by China," although "by the methods suggested by General MacArthur we might have achieved a united and free Korea."

"At this time, however, a stalemate peace at the 38th parallel is better than a stalemate war at the 38th parallel."

Taft bid unsuccessfully for his party's presidential nomination in 1940 when it went to Wendell Wilkie, of Indiana, and in 1948 when Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York got the nod for the second time.

New Rules Issued For Employment Of Oregon Minors

SALEM — (AP) — New regulations governing the employment of minors have been announced by State Labor Commissioner William E. Kimsey.

The regulations, approved by the state wage and hour commission, do these things:

1. Prohibits employment of minors under 18 in recreation places after 10:30 p. m.

2. Prohibits employment of minors under 16 in jobs declared hazardous by the state industrial accident commission.

3. Sets a minimum wage of 50 cents an hour for minors not already covered by special orders.

4. Prohibits employment of children under 14 in any work during the school term.

5. Prohibits employment of minor girls as hotel maids until after the labor commissioner has made a special investigation.

6. Provides 10-minute rest period for minors in the middle of each four-hour work period.

7. Prohibits minor girls from curb service work in drive-ins.

Kimsey pointed out that the law requires all employers of persons under 18 to have work permits, which are issued by Kimsey.

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
