Hod Carriers Union Ups Pay Of Two Top Officers

CHICAGO — (P) — Two top officers of the AFL International Hod Carriers Building and Common Laborers union were voted pay raises of \$18,000 a year each here.

The salary boosts of more than 100 percent were approved by delegates to the union's convention. The annual pay of Joseph V. Moreschi, Chicago, was increased from \$12,000 to \$30,000 and that of Peter Fosco, Chicago, secretary-treasurer, from \$10,000 to \$28,000 a year.

Moreschi has been president of the union, which claims a membership of 400,000, since 1926.

Gamble On Wage To Revive Plant

DETROIT — (P) — A two-weeks pay "gamble" by 300 unionists and company officers put a 92-year-old packing plant back in operation here.

The 300 union workers at the Hammond Standish Co., closed since Aug. 14, agreed to return to work without pay for two weeks in an effort to get the firm back on its financial feet.

Company officers also have agreed to work without pay until the firm is making a profit. They will consult with a union committee on how the plant should be run.

Under the agreement worked out, the employees, members of the CIO Packing House Workers union, will work for three weeks. If the company is showing a profit then, they'll get their first week's pay.

Wages for the second week will be paid at the end of the fourth week, etc. The agreement is to run for nine weeks, but may be terminated by mutual consent.

The packing company blamed its August closing on government controls, saying it was caught in a squeeze by ceilings on pork but no ceilings on live hogs. It asked a receivership and five years to pay its debts.
